Rector of the Parish Right Rev. James Charles McDonald, Bishop of Charlottetown, attended by a large concourse of clergy and people, laid the foundation stone of this church, dedicated with solemn rite to the Immaculate Virgin Mary, on 16th June, in the year of the Secular Jubilee, 1901.

Roanoke, Va., June 23.-There was a great deal of excitement and anxiety created here to-day, when it was reported that an awful flood and cloud-burst

had swept over the E khorn Coal region in West Virginia. 
