The regular monthly meeting of the town council was held in the Police Magistrate's office, on Thursday Sept. 18th 1919, at eight o'clock p. m.

Minutes of meeting of Aug. 21st were read and confirmed.

A letter from the Sec'y of the National Conference on Moral Education, Winnipeg, was read and on motion of Ald. Russell, seconded by Ald. MacKay the same was received and ordered filed. A letter from Mr. H. C. Niven was read in which he complained of damage being done to his property by water from the highway. On motion of Ald. Crocker, seconded by Ald. Jeffrey this communication was received and referred to Public Works Committee.

It was moved by Ald. Durick, seconded by Ald. Crocker and carried, that the council meet in committee of the whole after adjournment to consider power matters. On motion the council adjourned.

## Weekly Agricultural Report

Fredericton, N. B. September 17, 1919.

Extremely unfavorable weather for harvesting the grain crop prevails all over the province. Not over twenty-five per cent of the grain crop is harvested and under cover. The remainder is either cut and lying on the ground or remains uncut. In many cases the uncut grain is getting over-ripe and is lodging badly. This will make it very difficult to harvest and there will be considerable loss. The grain that is cut, in many cases, is becoming very badly weathered. Taking everything into consideration, conditions are bad, in so far as the grain crop is concerned, and it would appear that there will be a considerable loss in the crop.

Reports of blight and rot from many sections of the province are received. It would, however, appear that this was confined to a fairly small area, not being general over the province. Where the crop is affected, the potatoes are rotting quite rapidly. Potato digging is quite general and the crop reports indicate yields well up to the average in most districts.

Rains have caused a good after-growth on meadows. This is supplying good pastures for livestock. Cattle are reported to be in good condition. Milk production is falling off rapidly, as is to be expected at this season of the year. Moncton reports the retail price of milk in the city going up from 13c to 15c per quart, with butter retailing at 60c. Sheep and lambs have been sold by the farmers at Charlottetown. This was a cooperative shipment.

## Top-Dressing Timothy With Fertilizers

A series of field plants were subjected to a cropping rotation of timothy three years, corn, clover, and wheat each one year. Fertilizers or farm manure were applied to the timothy but not to any of the grain crops, different applications being used on different plants. The experiment has been conducted for nine

The results show that fertilization of the soil for timothy increases its productiveness for succeeding crops. The greatest benefit was derived by the corn crop which, immediately followed the timothy.

Tabulations of the financial gains demonstrate that the use of fairly large applications of fertilizers was profitable, resulting in as much as \$65 per acre net gain for the six years and giving a return of \$1.67 for every dollar invested in the fertilizer.

## Potato Machinery Is Valuable

New Brunswick potato growing sections should equip themselves with necessary potato machinery. Much greater accuracy in planting can be obtained by the use of suitable machinery as can better application of fertilizers. Better cultivation and spraying machinery is absolutely necessary in order to protect the crop from both deadly disease and destructive insects. Much time and hard labor is saved by good digging machinery. For storage, potato houses that protect the stock from frost are highly desirable. It is best to control the heat of the potato store-house so that the stored stock will not begin growth early in the spring. The climate of the storage house should be cool, but not dry.

## Fourteen Ways In Which To Avoid Influenza

The New York Association for the Improving of the Condition of the Poor is making wide steps in warning the persons coming within its lines of work against the allowing of any neglect of hygienic or health rules owing to the word that has been sent out to the effect, that a return of the influenza epidemic is imminent. Regulations that should be followed by persons living in cramped quarters or in sections of the city where cleanliness is arrived at only with difficulty, have been sent to all families coming within this organization's jurisdiction.

