A great general strike projected by the socialists of Belgium in support of a universal suffrage amendment to the Constitution. The railway, postal and telephone services, mines, docks, arsenals, factories, workshops of all kinds are to be involved in what the promoters contend will be a bloodless campaign. Arrangements are completed to send forty thousand children to temporary homes in the north of France on the declaration of the strike. The thoughtfulness of the socialist leaders who are engineering this movement is evidenced on all sides. All extra evidenced on all sides.
