



The Other Side of the Medal.

Of a certain great man very much in the public eye just now, a popular periodical recently used an apt French phrase. It said that he had "les défauts des qualités" which, as the general reader has already that he had the guessed, means defects that go naturally with his peculiar qualities.

This great man is pre-eminently a "doer," and according to this analysis of his character, he has the precipitancy and indiscretion which are the complementary defects of that character.

Now as to whether this particular man has the qualities and defects mentioned, I am not going to try to guess. You see, I've given my solemn word to the Editor to keep out of politics. But the reason I've been telling you about him is just this. I want to call your attention to the value of that French phrase.

Do you realize that almost all of us have "les défauts des qualités"? We have, you know. And in judging or blaming or analyzing our family or our friends, and especially I think, our children, we should certainly take account of this.

And yet how seldom we do!

For instance, a child is quick to learn, eager and impulsive; we praise these qualities. But he is also the inevitable complement, rash and impulsive, and probably quick tempered. We blame him for these tendencies.

and wonder where on earth they came from. They are nothing but other manifestations of the qualities we praise.

I know a young woman who, all through her childhood and girlhood, was tremendously intense, in her play, her study, her friendships, and all that she felt or did. Her mother undoubtedly knew this, and, I think, took pride in it. But when womanhood came, and the same intensity displayed itself in other ways and almost ruined the girl's life, the mother could not see where she got such a passionate disposition. [If the corner of the French phrase will permit I'd like to twist it a bit, and say that we also have the qualities of our defects.]

For instance, a friend of mine supplied a piece of information which a group of people wanted. "How did you ever find that out?" they inquired. "How?" she answered. "Because I wanted to know and asked. That's the way with you people—you laugh at me because I go around asking questions, but you are glad enough to share my knowledge when you want to know anything." You see she had the quality of her defect—if you may call curiosity a defect; I don't, but some people do—the fund of knowledge that went with her inquiring mind.

Good and bad are often only two names for different phases of the same thing.

And if you will use this point of view as a key, I think you will find it easier to understand folks' characters, your own included.

Fads and
Fashions.

Very pretty canvas and voile dresses in white and biscuit color are embroidered with wool. Some of these are done in a darned stitch, some in thick padded embroidery, while others have the appearance of old Berlin wool work done on canvas. The effect is excellent and bizarre, bright shades being used.

Afternoon frocks of foulard have a tunic made in white fllet, reaching below the knee, open at the side and fastened with buttons on the shoulders. Round the waist is a ribbon or white silk elastic belt with an antique clasp. This turns a morning or simple dress into one suitable for the afternoon.

One-sided effects are a feature of the fall costumes. There is no brilliancy of material. One side of a costume will be entirely different from the other. A revers here and opposite a line of buttons; a cascade of lace will be added on one part, while the corresponding portion will be adjusted draped panels.

Many of the smartest mantles have the one-sided effect so much seen

in the new dresses. A broad band of crinoline slung over one shoulder appears to hold up the cavalier cloak-fashioned drape of dark seal-colored plush on a straight band collar effect across the shoulders, compressed of sable or chinchilla, is also pretty.

All sleeves show a long sloping shoulder. This is noticed in both day and evening costumes. The full bishop sleeve falls from a piping half-way down the armhole and is caught at the wrist by a bracelet of color or velvet, while other sleeves are full at the elbow and finish in a long tight-fitting mitten cuff sleeve, almost hiding the hand.

The most favored trimmings for evening gowns are heavily encrusted with brilliants. The contrast of rhinestones on a black net is new and makes a charming trimming on a black-and-white evening gown. Spangled nets are in evidence, jet being foremost, and the beaded and embroidered tunic has wonderful possibilities of transforming a gown.

The use of contrasting fur is shown in nearly all the separate coats of fur. Chinchilla squirrel is a novelty that is being used for trimming sealskin coats. The long coats have the cutaway line at the lower edge. Linings are very beautiful. Some of the fur coats are lined with a soft velvet, others with brocade or heavy plain satins in rich colorings.

There is a great deal of tulle being used in the form of scarfs, shawls, draperies, sleeves and gimpes. Metalized tulle are very much favored, and there are certain wraps for evening which take the place of scarfs that are entirely of tulle. Whenever it is possible, use tulle instead of chiffon.