The health suggestions were distributed yesterday among the 1200 New York families being cared for by the association. Nurses, dieticians and persons interested in the work yesterday helped to carry the circulars throughout the sections where such assistance is needed. Following is a list of the instructions printed on the circulars:—

- Obey all regulations of the City Health authorities.
- Avoid crowds.
- Stay away from any one having a cough or cold.
- Drink plenty of fresh water.
- Keep the home well ventilated and be sure there is plenty of fresh air day and night.
- Sleep with the windows open.
- Avoid fatigue and get plenty of rest in particular, avoid fatigue of the stomach and excessive eating of unsuitable foods. Sleep is one of the most important things and the thing that is most neglected.
- Be as much as possible in the open air and walk to your work if practicable.
- Eat three uniform meals a day and avoid a breakfast of mere coffee and a mere piece of cake or something of the kind for lunch. Special precautions should be taken against gorging at dinner time, when the stomach is least able to cope with the largest meal of the day and which practice is bound to lower the resistance of the system.
- Keep warm and keep dry; wrapping up the neck or exposing the neck and arms unduly are undesirable in the changing weather of the autumn.
- Bathe frequently. The skin is part of the breathing system of the body and must be aired.
- Exercise regularly, both in the open and indoors if possible.
- Avoid the common drinking cup or glass.
- If you feel sick or have a cold coming on, go to bed. Call the doctor. Stay in bed until the doctor says you can get up, and don't receive callers or visitors until the doctor says that danger of infection is passed.
- Above all things try and keep cheerful.



**Maritime Board of Trade Meeting**

Moncton, N. B., Sept. 17—The Maritime Board of Trade, which has been dormant for the past four years on account of the war, opened its annual session here this morning, with E. A. McCurdy, president, of Newcastle, in the chair, and about thirty delegates in attendance. At the afternoon and evening sessions the number of delegates had increased to about fifty. The keynote of practically all the resolutions and addresses at today's sessions was neglect of the Maritime Provinces by the Federal Government both past and present, and what are the provinces going to do together. In the past, all the speakers contended, the Maritime Provinces had never received their rights.

President McCurdy, in the course of an informal address emphasized the importance of establishing provincial Boards of Trade to be backed up by the Maritime Board in securing for the Maritime Provinces their share of the business which is being offered to Canada by the opening up of foreign markets. Secretary Thomas Williams submitted a report revising the work of the Board. At the afternoon session Mayor Price, on behalf of the City Council, welcomed the delegates to Moncton.

Unit system of management needed for the Canadian National Railways was the first subject taken up in the afternoon. The matter was placed before the meeting in the form of a resolution moved by Capt. J. E. Masters and seconded by Frank E. Denison.

Among those who discussed the resolution were M. E. Agar, of St. John; N. Rattenbury, Charlottetown; A. H. Saunders, Halifax; J. L. Ryan, Bathurst; H. J. Hoban, Amherst; all supported the resolution.

Mr. Hogan declared five upper provinces had stolen the heritage from the maritime provinces for fifty years. He claimed the spirit of Confederation had been violated by charges wrote by C. N. R. management. The resolution was unanimously adopted.

R. E. Armstrong of St. John moved and A. H. Saunders of Halifax seconded the following resolutions:

That this Maritime Board of Trade recognizing the extreme relations such as the national ports of the Maritime Provinces bear to the progress and prosperity of Canada as a whole and appreciating the urgent need for their early recommendation to the government side and affectionate lines would earnestly recommend to the government of Canada of the necessity of expediting the development and equipment of these ports so that the fullest possible use might be made of them in forwarding the ocean trade of Canada while at the same time the development made hastened if other strategically situated maritime ports which must ultimately share overseas traffic from the Dominion.

Be it further resolved that this board would urge upon the business men

of Canada the importance from a commercial and national standpoint of utilizing to the fullest possible extent the ports of the Maritime Provinces in preference to foreign ports thereby adding to the wealth and efficiency of the nation's ocean outlets and at the same time aiding in the development of Canada as a world power.

This was adopted unanimously. Mr. Lodge, Moncton, moved a resolution recommending that a more thorough geological survey of the Maritime Provinces be made, giving the provinces their proportionate share of the work of this department.

Seconded by F. W. Sumner and carried. Standardization of the P. E. I. Division of Canadian National Railways throughout at the earliest possible moment.

The securing of another car ferry steamer to supplement the present car ferry steamer between Borden and Tormentine were resolutions moved by P. E. I. delegates and adopted.

The placing of S. S. Northumberland which is now idle in Charlottetown, on the Charlottetown, Halifax Pictou route.

**Evening Session.**

At this evening's session a resolution favoring closer relations with the British West Indies and British Guiana was moved by E. A. Reilly, seconded by Mr. Lodge, of Moncton.

