Cheese Meeting at Delta.
A representative meeting of cheese
producers was held here on Tuesday
afternoon. The meeting was called
pursuant to an arrangement made at a
meeting of the Farmers' Institute last
week at Elgin. The held some weeks
ago at Elgin. The meeting was opened
at 2 p. m. with Joshua Leggs, Esq., in the
chair.
Messrs. Atcheson, Cook, Redmond,
Rath, Barlow, Earl, Murphy, Warden
McIntyre and others were present.
The meeting was well attended, and

ting to the meeting of a drive of 25 or 30
miles in the night for a score or more
of salesmen. But the chief cause of com-

right and an offer to take it at a re-
duced price. This motion was never
made. It was said, when the market
was looking up, numerous instances
were given in which men had to go to
Montreal in consequence of such notifi-
cations and in every case given the
cheese were straight and the market
crooked.

POISONED BY HIS TEETH.
The remarkable case of Elsworth Ben-
net which puzzles the doctors.
The case of Elsworth Bennet, of 89
Wolcott street, New Haven, Connec-
ticut, has attracted unusual attention in
medical circles in this city. Obtain-
ing no relief from physicians there he
proposes to go to New York for treat-
ment.
Some months ago Bennet, who is
employed as a freight brakeman on the
New York, New Haven & Hart-
ford road, decided to purchase a set of
false teeth. He had been without
teeth for over a year and his gums
were hard and in an excellent condi-
tion for the fitting of the artificial set.
He visited a Charcoal street dentist and
was provided with an upper set which,
when first tried, fitted perfectly. Mr.
Bennet wore the teeth that night.
About two o'clock in the morning he
was awakened by a terrible pain in
his head and was started to find that
his tongue was swollen until it was
nearly two inches thick and protruded
from his mouth nearly an inch, causing
intense pain. After a time this swell-
ing subsided only to appear in some
other portion of the body.
Bennet visited Medical Examiner
M. C. White for the purpose of hav-
ing the artificial teeth and plate ana-
lyzed. The teeth were of the ordinary
kind and the plate was cheap red rub-
ber. Dr. White told him that no an-
alysis was necessary; that he could
tell that mercury had been used in the
making of the rubber plate, and that
it was the absorption of this poison in-
to the system that had caused the
swellings.
After that Bennet's hands swelled
up to three times their natural size
and he could not use them in any way.
This had hardly disappeared when his
feet swelled in the same way.
His knee-joints were badly affected;
then his ears swelled, and finally
the poison settled in his eyes and he
became blind for a time. The swell-
ings are painless except when the
tongue is irritated. Then Mr. Bennet
suffers intense pain from the straining
facial muscles.
The majority of the doctors said
when first consulted that the swell-
ing was caused by mercurial poison-
ing, but up to the present time they
have not succeeded in expelling the
mercury from the system.—The
Times.

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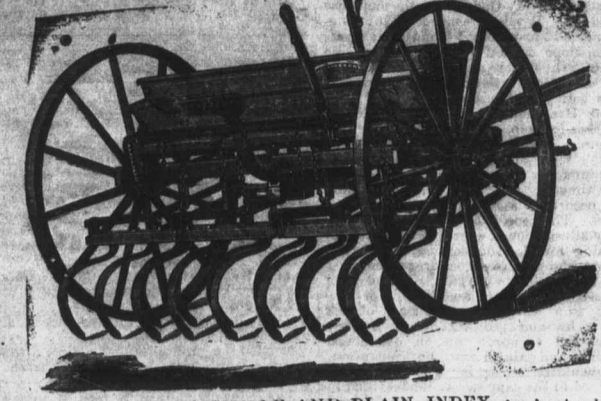
