The first rescuing party reached the working section of the mine and found the bodies scat tered about the floor badly muti lated by the explosion, though the men were probably suffocated by explosion. Twenty-five bodies al but two horribly mutilated, and a number of dismembered bodie were taken from the mine Sunday night, the day after the explosion occured. The death list will reach 138 men. Returning Prosperity.

It is most satisfactory to note the evidence on every hand of a steady. and progressive revival of industrial prosperity, especially in Canada. During the past week nearly every city in Canada showed a pronoposed advance in bank clearings. The only exceptions were Hamilton and London. In the other cities the advances ran from 12 to 47 per cent.

Bank dep sits are also going ap During October money on deposit increased nearly \$2,000,000, while savings deposits increased nearly \$4.500,000. Banknote circulation for October showed an increase of \$6,800,000 over the previous mouth of September. The tendency of the banks to meet the demands of ite. proved trade conditions is indicated by an increase of \$3,300,000 in current and call loans.