There are many new attractions for piece goods for millinery purposes. The changeable plush is iridescent in effect and can be made up with pipings of short taffeta which harmonizes with the plush. Another item is burnished plush. It is of silk effect, with a sheen more bright than that of batten's plush, which is used on many of the fall hats. Then there is the Egyptian mohair plush, which has the silk ground and is in striped effects; also there is the Roman stripe plush, bringing out all the Durbar colors. A new silk ratine is to be seen, made up into quillings and edged with soutache braid; it forms a new trimming.

**MORRIS'S
DUPLICITY.**

On Friday last we exposed the du-
plicity of Sir Edward Morris in regard
to the Crane-Dubois prosecution, and
yesterday we showed up his inconsis-
tent attitude in the matter of taxa-
tion. After he left the Liberal Govern-
ment Sir Edward accused Sir Robert
Lytton of increasing taxation and set
the accusation forth as a reason why the
Liberal Government should be de-
feated. A few months before he left the
Government he was lauding the Govern-
ment in the House of Assembly for
reducing the taxation \$250,000, spend-
ing \$300,000 in increased grants for
education, lighthouses, coast service,
etc., and assigned the prosperity of our
country to the development policy and
the Bond Government.

To-day we direct attention to the
duplicity of Sir Edward Morris in re-
gard to what the Tories have dubbed
the Secret Letter. It is an old chest-
nut now, but the Tories bring it out
to serve a turn every now and again.
They made great play with it at the
last election. It was used also as a
reason why Bond should be defeated.
This is how it was used in one of
the pamphlets widely circulated by
the Morris party:—

The gravamen of the charge was
that the letter was secret and "cost the
Colony a million and a quarter dol-
lars, which we need not in existence."
Such was the charge made by
Morris. Here is the rebuttal of it,
made by E. P. Morris and C. H. Em-
erson in the House of Assembly in
March 9th, 1903.

E. P. Morris.—There was one state-
ment made by Mr. Watson he desired
to say a few words upon. In reference
to the Railway Arbitration, Mr. Wat-
son stated that Mr. Lyttelton, one of
the arbitrators, had, in giving his
decision, said the Colony had been
invalued about \$300,000 by a letter
written to the Colonial Secretary. He
had to some extent been connected
with the arbitration and may be con-
sidered as knowing whereof he was
talking about. He would now say
that no such statement had ever been
made, or any other words used by
Mr. Lyttelton, or any gentleman con-
nected with the arbitration, that such
an inference could be drawn. The
letter so much spoken of had no in-
fluence whatever upon the arbitra-
tors. To the man in the street and
to those who knew nothing about this
matter preposterous nonsense had
been circulated as facts. There was
nothing concealed from the people of
the Colony or the Legislature, while
as a matter of fact Mr. Robinson,
while Colonial Secretary, had received
a similar claim from Mr. Reid, but
not the claim submitted to the arbi-
trators amounting to \$2,240,000. Every
statement made was absolutely with-
out foundation and would in no way
be justified or substantial. The
award, \$800,000 was a liability that
existed if the '98 Contract had never
been amended. The letter spoken
about had nothing whatever to do with
creating this liability.

Mr. Emerson.—There was one state-
ment, however, made by the member
for Trinity that should not be allow-
ed to go unchallenged. That gentle-
man had just stated that Mr. Lyttel-
ton, the Government Arbitrator, had
said that owing to the existence of
what Mr. Watson called a secret letter
the Colony was obliged to pay
\$300,000 more than it should have
been called upon to pay had that let-
ter not been written. There was no
such thing as a secret letter. He had
been connected with that arbitration
and had attended every meeting and
could positively state that no such
words were used by Mr. Lyttelton or
by any other of the arbitrators. Mr.
Lyttelton did not make use of the
words attributed to him by the hon.
member, Mr. Watson.

C. S. S. ALL, Ontario, Sept. 23.
Two brothers named Elroy, after working together for months to perfect an electric invention which they expected would eliminate insanity, became insane simultaneously. They became violent and the countryside and township of Canabrock were held under a reign of terror for two days while the lunatics rampaged. The two unfortunates are now in Brockville asylum.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.
A cable from Aberdeen says that despite angry protests from the anti-Russian press, Foreign Minister Sazonov of Russia, Sir Edward Grey, and the Russian ambassador, Count Benckendorff, conferred with King George at Balmoral today. There is a widespread suspicion that an agreement will be reached which is calculated ultimately to involve Britain in war.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Sept. 23.
Great anxiety is felt for the safety of three sailing ships outward bound from Sydney and Newcastle. Re-insurance was made at high figures, the bark Flido, 159 days out from Sydney to Falmouth, being quoted at 5 guineas per cent, the Celtic Glen, 86 days from Newcastle to Iquique, at 20 guineas, and the Mount Carmel, 103 days from Sydney to Iquique, 10 guineas.

