HAROLD WHEELER RECEIVES WOUND

Shot by Companion at Campbellton While Examining Revolver.

IN SERIOUS CONDITION

Campbellton, N. B., July 31—A shade of gloom was cast over the fire-stricken community this afternoon when it was learned that Harold Wheeler, a member of the local militia, and one of the town's most popular young men, had been the victim of a shooting accident as a result of which he is now in a precarious condition.

The accident occurred at noon and was caused by the discharge of a bullet from his own revolver while in the hands of a friend of his named Porsier. The latter was examining the revolver, which is an automatic one, when the discharge took place. The bullet passed through Wheeler's arm and entered his abdomen, rendering him unconscious. He was taken to the relief hospital where he is being attended by Drs. Pinault and Price.

This is the second serious accident to take place here since the day of the fire.

That the outside world is gradually being aroused to the seriousness of Campbellton's situation was made evident by the increased number of subscriptions received here on Saturday, more than \$3,000 being added to the relief fund. A pleasing feature in connection with it was the fact that the larger part of it came from upper Canadian cities, which up to a few days ago sent in little or no assistance.

MANY CURES REPORTED AT SHRINES OF STE. ANNE

Huge Procession in Chicago and Ste. Anne, Ill., Where Sacred Relics Were Secured from Canadian Shrine

Chicago, July 27—A procession of 2,000 pilgrims whose homes are scattered from ocean to ocean, among them some who came on crutches, in wheel chairs and by train, marked the close of the feast of Ste. Anne, which has been in progress for nine days at St. Anne's church.

Simultaneously occurred the procession of lighted candles and the end of the Novena at Ste. Anne, Ill., the only other shrine in the United States possessing the sacred relics. At the latter place nearly 5,000 persons marched in the procession. Many wonderful cures are reported at both shrines, the lame and the halt said they were made to walk; the paralyzed claimed they were restored; and the blind asserted they were made to see. Cures were announced at Ste. Anne and Chicago. Relics of Ste. Anne in the two American shrines were secured from the shrine of St. Anne de Beaupre, Canada. The pilgrimages are held annually and attract afflicted persons from nearly every state in the Union.

CAMPBELLTON PEOPLE STILL IN DIRE NEED

Purse Strings are Being Gradually Unloosed but Much More is Needed if Refugees are to Survive Rigors of Winter—Measles Threatened.

Campbellton, N. B., July 31—Public appeals for help from Campbellton are as last being answered with the generosity which the desperate situation deserve and at no time since the fire is assistance more urgent now that measles threaten to become epidemic among the children.

In the case of many of the children there is sickness of some kind owing to lack of proper accommodation during the wet weather last week.

The building committee is arranging to provide homes for the poor as rapidly as the cash contributions allow. An investigation shows that about six hundred destitute people will have to be

assisted in building houses and supplying food for the winter. Even if only \$100 is spent on each of these families from now until next spring, it would necessitate a sum of sixty thousand dollars, yet only \$45,000 had been contributed up to last Saturday when several large subscriptions were received. In order to provide the bare necessities of life to the population at last \$100,000 will be needed.

Sergeant Harold Wheeler of the local militia was accidentally wounded yesterday by a comrade handling an automatic revolver. The bullet wedged in the abdomen necessitating Wheeler's removal to the temporary hospital.

DR. CRIPPEN IN GRASP OF LAW

World Wide Search for Alleged Wife Murderer Came to An End on Sunday. Nearly Collapsed.

Father Point, Que., July 31—All doubts as to whether "Rev. Mr. Robinson and son" on board the steamboat Montrose were Dr. Crippen and Miss Leneve—Crippen, the London doctor who is wanted to answer the charge of murdering his wife; Miss Leneve, his stenographer—were set at rest this morning when Inspector Dew, of Scotland Yard, boarded the Montrose and immediately recognized the pair as the people he had been sent after. They were immediately arrested and kept on the boat as prisoners, continuing on to Quebec.

The Montrose arrived off Father Point this morning at 8.30 and was met by a pilot tug, on board of which were Inspector Dew with Chief McCarthy and ex-Chief Dennis, of the provincial police, all disguised in oil skins as pilots.

