Methodist School Report.

We thank the Rev. Dr. Curtis for a copy of the current School Report of the schools under his supervision. Dr. Curtis expresses much satisfaction at the progress education is making in Methodist schools.

As to attendance, he says:—
 "As we now have the figures of the recent Census, the proportion of pupils attending school as compared with the Methodist population may be computed with an accuracy impossible since 1902. The totals now reported place the Methodist population at 68,045; and as the enrolment of pupils during the year was 15,245, it follows that the percentage of the population attending Methodist Schools was 22.55—a showing that compares favorably with that of the most advanced countries. And this total is exclusive of those attending private schools, and of all who attend schools outside of Newfoundland. And then there must still be found along the extensive sea-board of Newfoundland quite a number of children of schoolable age who are out of reach of any school whatever. When all these things are taken into consideration, they would seem to indicate that the percentage of children attending school in the average settlement must be very creditable. Indeed, it may be safely affirmed that never was there a time in Newfoundland when interest in matters educational was so real or intense as it is to-day."

As to the work in the school, Dr. Curtis says: "And, unless the signs are very misleading, the increase in efficiency is keeping pace with the increase in other respects." He declares that the standard of efficiency is tested in two ways, (1) by the C.H.E. examinations, and (2) by inspection. The C.H.E. results show that 43.3 per cent. of the passes were won by Methodist schools; and the inspection generally bears out the findings of the C.H.E. examiners.

Another feature which gratifies the Superintendent is the increase in income from fees. On this matter, he comments thus:
 "Thus while the increase of schools

and pupils is quite considerable, the increase in fees in the public schools is even more rapid; so that while College fees may have about reached high-water mark, the income from the general schools is capable of much expansion. And the striking thing about it is that the Boards and Teachers most persistent in exacting and collecting fees, represent the schools which show the best results in attendance and literary success."

A Death-Bed Repentance.

The "Herald" last evening exposes the hypocrisy and political dishonesty of the Morris-Morrison Tory Government. It draws attention of the public to the resolution proposed by Sir Edward Morris in 1908 when he was in Opposition, to take the duty off tea and sugar. Could greater evidence be adduced of insincerity of the Tory Government in dealing with this subject of the reduction of taxation than the fact that in 1908 Morris moved for the reduction of these taxes, and that although he has been over four years in office with a large majority supporting him, he continued to exact these taxes from our people and to squander them on trips and picnics for himself and his supporters. After they have treated themselves lavishly during four years, they hope by a reduction at the last moment, to recover the confidence of the people which they had lost by their extravagances. But we can tell them the people can see through their hollow pretence and that they do not intend to permit the present gang of political hypocrites to control the finances of the country one day after next November, when they must "Bundle and Go." Mr. Kent, in the Assembly, dealt most effectively with Sir Edward Morris's insincerity in regard to the reduction of these taxes. In reply to the Premier he said:

"Why before the present Government took office, while Sir Edward Morris, the present Prime Minister, was sitting on this side of the House, where Mr. Barle, the member for Fogo, now sits, he wanted to have the duty taken off tea and sugar. It will be remembered it was only six months before this motion was made by Sir Edward Morris that he left the Government of Sir Robert Bond, and he knew exactly the financial condition of the Colony. But when he took control of the Government twelve months later, he did not carry out the proposal he then made in the House. He was then in Opposition. He is now in charge of the revenue of the Colony. The revenue increased and during his whole term of office he received these revenues and the people bore the weight of taxation. His object is too transparent—his repentance is too late. If the Prime Minister was sincere in 1908 when he brought forward these resolutions from this side of the House, then the following year when he took his place on the other side of the House, he should have carried out the object of these resolutions and not kept the people suffering during all these years."

When his sincerity was thus openly challenged in the House by Mr. Kent, he had not a word to say in defence of his conduct. After having bled the people white for over four years, he hopes by a "death-bed repentance" to hide his offenses from the people who will be his judges next fall. But it is too late, and he should remember that repentance without restitution is of no avail.