The resolution recommended that the Canadian Government appoint a commission to consider the question of closer relations with the country referred to by E. A. Saunders, Halifax; R. E. Armstrong, St. John, and N. Rattenbury, Charlottetown, supported the resolution, which passed unanimously.

Better transportation facilities, including water and rail, for the Maritime Provinces was taken up by Mr. D. U. Bien, Sydney, who moved a resolution recommending that further facilities be provided in railway and terminal equipment to meet the growing needs of the country.

Mr. McLean, of North Sydney, seconded the resolution, which was adopted, after it was endorsed by J. O. Hyndman, Charlottetown; Agent General F. W. Sumner, H. J. Hogan, J. H. Smiley, Amherst, and others.

H. J. Hogan, Amherst, moved a resolution on Maritime Union, requesting the various Maritime Governments to call at an early date a convention to discuss the feasibility of such a union.

J. L. Ryan, of Bathurst, seconded the resolution, which was discussed by R. E. Armstrong, Hon. C. W. Robinson, J. O. Hyndman, M. Lodge, J. E. Masters, and adopted.

The delegates to the annual meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade were tendered a banquet on Wednesday night in the new Hotel Brunswick. The banquet which took place at the close of the Wednesday evening session, was a most enjoyable and successful affair.

The guests sat down to a splendid repast at about eleven o'clock. The large and beautiful dining room of the hotel was set with tables nicely decorated, and the repast was indeed a sumptuous one, reflecting a great deal of credit on the management and staff of the hotel.

There were many words of appreciation from the visitors regarding the thoughtfulness and hospitality of Moncton citizens in providing the banquet.

Moncton, N. B., Sept. 18—The closing session of the twenty-first annual convention of the Maritime Board of Trade was held this morning in the City Hall here and the delegates who remained in the city were entertained to an automobile drive around Moncton and suburbs this afternoon.

A resolution moved by H. J. Logan, K. C. Amherst, and seconded by J. L. Ryan, Bathurst, favoring union of the Maritime Provinces was unanimously adopted.

Amherst was chosen as the next place of meeting. An invitation was also received from St. John, but as the board had met this year in New Brunswick it was decided to meet next year in Nova Scotia.

**Officers Elected**

Officers were elected as follows: President, H. J. Logan, Amherst; first vice-president, Miles E. Agar, St. John; second vice-president, J. O.

Hyndeman, Charlottetown; executive, James T. Burchell, Sydney; J. E. Masters, Moncton; E. A. McCurdy, Newcastle; Leltoy Holman, Summerside; secretary-treasurer, Thomas Williams, Moncton.

The report of the treasurer showed the finances of the board to be in a satisfactory condition.

The following finance committee was appointed: Thomas Williams, E. A. McCurdy, C. W. Robinson and Matthew Lodge.

The salary of the secretary-treasurer was fixed at \$200 per year.

The carrying out of resolutions passed during the convention was left in the hands of the executive assisted when necessary by members of local boards.

Resolutions were also passed thanking the retiring president and secretary-treasurer for their work. Also to the Moncton board for the splendid banquet and entertainment afforded the visitors.

This afternoon the delegates were given an automobile drive around the city and suburbs.



## Will The "Flu" Return

The United States Public Health Service, after asking the question, "Will the 'Flu' return?", gives out the following statement:

Probably, but by no means certainly, there will be a recurrence of the influenza epidemic this year.

Indications are, that should it occur, it will not be as severe as the pandemic of the previous winter.

City officials, state and city boards of health, should be prepared in the event of a recurrence.

The fact that a previous attack brings immunity in a certain percentage of cases should allay fear on the part of those afflicted in the previous epidemic.

Influenza is spread by direct and indirect contact.

It is not yet certain that the germ has been isolated, or discovered, and as a consequence there is yet no positive preventive, except the enforcement of rigid rules of sanitation and the avoidance of personal contact.

A close relation between the influenza pandemic and the constantly increasing pneumonia mortality rate prior to the fall of 1918 is recognized.

It is now believed that the disease fits pretty widely disseminated throughout the country before it was recognized in its epidemic state. This failure to recognize the early cases appears to have largely been due to the fact that every interest was then centred on the war.