LONDON, Sept. 23.
The Greek ambassador at London, in an interview, declared he had no information of a formal treaty between Greece, Bulgaria and Serbia. He added, however, that he has obligations towards our brethren who are still under Turkish rule, which cannot be disregarded or evaded. In that respect there certainly exists a solidarity of interest between us.

LETHBRIDGE, Sept. 23.
The first snow storm for the season struck southern Alberta on Sunday night. At midnight the thermometer registered within one degree of freezing. Fears are entertained for the safety of the crops.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 23.
One hundred and fifty were drowned to-day on the Northern Dvina River, near Archangel as the result of a collision between two steamers.

BELFAST, Sept. 23.
The Ulster Unionist Council to-day confirmed the text of the covenant against Home Rule, to be signed by the Unionist throughout the Province on Saturday next.

SMYRNA, Sept. 23.
Fighting began to-day between Turkish troops and rebels on the Island of Samos. The rebels want the island to be annexed to Greece.

IN MEMORIAM.

In the passing of Mr. John Kennedy, Holyrood has lost another of its oldest, most respected and prominent residents. Deceased who had passed his eighty-first year, had only been a short time sick when the final summons came, and surrounded by the members of his family and fortified by the rites of Holy Religion he peacefully departed in Peace.

Wednesday morning last. The death of Mr. Kennedy removes an old landmark in the history of Holyrood, one who was well acquainted with its leading features and one who contributed largely to the upbuilding of the settlement. Intelligent and well informed and witty withal, he was regarded as one of the sages of the community and to him were often commissioned positions of trust and offices of responsibility by the Government. His funeral which was largely attended took place on Friday morning from his late home to the church where Requiem Mass was sung for the repose of his soul by Rev. J. W. Deane, and thence to the Holy Cross Cemetery where the handsome casket containing the body was reverently placed in the family plot amidst a circle of sorrowing relatives and sympathetic friends who prayed for a happy and glorious resurrection for their dear departed one. Mr. Kennedy raised a large family of six sons and one daughter. Capt. Cornelius who predeceased him; Roger J. railway inspector; Capt. Walter, of the sechr. Gertrude; Michael and Jas. foremen of construction work; Thomas, hydraulic engineer U. S. A.; and Mrs. Hickey. To his widow and sorrowing relatives we offer our sympathy. Requiescat in Pace.

If so, who? The political pendulum has swung round to Sir Robert Bond again and practically the whole electorate are longings for the time to arrive which shall see the Premier's chair again filled by his noble and dignified person. Four years ago hell itself seemed to have conspired against Sir Robert, and scraped together such an ignoble force to accomplish his diabolical purpose towards him, that, one would think even the infernal regions would be ashamed of. The unscrupulous gang appealed to the low and base propensities of the animal in man, and in a great many cases were successful, mostly through the administering of a certain artificial excitement. He was hounded down by the maddened furries, debarrred from delivering his message of truth to the people by the infernal noise set up by the rabble, and barely escaped a martyr's fate by being kicked almost lifeless in the icy, wintry sea. Strike for Universal Suffrage.

Special Evening Telegram.

BRUSSELS, To-day. A great general strike projected by the socialists of Belgium in support of a universal suffrage amendment to the Constitution. Hostilities against the Government, which has resolutely set its face against the desired legislation will begin November. Half a million workers will be involved in the strike which is proposed shall last six weeks at a cost to their funds estimated at ten million dollars. The railway, postal and telephone services, mines, docks, arsenals, factories, workshops of all kinds are to be involved in what the promoters contend will be a bloodless campaign. Women seem so earnest as men in the propaganda which reaches throughout Belgium. Arrangements are completed to send forty thousand children to temporary homes in the north of France on the declaration of the strike. The thoughtfulness of the socialist leaders who are engineering this movement is evidenced on all sides. All extra work in mines will be strictly avoided, so there shall be no accumulation of coal stored against the evil days. Similar action will be taken in factories. Workers are limiting the output strictly to quantities necessary to meet the requirements from day to day. Any attempt to depart from this rule is prevented by the workmen. The Government is making arrangements to repress any attempt at excess with an iron hand. Troops will be rushed into all industrial centres when the strike is declared.

