Local and Provincial

Campbellton Heroes in Casualty List

Wednesday's casualty list reports John Branson, Campbellton, 22nd Battalion, killed in action; and C. Fairley, Campbellton, 15th Battalion, wounded.

51 Wounded Soldiers Home

Forty-one wounded soldiers landed at St. John on Thursday. Private George Wilson, St. John, of the 1st Contingent, was the only N. B. man.

Recruiting on Grandmanan

Fourteen recruits left for Grandmanan last week to join the 115th Battalion in St. John. These recruits followed Col. Guthrie's tour of the island.

Another Scott Act Inspector Dismissed

In the recent Charlotte County Council, the Scott Act Inspector for Campbellton Parish was dismissed, and L. P. Simpson, J. P., appointed in his place. Dissatisfaction over the enforcement of the Act led to the change.

Aid to Agricultural Colleges and Schools

The grants under the agricultural instruction act being supplemental to the grants from provincial and other sources make many things possible that otherwise would be considered impracticable by reason of the expense involved. In particular are they valuable in the prosecution of the higher education in agriculture.

Lobsters Scarce

Southern New Brunswick and Nova Scotia lobster handlers state that the crustaceans are scarce and high. They have considerable difficulty in filling orders and are obliged to pay the fishermen 32 cents per pound. About 15,000 lobsters were shipped from Yarmouth last week. Earlier in the season fishermen in both provinces lost many of their traps in storms, and many of the men abandoned the industry for the season. Lobsters are also scarce and high in Maine.

The Fish Market

St. John reports a scarcity of all kinds of fish during the past few days, retailers saying that they have experienced some difficulty in filling orders. Prices have increased in most lines of fresh fish, cleaned haddock and cod selling as high as 10c per pound. Smelt brought 15c, 18c; halibut, 18c; mackerel, 30c, each. Gaspareaux, now coming in more freely, sold at 8c. Clams were 25c per quart, oysters from 80c to \$1.25. There have been no important changes in the prices of dried fish. Lobsters are now almost unobtainable. Retailers state that trade has been fair during the week under the conditions existing.

The following has been received by Mrs. Ullock of Chatham Head, the mother of Pte. Percy Ullock of the 26th:

Pebbles Court, Holy Port, Berks, England Jan. 7, 1916.

Mrs. Ullock. I visited the Canadian Hospital at Tapton, Bucks, today, and saw your son, Pte. Percy Ullock, of the 26th Canadian. He was wheeling himself in the open air in a chair, and we had some talk. He said he was having good recovery, and I thought he looked fairly well for a wounded man or perhaps I should say ailing, as I did not hear what exactly ailed him.

You will like to know he is having the best of care in a beautiful mountain hospital. He arranged to write to me. I am not likely to see him again, as I am leaving this part of the country shortly, but I thought you would like to know your brave boy is having every care. We Home Britons feel very grateful to Canadians for coming so far to help us from the Hun. God help and comfort you in your anxiety and send your salutations by safe home to you. I can sympathize with your anxiety, as my only child, an officer in the King's Own Scottish Borderers, is recovering now.