**Why The Dollar Is Worth Less**

(Montreal Herald)

Most people have an idea what "watering stock" means. That there is such a thing as "watering" money is not generally known. Many are familiar with the jargon of the economists hear that one of the causes of the high cost of living is the inflation of currency. They do not know exactly what it means, but realize that it is something unhealthy, like enlargement of the heart, or the "Flu". They hope that currency will get better as soon as possible. Getting more of the currency is a panacea that does not seem to cure.

There is a lot more of what we call money in the country, without change-few years ago. This includes notes and bank deposits. But there is no increase of the things that people want to buy or hire, such as houses, food clothing. By doubling the amount of money in the country, without changing the quantity of goods, people may have twice as much money as they had before and be no better off. They cannot buy any more than they could before, because there will be no more to buy. Thus prices will go up, and an article which formerly cost \$1 may cost \$2. Money is only the yardstick for measuring the relative value of goods. Lengthening the stick does not increase the amount of goods to be measured.

How did this ailment, this inflation with which our currency is afflicted, come about? All nations during the war issued bonds far in excess of the amount of the people's savings. The money that the governments collected was borrowed. Each country's future ability to pay was capitalized and became part of the money system of the country. Thus the money supply was greatly increased and prices went up accordingly. The dollar will not buy as much as it would five years ago.

What governments are trying to do is to find out if certain people are not concealing the facts about the quantity of goods, and thus making the purchasing power of the dollar even less than it should be. With the strictest honesty high prices in a measure will continue. Economy, buying in one's own country every thing possible, and production to the very utmost can increase the power of the dollar.

Everything which curtails production will increase prices, make money of less value, no matter how much more of it you may get. Interfering with means of transportation goods or material, or the facility of getting workers to and from their employment, are ways of reducing production just as much as shutting down places of production. The more this interference takes place, and the more effective it is, the more is the value of the dollar kept down, and high prices in all things kept up. This is a point that we should never lose track of, or carelessly ignore.



**Ocean Limited Mail Car Robbed**

Quebec, Sept. 18.—A bold robbery by which a silver consignment of \$75,000 was robbed from the mail car of the Ocean Limited train on the C.N.R. near Harlake Que. early today was committed by five masked bandits who held up the mail clerks, gagged and bound them hand and foot and went through the mail and jumped off the train when it pulled into St. Thomas, Montmagny. The money had been shipped from Montreal yesterday evening and was consigned to Halifax. It seems the bandits came originally from Montreal and followed the shipment all the way down, riding in a passenger coach.

The mail clerks, when found at St. Thomas De Montmagny, were suffering from having been tied up. They lost no time in reporting the robbery and the wires were made hot with orders for the organization of posses that have been scouring the countryside since but so far no trace of the highwaymen have been found.

The Ocean Limited does not stop at the small stations after leaving Levis and the first stop is made at Harlake Junction where the engineer and train crew have to get orders from the despatcher before proceeding eastward. At Harlake the train barely had pulled out, according to the mail clerks' foreman, when the back door of the mail car was crashed in and the five masked men, pointing automatics into the faces of the mail clerks shouted the dramatic and business like "hands up".

The bandits quickly bound and gagged the mail clerks, then made a dash to the very bags containing the money. All this while the train was madly racing the tracks at a sixty mile per hour clip. The Ocean Limited train is the fastest of the Intercolonial service.

It is supposed they had a motor car hidden in the bush back of the station with a confederate waiting for them ready to make their escape.

No one noticed anything wrong on the train at St. Thomas and it was only at L'Islet, the next stop, that the conductor of the train, passing on the platform of the station, noticed an extraordinary quiet in the mail car and rapped on the door. No one answered and he got suspicious and found the side doors locked. He rushed to the back door of the car and found it split and open. The five clerks piled up on empty mail bags quickly told him the full tale and all got busy. One of the clerks had to be taken to Quebec. He is E. Reno, he is suffering from nervous shock after his experience.

"It is a lucky thing that the robbery was committed this morning instead of any other day, for on some days, the car used to carry sometimes upwards of \$200,000 in money while today was a small day in money shipments.

The money stolen was not sent in for the soldiers' pay but by various banks for their small town branches where the money was to be paid out this week-end for the employees' pay of the week.

Two Quebec banks alone had \$51,000 in the lot. This money is not lost by the banks but by the insurance companies.