Hurt by Bike.

Sunday night as a girl named Power of Scott Street was passing along Newtown Road near Chief Justice Horwood's gate a man riding a bike at a furious rate collided with her and knocking her down rendered her unconscious. Her forehead was laid open and her hands and arms badly cut. She was brought into the residence Mrs. Weir, near where a doctor attended her stitching the wound in her head and otherwise attending her. Unless the furious driving of motor and bikes is not soon checked there will surely be a fatality soon.

Arrest of a Town.

HEAVY RATE TO SECURE RELEASE.

Port Erin, a watering-place in the Isle of Man, was put under arrest yesterday by the coroner, acting under an order in an action against the Port Erin Commissioners.

Some years ago the commissioners agreed to purchase the "Brows," a property overlooking the bay. A new board of commissioners refused to complete the purchase, and an action was begun which resulted in execution issued for £2,250—the purchase price of the property—with interest from 1906 and costs amounting to £400.

The Towns—the Manx Parliament—gave the town permission to borrow for twenty-five years a sum sufficient to meet their obligations, but the commissioners having failed to take prompt steps to raise the money, an execution was put in yesterday. All properties, money, and rights in the rates were arrested. The execution will involve a rate of several shillings on the town.—Daily Mail

Colour Line in America.

"The American Bar Association has now proscribed coloured members, and 12,000 American lawyers are making the most sarcastic comments," says the Telegraph's New York correspondent. "Such coloured folk as now belong to the bar will not be expelled, but for the future no negroes need apply. It is pointed out that the European Bar associations do not draw the colour line, and if Black Doctors of Medicine are permitted, why not black expponents of the so-called liberal profession of the law?" In condemning the ostracism of the negro, the New York Evening Post says: "The drawing of caste lines in the Republic is both base and treacherous to the fundamental principles of democratic government." Some colored members of the association resigned on the ground that they have no wish to belong to a profession in which they are not wanted."

A Popular Complaint.

There is such a thing in every trade as profit and loss. "Stabbers" or bad payee should be followed up and hunted down. But of late a decidedly objectionable feature has crept in here and it is the selling or handing over of accounts for collection to collecting agencies, mostly foreigners who do not know our people and who do not understand local conditions. Peremptory notes bordering on the insulting are received and the people of this city will not stand for. Cases are on record where men who had been years dealing with firms which firms went into liquidation and who after leaving their hundreds of dollars in some cases thousands, have been billed for such a sum as \$1 balance which may or may not be correct, as a matter of fact which may not exist at all. These petty balances, which the average mercantile house would wipe off its books, considering many years custom are generally accompanied with pretty sharp notes demanding payment "at the point of the bayonet." The best of it is that when people are dealing for 20 or 25 years with a firm some of these small balances are fictitious and when matters are enquired into the boot is often found to be on the other foot. We have legal men here of repute and good standing who are glad to collect accounts legitimately due without either insulting or persecuting people and who will give honest people time to adjust what they know to be a correct account.

These recipes usually call for ingredients not one of which can be found at any grocery in town at the same time, and they also call for a heavy cash outlay in the direction of \$7 sugar and 30-cent eggs. After a woman has followed one of these copyrighted recipes around the kitchen with a quart measure and a stop watch, several times in succession, she will be able to blend it into real food that will not cause people to push back from the table with the air of having had enough.

A cook book contains two kinds of recipes—winter and summer. The winter recipes always call for green corn and red raspberries, garnished with cantaloupe and the fervent breath of the young onion. The only way to follow the advice of a cook book in the wintertime is to convert the garage into a hot-house and raise vegetables with steam heat.

The summer recipes are very easily assembled, as they deal principally with eggs and a mild form of blanc mange. Cook books are always long on omelettes, especially when eggs are 12 cents a dozen. They also explain the anatomy of the rhubarb pie with great minuteness, and tell how to make watermelon pickles that will not be disturbed by any of the guests more than once.

Cook books have little or no literary style and deal largely with abstract subjects, such as surfering a family of five on 89 cents a week and making a soup bone last from Sunday noon until the following Tuesday. We have read a good many cook books, merely as a matter of diversion, but never found one that could tell how to make home-made bread that would deceive anybody after the first day.