VICKSBURG, Miss., To-day.
 The first serious break in the main dykes of the Lower Mississippi Valley occurred yesterday afternoon at Woodlawn Levee, just north of May-roville, Miss. Parts of the four Mississippi countries will be flooded and the property damage which will result is estimated at more than a million dollars. Official estimates given out by the States Engineers' office is that the flood backwater has already covered 100 square miles, and that this break will overflow 1032 additional square miles, making a total of 1132 square miles affected.

LOS ANGELES, To-day.

George H. Bixby, a millionaire of Long Beach, was served with a subpoena, demanding his presence in the court on Wednesday as a witness in the case of Mrs. Kose Rosenber, alias Mrs. Emma Josephine Goodman arrested on felony charges, connected with White Slave allegations. Most important developments in a sensational case were bared by the police who declared their investigation tended to connect several wealthy citizens with alleged enslavement of 41 young girls. Mrs. Rosenber, according to the police conducted a so-called lodging house known as "Jonquil," where many young girls gathered from department stores, restaurants and other places of employment, alleged to have been lured to meet wealthy men.

WASHINGTON, To-day.

The demand for the abrogation of treaties with Britain, bearing on the Isthmian Canal rights, was presented to the Senate in a resolution by Senator Chamberlain yesterday and it brought a new element into the Canal controversy, now in progress between this country and Britain over right of States to exempt American coastwise ships from payment of tolls. Senator Gorman Chairman of the Inter-Oceanic Canal Committee which must handle Canal legislation in Senate, endorsed the principle embodied in the Chamberlain resolution. Earlier in the day the State Department of officials had expressed ignorance of Senator Chamberlain's plans to introduce the resolutions. The Chamberlain resolution would require the President to proceed at once to terminate the Hay-Pauncefote Treaty of 1910 and the Clayton-Bulwer Treaty of 1852 which it superseded. In a statement Senator Chamberlain said the treaties and records would show that the States never planned to give Britain such a treaty as would justify the protests that country has made. Gorman said Senator Chamberlain's resolution is a more concrete statement of the position I took in last session, that if Hay-Pauncefote Treaty justifies Britain making a protest now before our Government, then it would be well if means could be found to abrogate the treaty. The new Anglo situation caused much discussion in official circles during the day and brought out many endorsements of the proposals. Gorman declared that before the close of the session, he believed, the resolution would pass by a large majority, if it came to a vote. A meeting of the Inter-Oceanic Canal Committee has been called for but it was postponed until next Tuesday.

G. O. M. of French Shorthand Dead.

The death has taken place at St. Seny, Alsace, at the age of 80, of M. Emile Duploye, the "Grand Old Man" of French shorthand. The first edition of the Duployan system was published in 1860, and the system in time became the almost universal one in France. To-day there is a library of 400 different books in Duployan characters, a larger number than that of all other systems combined. The system also boasts the largest number of foreign adaptations, having been adapted to over twenty languages. The English version, Steno-Duployan, has made substantial progress in the English-speaking world.

WASHINGTON, To-Day.
 News of the determination of the legislative leaders of Sacramento to frame and pass an Alien Landowners' Bill, directly discriminating against Japanese, was unofficially conveyed to the White House State Department, and was received with great concern and disappointment. Such developments had not been expected in view of the first favorable comments in California upon the President's suggestion that regard be had for the preservation of friendly relations between this country and oriental nations. Without exact knowledge of the form the discrimination will take in the new Bill, officials here assume it will resemble the so-called Assembly Measure which proposed a bar from holdings of persons ineligible to citizenship, which covers only Chinese and Japanese. The administration is not at the end of its resources, and will continue its efforts to ameliorate the harsh features projected in the legislation until the measure is beyond the reach of amendment in that direction. While the President has his message to Governor Johnson transmitted through Secretary Bryan, he recognized the right of the people of California to legislate according to their judgment on the subject of land tenure. He is also under the obligation of guarding against encroachments by State legislation upon the part of the field of international relations, reserved by the Constitution to the National Government.