When they boarded the Montrose Dr. Crippen was walking the deck with Dr. Stuart, of the Montrose. Crippen appeared nervous, and enquired why so many pilots boarded the vessel. Dr. Stuart re-

plied that possibly they were pilots returning after a trip.

The three officers walked the deck until they had a good look at Crippen and Miss Leneve. As soon as Inspector Dew saw them he recognized the two, and gave a prearranged signal to his companions. Immediately Chief McCarthy and Denis moved over and arrested Crippen and Miss Leneve, and took them down to their cabin, where they are now held in charge of Inspector Dew.

CRIPPEN NEAR COLLAPSED

Crippen was completely taken by surprise, and became deadly pale when the officers apprehended him, his agitation being such that he was wholly unable to speak. Miss Leneve was seized with hysterics and could not say a word as she was assisted below.

The whole drama was enacted within a few minutes, and as soon as it was over a whistle was blown from the Montrose to a steam tender lying by, which enabled the thirty or more press representatives from Great Britain, Canada and the United States to board the Montrose, with the regular pilot. The vessel at once proceeded with the prisoners and police to Quebec, where she is expected to arrive shortly after midnight and where Dr. Crippen and Miss Leneve will be landed for the necessary formalities for their return to face their trial in London.

A GOOD APPLICANT

Mr. Robert Crawford, for some years a member of the St. John police force, and later chief of police at Campbellton, is in the city today. The object of his visit is in connection with the position of chief of police of this city. Mr. Crawford states that if there is to be a change in the position of chief of police here, he is an applicant for the position.—(Glaner)

FIRE LIMITS VERY NECESSARY

Regulations For Buildings In Certain District Should be Made at Once.

WANT PUBLIC PARK

The Campbellton town council and advisory board held a meeting Saturday afternoon, at which the question of having a fire limit established in the town was again brought up to discussion. F. M. Anderson, of the Shives Lumber Company, was present and urged upon the council the necessity of having such a law as this established. He assured them that unless some steps in this direction were taken an enormous increase in the insurance rates would follow. The council left the matter in the hands of a committee, who will report at the next meeting.

In addition to a fire limit, G. G. McKenzie, chairman of the relief committee, stated that as a protection against fire the council should purchase land in the centre of the town to be used as a public square. This was looked upon very favorably by the council, and it is now altogether likely that such a purchase will be made.

Mayor Murray informed the council that Premier Hazen, while on his last visit here, promised to supply the council, judges and lawyers of the town, as well, with the provincial statutes and acts of assembly.

Judge McLatchy left on Saturday evening for Ottawa, where tomorrow he will appear for immediate aid. In the course of his appeal, Judge McLatchy will take occasion to remind the dominion cabinet that Campbellton previous to the fire had been the third revenue producing town in the province, and as a result was worthy of assistance if only in the way of an investment.

Brantford, Ont., July 28.—Unable to secure raw materials as a result of the Grand Trunk strike, the Farmers' Binder Twine and Schultz brick plants here were temporarily closed yesterday. Operations will be resumed as soon as supplies which are stalled arrive. The local strikers were paid off yesterday. They allege that before receiving their cheques offers to resume work were made to them, but refused.

KILLS WIFE WITH A BREAD KNIFE

New York, July 28—In the presence of his five little children, Adraham Roth, a Rivington street tailor, after quarrelling with his wife, plunged a bread knife into her throat today and then slashed his own throat. The woman, her jugular vein pierced with the thrust fled with a shriek to the fire escape and pitched headlong through the opening to the landing below. Picked up unconscious and taken to the Gouveneur Hospital, she died there half an hour later. Roth was found lying unconscious on the floor of the living room in his apartment and was taken to the same hospital where his condition was said to be critical. Roth had not worked steadily lately, it was said. The children of the couple said their parents had spent the greater portion of the night in carrying on the quarrel which culminated in today's tragedy. Roth is forty years old and his wife was slightly his junior.

DIocese OF CHATHAM WILL ASSIST PASTOR

His Lordship Bishop Barry in Course of Eloquent Letter Makes Appeal for Assistance to Rebuild Destroyed Edifice.

