Rome, Nov. 2 .- It is still uncer tain whether Propaganda will con sider at an early meeting the apto say, early in December. Meanwhile, Vox Urbis has been asked by more than one of the authorities here in Rome to say a word about some of the very discreditable inci dents to which the subject has given rise. It appears that a Catholic paper published in the East has been occupying itself largely with the appointment in a Roman "correspendence" — or a correspondence dated Rome, which is not always quite the same thing. The writer is a master of the art of vilification and he expends all his energy in heaping disrespect and opprobrium on a member of the hierarchy, wh is supposed to be "in the running" for the important office. He and hi friends are evidently; the enemies of the prelate in question, and they themselves, or others for them, have taken pains to place the ribald stuff under the eves of several of the ecclesiastical authorities of Rome. Anybody who knows anything abou Rome and its ways would be able to tell them that they have adopted one of the best methods for attracting sympathy here to the prelate in question.