Running Short of Provisions.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—Owing to the prevailing ice which has blocked the harbors for four consecutive weeks, we were shut off from communication and many of the places were running short of provisions. But to contradict a statement which was lately rumored around, about the people starving here and the menacing of a person for something to eat, I beg to tell the publisher that it is false. As regards the people surrounding him, the statement was made from the writer borrowing a tub of butter from his wife during his absence as the stores here were out of the article referred to at that time, and the possibility of getting it from any other place was practically beyond my reach owing to ice blockades. The people here were far from starving and could have held out for a fortnight or three weeks longer. I shall warn the writer to keep a silent tongue in future, if not he will find himself up against iron bars. Thanks to Providence we have been blessed with a N.E. wind which has freed most of the harbors and given us a chance of getting our mails, etc., once more. Indeed the gloomy circumstances of many of our small places were very sad and looked as if starvation would be the result. The winter stocks were almost exhausted, and before the spring stocks could be secured, the ice became so impact that the chances of getting anything was impossible. The s.s. Susu has paid us another visit which is the first since the 14th of March. Although the ice has hampered the mail service somewhat of late, yet we are impressed with the idea that the steamer could have got around before if the captain felt inclined to gratify the people's wishes. We do not give Capt. Horwood much credit for causing us such long delays, because he could do a much better work in this line if only he would impress upon himself that he is the people's servant and not the Government's. Capt. Horwood is indeed a very obliging man, yet he requires more ability and earnestness in his work. There is an old saying that "an ounce of ability with a pound of earnestness will accomplish a great deal more than a pound of ability and an ounce of earnestness," and I believe it. Let us hope that Capt. Horwood will see this in a clear light, and give us better satisfaction in the future than he has done in the past.

The S. S. Eagle, Capt. E. Bishop, towing the S. S. Ranger, Capt. Kneel, arrived in port shortly after last midnight. The former reports for 18,000 seals, 5,000 of which are old, and the Ranger hauls for 2,500 bedlamers. Capt. Bishop reports that he was into the whitecoats on March 14th and 17th. Out of the two patches he got 13,000. No more young harps were taken. The Eagle then steamed away in quest of the old ones and met with fair success. On Friday last, April 18th, the Eagle came alongside the Ranger and Capt. Kneel reported his ship to be crippled and unmanageable, she having her main shaft broken. While towing the hawsers broke three times, latterly off Wesleyville, as reported yesterday.

The Ranger was in company with the Kite in the early part of the voyage jammed until the young harps took to the water. Capt. Kneel spoke to the Kite on April 6th. The Kite has 900 old seals and her prospects are bright. The Diana, Bloodhound and Erik were seen but their catches not reported. It is likely all three vessels will see the close of the voyage.

Fishery News.

The Board of Trade yesterday had a letter from Mr. T. Soper, of Channel, dated the 12th inst., saying that 1,871 qtls. of codfish had been caught there to that date while the previous week 615 qtls. were landed. At Connaigre Bay the catch was 681 qtls. and for the week ended before the letter was sent 80 qtls. Scarcity of bait and the presence of ice prevented better work being done.

A Cry From La Scie.

Editor Evening Telegram.
 Dear Mr. Editor,—Kindly allow me a short space in your most esteemed paper to say a few words from this silent part of the globe. We never see much in public print from La Scie, but I think, Mr. Editor, the time has come when we, the people of La Scie, should be recognized as an industrious, hard-working people. If you would take a walk around La Scie harbor and see the number of motor boats that are building, and watch our people working early and late, you would be convinced what I say is true. There are eight new motor boats building here this winter, to be added to the four used here last year, making the number up to twelve motor boats, which will be used at the fishery in La Scie the coming summer. These motor boats or motor engines have not come too soon, for they are the fisherman's comfort. Our people have toiled hard in the past, working at the fishery night and day and helping to build up the revenue of their country.

