As we are making diligent enquiries by means which we do not intend to publish, to bring these thieves to the proper tribunal.

The following is copied from the London Financial Observer and Mining Herald of Jan. 31st, which has been handed to us by Mr F. A. Dixon, of this town.

We are bringing our present notice down to the new firm carrying on business at 14, Southampton Street, Strand, under the style of Frederick Corby & Co.

We are glad to announce to our readers, a really laughable instance which occurred—it would appear that a certain farmer confided to W. Craymer, or, as he supposed, F. Corby & Co., the sale of his apples, which were duly despatched in the usual way; they were sold, and, we believe, realized a profit of £200 over and above the sum advanced.

The political contest is progressing to a white heat and both parties are leaving no stone unturned, and count no obstacle too great to be faced and overcome, regardless of the means used.

Mr EDITOR.—As you profess to be impartial, will you give me a chance to say a few words from a consumer's point of view.

I learn from a New York paper of Feb. 19th that pickled hams were selling in open market for 7 1/2 to 8 cts. a lb, smoked hams 8 1/2 to 9 cts., shoulders 3 1/2 cts., dressed pigs 4 15-16 cts., lard 6 to 7 cts.

Why should our farmers be protected in these articles?
Beef is another very expensive article in Wolfville as all know who have butcher bills to pay.

It seems to me that our farmers are pretty well fixed. They have a free market for their apples and are netting from \$3.50 to \$4.00 a bin for them while they are protected against American competition in butter, cheese, lard, pork, beef and other articles and we are being bled for their benefit.

EDITOR ACADIAN.—Many farmers in the Eastern States seem to be far from prosperous, if we may judge from the reports that come to us from various quarters.

Handbook Items.

Politics, in Handbook, is still the chief topic of conversation and likely to be for some time yet. Saturday afternoon I took a stroll down to Grimes' store. I knew if there was any information to be had concerning politics, that would be the place to get it. Grimes' store is the political centre of Handcock. People meet here from far and near to discuss it and many are the arguments raised concerning the great political issues of the day. As I went in, there was quite a crowd sitting around the stove and among the number was Deacon Klum. The subject under consideration was free trade.

"There's no doubt about it," said the Deacon, "free trade's just the country needs. I've allers argued so. Things is high enough, the dear knows, without havin' to pay a big duty on 'em. It may be all right to protect the manufacturers, but the farmer shouldn't pay for it."

"That's what I say," said young Eb Jones, "what this country wants is free trade and we're goin' to get it too. The idea of us havin' to pay duties just so the Canadian manufacturers can make money. It may be all right for up there in Upper Canada, but it's not fair for the farmer down here in Nova Scotia to suffer. What do you say, Mr Grimes?"

Mr Grimes allowed them to have his sentiments. He always had voted for free trade, that is on things we have to get from the States, and he was always going to "But," says he, "there's one thing about this election I dunno—this unrestricted reciprocity. Suppose we get unrestricted reciprocity with the United States. Of course we'll have to have the same duty on goods comin' from England and other countries as them or else if there was a lower duty in our country than the others all the goods comin' from foreign countries would pass through it. The United States wouldn't be of course let all the goods come through Canada and we wouldn't be satisfied to have them all pass through the United States—scarcely. Then the question is who would say what the duty was to be. Of course both countries would have a say in the matter, the United States having ten times as many people would have the whole control of it, and we'd have to shove our duties on English goods up as high as theirs. Then if the United States controlled our trade it wouldn't be long before they controlled everything else. No, I don't believe in this unrestricted reciprocity. The Loyalists didn't leave their homes in New England and come over here to have their descendants turn traitors and go back—oh least, mine didn't."

"Is that the policy of the Liberal party this time?" said Deacon Klum. "To tell the truth that doesn't look altogether right—to shut out the home country and have free trade with a foreign power."

"Oh," said Eb Jones, "that's just a political dodge like repeal. They'll be no change, I don't imagine, if they're elected. It's just a dodge to put 'em in power, and it'll do it, too, see if it don't."

"Wall," said Mr Grimes, "I don't think they'll fool me again. They fooled me on repeal, but they won't on unrestricted reciprocity. I don't believe in these political dodges. If a party fools me once it'll be the last time. The way things look to me is that the Tories have adopted the old Liberal policy of reciprocity and the Liberals have acted the fool and taken up unrestricted reciprocity, or annexation, which is the same thing, you'll see, in the end. If Blake was at the head of the party there'd be no tomfoolery of this kind, and I'd be one that'd support him; but as it is I think I'll vote on the Tory ticket and run no risk. When I want to join the Yankees I'll pack up and go there, but I'll not consent to give up the old soil that our fathers fought for."

"Eb didn't know what to say. He was as mad as a hornet. I poked him in the ribs and laid back and laughed till I fairly raised the roof off the shop. 'Mr Grimes,' said I, when I had recovered myself, 'good for you! In the future you can always depend on my patronage' and diving deep into a box of confectionery on the counter, I finally bade him good-bye and left for home."

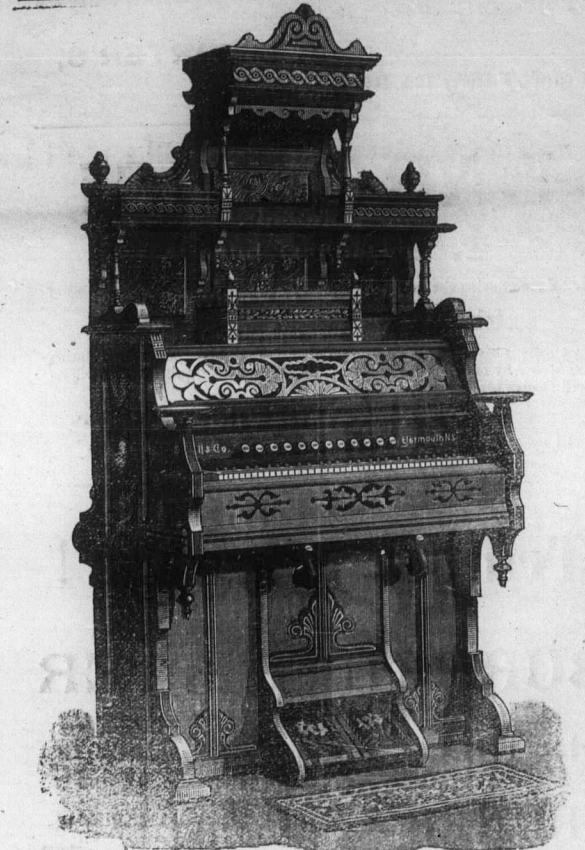