Co-operation on the part of the various church members in the diocese, it is anticipated, will shortly raise the necessary fund to reconstruct the Roman Catholic church at Campbellton. Rev. E. P. Wallace is working indefatigably in the interests of his congregation.

His Lordship Bishop Barry, of Chatham, plans a collection in the various churches. His Lordship writes an eloquent appeal, which coming officially will find a generous response. It is as follows:

Chatham, N. B., July 22, 1910

Reverend Father:—

As you have undoubtedly learned, God in His all-wise Providence has seen fit to remove the Church and Presbytery of Campbellton by the late disastrous fire, the Pastor, Rev. E. P. Wallace finds himself in the very unenviable and unique position of being not only without Church or Residence but also without a congregation able to assist him in the rebuilding of the Church property, having themselves lost all they had. Hence it seems to me only just that the diocese at large should come to the immediate aid of the stricken congregation of Campbellton, and by generous contribution enable the Pastor to reconstruct the edifice of God and afford him the means of continuing God's holy work in the midst of his afflicted people.

I would therefore request each Pastor of the Diocese to announce upon the first Sunday after the reception of this letter, that on the following Sunday a collection will be taken up for the purpose of rebuilding the Church.

I beg also to recommend to your good prayers and to those of your faithful flock the suffering people of Campbellton in order that God may lessen their hardships and grant them the means of establishing themselves in the normal state of prosperity.

HON. MR. PUGSLEY AT CAMPBELLTON

Assures People That Town Will Remain Divisional Point of I. C. R.

GOVERNMENT'S POLICY

"Such a calamity was never before heard of in the history of Canada," was the remark made by Dr. Pugsley, after viewing the scenes of desolation and destruction. Many pitiable sights were brought to his notice, among which were the sufferings which are being endured in the tented city, sufferings which were greatly intensified as a result of a continual downpour of rain.

So impressed was the minister with the situation and the necessity of prompt action that he advised the relief committee to have Lieutenant-Governor Tweedie and Premier Hazen brought to the scene at once, stating that he would cancel all previous engagements and remain over. The governor and premier, who were notified to this effect, wired back that they would be on hand for a meeting.

At 2.30 o'clock a formal meeting was held, at which Judge McLatchy addressed the minister on behalf of the townspeople. BUSINESS COLLEGE IN NEW QUARTERS SEPT. 1ST

Inches Building Being Remodelled to Afford Better Accommodation for Institution—Founded in 1894 and has had Prosperous Career.

As a result of the extensive improvements being made to the Inches building at the corner of York and Queen streets, the Fredericton Business College at present located in the Pitts Block off York street, will have quarters second to none in the Maritime Provinces, and surpassed by none in Canada.

The new quarters of the Business College will be on the third floor of the Inches Block. The situation itself could hardly be bettered, the windows giving an excellent view of Queen street, Phoenix Square, the grounds of the Provincial Normal School and the river. The new quarters are to be occupied by September 1st.

MAGNIFICENT QUARTERS

The third floor of the Inches building is being entirely remodelled. When the alterations are completed there will be several large and commodious class rooms, divided from one another by glass partitions. There will also be a separate office for the principal, Mr. W. J. Osborne, located at the right of the main stairway. The toilet rooms will be in the extension of the Inches block which faces York street. Another storey is being added to this part of the building, and doors cut through the rear walls of the latter to make the necessary connection between the two.

Campbellton expected the Dominion and provincial governments to pay the interest on their bonded indebtedness for fifteen years.

DR. PUGSLEY'S REPLY.

In response, Dr. Pugsley made the following remarks, in which he frankly stated how the dominion government stood in respect to their requests.

"There are some things which I may state to you which I feel sure will be satisfactory. As to what further we may be able to do, I will explain the situation, and can assure you that it will afford me the very greatest pleasure if I can succeed in meeting your wishes. I recognize the great calamity—an unprecedented calamity that has fallen upon one of the most prosperous towns in Canada, and whatever can reasonably be done to enable this town to resume its former prosperity will be arranged.