La Scie has four denominations, each with a good church of their own, also one Superior School and an Orange Hall, with not a Government school to be found. There is some kind of a bale box attached to a dwelling house that was used when the Frenchmen carried on the fishery here. This is the place the Magistrate has to hold court in, which is just about fit for a family of mice to hold their play in. If a Government official or Sir Edward Morris would happen to fall into this bale box he would get the biggest surprise he ever got in his life. This is where our Magistrate has to summon people. I am sure he (Sir Edward) must be ashamed that his Government has not done more for the public of La Scie and given him a decent building to hold His Majesty's court in, and also a post office decent enough to go into. In this bale box there is just about room enough for the Magistrate, the plaintiff and the defendant. Then they have to sit like Chinese policemen to give themselves room. Just fancy British subjects sitting in His Majesty's court with their feet under their bodies to rest themselves on, not even a chair or a stool to sit on, while the Sheriff stands out in the door looking on. Such is the condition of affairs in La Scie. It is a disgrace to the Government and an injustice to the population of La Scie and the public at large. We hope before long to have a public building erected suitable for both purposes. We, the people of La Scie, would ask the Inspector General of Police to remove Constable Walsh of Tilt Cove to La Scie, as he is badly needed at this place.

Mr. J. H. Parsons, our teacher, and the assistant, Miss G. Short are having a concert to-night in aid of the new school, the proceeds of which will go towards seating the school. We wish them a good collection.
 I may say the Orangemen held their 7th anniversary here on April 10th, leaving their hall at 10.30 a.m. with the Orange Young Britons in the front of the ranks they marched to the Methodist Church, where Paul Master gave them an address they will not soon forget, taking as his subject "Ye are a chosen people that should shine as lights unto the world," 1st Epistle

Household Notes.

A cake should be iced before it is quite cold.

Charcoal powder is excellent for cleaning fine knives.

Use vinegar to remove the ink from lac table tops.

Lemon for afternoon tea should be cut just as it is used.

A sheet of heavy cardboard is desirable to cool hot cakes upon.

A special knife should always be kept for onions, bread and hot fat.

In whipping cream, add the white of one egg to every cupful of cream.

Never blacken a kitchen stove; wash it every day with clean soap and water.

Brush a pie over with sweet milk before baking if you would have it shiny and brown.

In The Old Days Of Telegraphy.

BY H. F. SHORTIS.

Like everything else that is moving in these progressive days, the mode of telegraphy, and the appliances connected therewith have, within the past thirty years, undergone almost a complete revolution. What was considered a wonder thirty-five years ago, is now obsolete, and looked upon in the light of present progress as something unwieldy and unmanageable. In my early days of telegraphy, the old system of the tape was in use, by which dots and dashes were marked upon the tape, and this was looked upon as a stupendous achievement of scientific research. This, in time, was abolished to give place to the system of sound, and what was in vogue in the old New York, Newfoundland and London Telegraph Company is still in practice in the inland telegraph offices of this country to-day. The former system was what was known as the early Morse, which only permitted the transmission of one message at a time over a single wire; but, in the seventies of the past century, an entirely new system was inaugurated between Plaster Cove and Heart's Content, whereby a message could be transmitted and received at one and the same time over the same line. This is known as the duplex system and was invented by Mr. Starnes. I can barely recollect when a single wire connected St. John's and Harbour Grace, and the insulators which were in use at that time would to-day, in the light of modern improvements, be looked upon as a curiosity. They were large and unwieldy, and when placed along and under the eaves of the houses in the town of Harbour Grace. Various improvements were, from time to time, substituted, until the invention of the present compact and useful glass insulators, which are now considered to be

