this place, addressed to Mr. Stanton of the Commissariat department, we learn the painful intelligence that the steamer Com nerce, which left Montreal on Monday, with a detachment of the 23rd Regiment for London—was run into by the steamer Despatch, McSwaine, master, from Port Stanley and bound for Buffalo. The collision took place some time during the night of the 6th inst., at the mouth of the Grand River, Port Maitland. The Commerce was laden with the men and baggage of the 23rd Regiment, and it appears sunk immediately after the collision. As pear as can be as-certained, the loss of life numbers 38, and confined to the soldiers who had not time to save themselves on account of the rapidity with which the vessel sunk after the colli-sion.