"I heard of your fire when I was in Winnipeg, and it was only Monday that I arrived back in Ottawa. One of the first things I had in mind was the reconstruction of our public buildings and the reconstruction of the station and shops in connection with the Intercolonial railway. I at once saw the deputy minister of railways, who is the chairman of the board of management, and I learned that there had been an expression of opinion by some of the members of the board of management that in the interest of the railway it might be desirable to make the divisional point at some other place than Campbellton in order to even up the length of divisions.

"I thought it would be a very great mistake to change the divisional point and I pointed out the advantages of the position of this town; that there were vested interests here which had grown up, and that it would be a very great injustice to the people if any change would take place, and I mentioned that Mr. Reid would not stand for that a single moment.

"After some consultations the deputy minister told me that they would fix upon Campbellton as the divisional point, and he authorized me to say that in a public way to the people of Campbellton. I find that there are 75 shop men in Campbellton there are 72 engine men who make their headquarters; 185 trainmen who pass through here; 50 station and track men totaling 382. Of these, 98 had their homes here, so you will realize that this is a very important matter for Campbellton.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS TO BE REBUILT AT ONCE. "In regard to the money required

MODERN IMPROVEMENTS

Hardwood floors are to be laid throughout all that part of the building which is to be occupied by the Business College. Steel ceilings are also to be used. The walls of the college premises will be finished in burlap.

VENTILATION AND HEATING

Particular attention has been devoted to the heating and ventilation of the new premises, both being particularly important in connection with schools or similar establishments. The ventilation of the new premises will be by two chimneys which are to be used no longer as chimneys. Summer and winter ventilators are to be installed. The Business College will have its own heating apparatus. A combined hot water and hot-air system is to be used and it is calculated to keep the temperature comfortable at all times. Electric lights are to be installed throughout the rooms.

RECORD OF INSTITUTION

In the past the Fredericton Business College has achieved a position in the forefront of the business-teaching institutions of Canada. It will no doubt continue to advance under the direction of its present energetic principal and with the further advantage of being located in magnificent quarters. The school on account of being situated in the educational centre of the Province of New Brunswick has an advantage possessed by none other.

for the building of shops, I took the matter up yesterday at a meeting of the council, at which the prime minister was, of course, unable to be present, but a very full meeting of the council authorized me to say that they would approve of the issue of a governor general's warrant for the purpose of engaging almost immediately upon the reconstruction of the railway station and shops. The deputy minister told me that within a very few weeks the work of reconstruction would be commenced.

"In regard to the reconstruction of the post office and custom office, a governor general's warrant will be issued for the construction of a handsome building, suitable not only to what the town had been in the past, but what I believe it will be again.

"In regard to the necessity of engaging upon facilities for business in your harbor, the accommodation is not sufficient. At the last session I asked for an appropriation for an additional wharf, and I instructed the resident engineer to prepare plans immediately.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT'S POSITION.

"In regard to the question laid before me by Judge McLatchy in which he has asked on your behalf that the federal government should make a contribution to enable you to tide over the present crisis. Some time ago when the fire occurred at Fernie the federal government came to the conclusion that while they might properly aid in the case of disasters outside Canada, in the case of fires occurring in the cities and towns within the country, that was a matter which ought rather to be attended to by provincial and municipal authorities and by private subscriptions.

"It is not long since the town of Fernie, situated in the Rockies, was completely destroyed. The federal Continued on page 5.



The Coming East End.



French Fort Cove Bridge.

Five years ago when the above bridge and the new street leading there to were opened at the eastern extremity of our town, some optimistic persons predicted that the newly opened district would, owing to the splendid view, fresh air and bathing facilities become a popular residential section. But he would have been deemed an optimist indeed if not something worse who would then have predicted that in five short years there would be docks and shipping plant costing \$100,000 for shipping New Brunswick's Iron Ore at one end of the bridge and a bustling industry in the shape of a lumber mill, with planers, lath and shingle machines as well as plant for manufacture of the lumber, and wharf accommodation for the largest seagoing ships at the other.

