who are elected by fraudulent
practices should be unseated. We can
agree also that there should be no
necessary delay in bringing protests
to trial. But in this, as in so many
other instances, it is necessary to em-
phasize the amazing change of heart
which has overtaken the organs and
leaders of Liberalism since the party
passed out of office two years ago.

In Halifax an election protest was
kept from trial for a whole Parlia-
ment. But there was only laughter
and jeering from the Liberal organs
when doubt was expressed it was
intended the law should be so pro-
tected for partisan purposes. It seem-
ed to be regarded as very clever that
men against whom charges were laid
in the courts should be able to hold
their places undisturbed until the
natural dissolution of a Parliament
which perhaps they had never been
elected.

But if in the judgment of the Lib-
eral press this long delay at Halifax
was at worst a pretty offence it should
feel nothing but joy and gratitude
that only a year has elapsed since the
"eye election" in Manitoba over which
it is now sneering. Fortunately, no
doubt in forgetfulness of the honored
precedents which were established un-
der Liberal government.

It is not enough that farming

that, it sours in Jack and his sister,
the idiosyncrasy beyond remedy,
because life on the farm seems to
hold out to them only hard and care-
less work in the run of their years to
come.

Editorial Notes.

The Western Chronicle, of Kentville, has recently added a "funny column" to its departments. This was altogether unnecessary; the Chronicle is always "funny."

A movement is in progress, says the London Standard, for the federation of all the world's societies for the prevention of cruelty to children. The suggestion is made that an international congress be held in London in 1915.

There has been a sharp decline in the apple market both in Great Britain and Germany, with its consequent reaction upon the shippers of Nova Scotia. This fact is accounted for by the heavy shipment of recent weeks glutting the markets of those countries, and the weather conditions over there causing rapid ripening of the fruit.

The Liberal papers and orators are just now crying of the splendid Borden Government. In just four years from 1908 to 1912, the late Liberal Government under Mr. Fielding, as Finance Minister, added to the public debt of Canada \$76,000,000. In the two years of Liberal-Conservative rule and Mr. White Minister of Finance the debt was reduced by \$25,000,000, a fact which is without parallel in the history of the world for a country of Canada's population.

Canada has good home markets for poultry and eggs. Of the 20,500,000 dozen eggs exported in 1913 from the United States, over one half of the total came to Canada. A St. John woman will embark in the poultry and egg business on an extensive scale, having acquired a farm on which she starts with 2000 hens, under the charge of an experienced superintendent. A man from Ontario has purchased a farm at Belle Isle and will start a poultry farm. A ready market and good prices are assured anyone who goes into the business.

What would a man say to his wife if she were to leave her \$50 sewing machine out in the yard in a rain storm? Well he would do a plenty if she persisted in leaving it out in the weather. And yet the same Lord of creation has left his farm machinery standing out in the fence corner. Many of these costly tools will stand out unprotected all winter. What should your wife, Mr. Farmer, do to you? She should get a rolling pin after you and make you house them now. You can save a ten dollar bill any day this week by acting on this suggestion.

A regrettable incident of the recent municipal elections was the defeat of Dr. Henry Chipman in Ward 9. Dr. Chipman has been a long resident in the community and no man better deserves the respect and regard of his neighbors. A faithful and skillful physician, he has freely given his skill and strength in their behalf, in many cases without any thought of remuneration. The doctor, however, holds the somewhat quixotic, though much to be commended, idea that in affairs of this kind the office should seek the man instead of the man seeking the office. He, therefore, refused to make a canvass of the ward and plainly intimated to his friends that if any undue influence was used to secure his election he would refuse to accept the position. If rumor is correct no such scruples were held by the supporters of his opponent, hence the result. Ward 9 and the county have lost the services of a man of exceptional ability, and the esteemed physician is spared to his much loved work.

Resourceful.

In a recent address Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that he wished to get back into office in order to reduce the tariff. We had many such promises from him prior to 1896, but during his fifteen years as Prime Minister he lowered the average customs schedule by less than one per cent. His Government's failure to legislate according to the Liberal platform of 1893 is cause for amazement. In the country, and his present undertakings will surely be accepted at their face value.

In one breath Sir Wilfrid Laurier pledges himself to tariff reduction and in the next to the construction of more railways for Quebec Province. In his next speech he might explain how the country could assume fresh financial liabilities upon a decreased revenue. The Liberal leader is singularly an opportunist when he deals with the question of defence. In office he belittled Canada by rejecting the Admiralty's advice, by adopting an ineffective naval programme and by going out of office without even carrying that into effect.

At the last session of Parliament when Mr. Borden brought down a really practicable policy the Opposition leader countered by committing his party to a costly scheme of creating two naval units—one on either coast. Now addressing a Quebec audience he talks of tariff revision and asks "is it not more important than a navy and Dreadnaughts?" He was always opposed to full co-operation with the Imperial navy and now, if he is rejected correctly, he is in no hurry to do anything of the kind. Canadian oceanic shipping business at \$22,000,000. There changes of time in as busy times suggest to us the least a political re-arrangement which must command the admiration of all observers.

At the close of the meeting of the Council there was a meeting of the Board of Health at which Dr. F. D. Parker presented a most interesting and exhaustive letter with reference to the state of the public health, having particular regard to the scourge of tuberculosis. His letter and charts aroused much attention and the valuable suggestions presented were much appreciated by the Board and citizens present. Health Officer Dr. G. E. DeWitt was present and complimented Dr. Parker on his address and urged upon the Board the fullest attention to the provision of the Health Act. The result, we trust, will be that such action will be taken as will make Wolfville first in this or in other matters of municipal enterprise among provincial towns.

Christmas is Coming.

Almost everybody in this part of the world who lives until the day will give or get a Christmas present. Many, a very great many, won't begin to plan the present until the holidays are near; and then they'll be caught in the shopping rush, will be put to hurry and annoyance, will add to the strain on overworked toilers, and, by their heedlessness, will rob the great day of some part of its joy. How much better, in every way, is the practice of a family in Philadelphia, described in the Telegraph of that city. Every year, not later than October 1, each of this group of five, begins to lay aside Christmas money. As soon as one has a sum saved, he or she makes a list of persons to be remembered and of gifts appropriate and possible. Then, beginning with the top name on the list, which invariably is mother, the author of the list sets forth to buy the gift or the materials of which it is to be made, weeks before the stores are crowded. In this way, the night before Christmas finds every member of the household ready, indeed, the readiness runs back for weeks. And thus distributed, the expense and the work are both light; giving is as much joy as receiving. Nor is any clerk or delivery worker made more tired.

Dr. Cutten Speaks.

Speaking at Charlottetown the other evening, Rev. Dr. Cutten, president of Acadia University, declared it is the business of the church to get hold of the boys at the critical juncture and mould a Christian manhood. Dr. Cutten, dealing with the place of men in the church, asked why it was that at present women predominated in church membership, and answered his own question by asserting that the church was manned by women because mainly women's work was provided. The ideal Christ of the Middle Ages painted was the Christ meek and mild and loving; the seed of the age was the Christ who cleansed the temple of its polluters and denounced the iniquities of his own day and generation. Men are needed in the church to counteract the evil influences of the political propagandist who nullifies the Christ as vote and bribable elector. The politicians are not so much to blame for corruption and bribery as are the easy going church people who stand by idly and allow the evil to take its course.

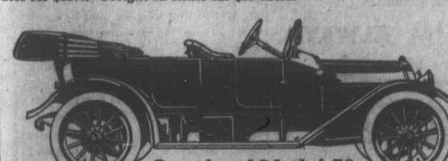

Destruction to Dykes.

Not since the 'Saxby Tide' in the autumn of 1869 has so much damage been sustained by the dyke lands in this vicinity as was occasioned by the extremely high tides of Thursday last week and following days. From every direction comes the story of broken dykes and flooded lands. The Wickwire Dyke here was badly damaged, while the 'Good' gates opened to welcome the sea to wander at will. Many of the cattle pastured on the dyke-lands were rescued with great difficulty, while some perished. It is estimated that it will require at least a thousand dollars to repair the dykes. The Grand Pré sustained very little damage. The wind was from the north and east and Long Island sheltered the dyke and saved it from destruction. Had the wind been east or south-east the Grand Pré would have met with the same fate as the Wickwire. At Bour Island the dyke was overflown. The dykes along the Cornwallis river also suffered much damage. The Hubert Dyke, which was repaired last year at a heavy expense, was again broken in a number of places and the tides again swept across its meadows. Traffic between Greenwich and Port Williams was suspended on account of the road across the dyke being impassable. The dykes along the Avon and Stubbenscady rivers also suffered severely. On the Falmouth side, above Windsor, every dyke was submerged and the same condition of affairs prevailed on the Windsor side. Work is now going on briskly and it is hoped that in most places the dykes will be again raised before the next set of high tides.