The Canadian Iron Corporation (Limited) are about completing a spur line from the Intercolonial Railway to a point just west of the above bridge, which is the eastern limit of the town of Newcastle. The wharves, mooring piers and shipping plant at the river will be all complete for the shipping of Iron Ore from the great Drummond iron mines of Gloucester County. To form any idea of the structure it is necessary to view it. We took occasion to visit the works on 1st inst., and were courteously received and shown

around by D. W. B. Reid of Reid & Archibald, contractors who are in charge of the work, D. R. Keddy his forman and A. B. Gould, resident engineer. We will endeavor to give our readers some idea of the structure. A trussel 600 feet in length ranging from 20 ft. to sixty-five, with frame of hard pine, built upon concrete and rock bed foundation, will carry the cars high enough to allow of the ore being dropped into hoppers or pockets. There are three hundred feet of these, 20 in all having a capacity of 10,000. Each pocket is filled with a gate at the bottom through which the ore passes into carriers which convey it to an immense storage pocket which are lined with 2 inch spruce covered with 3 inch hardwood on the wharf from which it is conveyed to the ships in shoots. Nature has done its share for the place, as the high cliff provide a large part of the necessary elevation required for passing of the ore from pocket to carriers and carriers to storage pocket and again from storage to the ships. The wharf, which is only 120 feet from the bank to shipping front has 40 ft. of water at low tide and is eight feet above high water. It has a frontage of 120 feet and a mooring pier 40 feet square at the bottom latted to 20 ft. at top, is being placed a short distance above and below the

wharf. The cost of wharf and mooring piers are estimated at \$25,000 and the tressels pockets and carrying track shoots &c. at \$75,000.00. An average of 40 men have been at work since Jan. 1st. One cannot look at this immense structure, with its complicated arrangement and frame work which being impressed with the strength and perfection of the work and the value of handicraft or without being filled with admiration for the intelligence, skill and knowledge of the engineer who places every bolt screw tenon and brace in such mechanical order that each binds and supports the other to perform the duties for which all are intended. We congratulate Mr. Gould on the excellence of the work and the corporation in securing contractors of the standing of Messrs. Reid and Archibald who keep such men to keep all their work right. We understand Messrs. Reid and Archibald are carrying on three other contracts this year, a similar one to this at Port Wade, Annapolis county for shipping the Torribrook Iron Ore, a set of Bridge approaches on the Metapedia, and associated with others are building 10 miles of railway in Cape Breton.

D. J. BUCKLEY'S ENTERPRISE
At the opposite end of the bridge D. J. Buckley, under the firm name of J. D. & D. J. Buckley

has erected a large Lumber mill, which will be running in about 10 days. Mr. Buckley has also built a wharf 120 feet long having 40 feet of water at shipping front. He has probably one of the best mill sites on the Miramichi as he owns both sides of the cove which boomed as it is at the mouth forms a safe haven for an immense quantity of logs. He has taken advantage of the high bank also, which will when all is complete permit of his lumber going to piles on the wharf or even aboard ship by gravitation. The mill is on the right bank and the logs will go up on an endless chain. The mill is fitted with Rotary edgers, trimmers, bolters, lath machines and will shortly have added a shingle mill dry house planers &c; and is a most promising enterprise. The building so far as it has gone, with its splendid frame concrete and stone foundations, boiler house &c. convey the impression of permanency.

We wish Mr. Buckley every success in his undertaking.

government was asked for aid but no aid was given. Later on the city of Three Rivers was almost totally destroyed. The government was appealed to in that case but refused aid, and in that case the government of Quebec guaranteed bonds and interest to the extent of \$400,000. The town of Burke's Falls in Ontario was also destroyed but no aid was given. Under these circumstances I do not feel today that I could make any promise to you.

"I want to be frank with you and to point out the difficulty, but it has occurred to me, and I brought the matter before the council at Ottawa, and urged upon my colleagues that possibly in view of Campbellton being a most important town on the Intercolonial it was possible that a different view might be taken. In the absence of the prime minister I am not able to say whether a difference in principle could be established in the case of Campbellton.

"What I would rather suggest to you would be this, that you see what the provincial government is willing to do and I would be most happy to meet with my colleagues, at once, those who are in Ottawa, and if it is at all possible to meet your views I can assure you that nothing in the world would give me greater happiness. The hearts of the government go out to you in your terrible calamity and if it is possible to get over the precedent established, the government will be only too happy to ask parliament to meet your







SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any mail over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empt from six months in each of six years, from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.