The Best Non-Conductors

of electricity. The construction of the old New York, Newfoundland and London Telegraph was a source of remunerative employment for our people. In those days we had that lanky race of men, capable of great endurance, and in numerous places along the line, between St. John's and Cape Ray, much of the work originally performed by the masons and labourers of that day is in an excellent state of preservation—and remains an enduring monument to the skill and ability of those who performed it. Few of the old-time operators and repairers are alive to-day—they have given place to a new generation; but as a representative of departed telegraph repairers of by-gone days there still remains William Tobin, Thomas Foley and, it may be, one or two more. The telegraphers have been scattered over the face of the earth, and many of the veterans of the old Western Line have attained high positions in Canada and the United States. Although at times subjected to great privations and hardships the repairers along the line in former years had their monotonous tasks interspersed with intervals of pleasure and always supplemented their annual salaries by means of shooting, trapping or fishing. A spirit of emulation was amongst these men, and they often vied with each other in conquering dangers and hardships. They have often been known (more especially Wm. Tobin) to swim or wade rivers in the most inclement season of the year, and these dangers were overcome fearlessly and without apparent after-effect. As I pen these lines the figure of A. M. Mackay, who was the life and soul of all these achievements, stands alone, after nearly half a century of continuous devotion to duty. To him, no matter how people view the wonderful improvements which have taken place in telegraphy in Newfoundland, belongs the praise of pushing them to their present position. A man of untiring energy to duty, he persistently worked on, until from a single line of communication between St. John's and Harbour Grace, he witnessed nearly every important town in the country connected with the Metropolis; and, not alone the two hemispheres, but the entire civilized globe

Encircled by the Electric Belt.

Be it distinctly understood that I do not wish, for one moment, to derogate from the merits of Glasborne, Cyrus W. Field or the late illustrious Bishop Mullock, who were the conceivers and advocates of submarine communication, but I speak of Mr. Mackay, as being one of our own, and, who coming to our shores in his boyhood days, and upon whose shoulders devolved the serious responsibility of giving practical shape to the theories and ideas of the gentlemen mentioned above, remained at his post amongst us, and ended his days in Newfoundland. In the early days of telegraphy in Newfoundland much dissatisfaction prevailed through want of knowledge by our people with regard to this wonderful invention. The most inconceivable stories were afloat with regard to the dangers in connection with the wires, and the people natu-

ally believed many of them. This was carried to such an extent that in some instances serious damage was done to the Company's property. Stories somehow got about that the wires would cause spontaneous combustion, and were, at any moment, liable to set fire to places in the vicinity through which they passed, and for a time a reign of fear prevailed. Our people, with that natural intelligence for which they are proverbial, soon began to take a common-sense and practical view of the matter, and applying the light of reason to the new wonder, they soon discovered that the electric telegraph was the servant and not the master of man. In this connection, it may be well to say, that they had, in these early days, a decided objection to having the wires and insulators placed anywhere near their dwellings, and where such was the case, the wires were often found cut and the insulators destroyed. Be it understood that this was not done in a malicious or vindictive spirit—the ruling cause of the people being, what they looked upon to be a

Spirit of Self-Preservation.

It may not be out of place for me to recount one or two little incidents of rather a ludicrous nature, which were the outcome of the imperfect knowledge of my own townies in the outports. In the sixties one of the leading butchers of Harbour Grace purchased eighteen or twenty head of cattle in St. John's, and had them driven around the bay by one or two men, arriving at their destination early in the morning. As usual, quite a number of people from neighbouring villages were early astir on the look-out for a job, and, of course, men were much interested at the appearance of such a large herd of horned cattle on the street. An old Irish gentleman, who kept a shop nearby, and who possessed a more than ordinary amount of the keen humour of his race, immediately perceived a rare chance to exercise his super-abundance of wit.

"Begob, Mr. W.—, but that telegraph is a great invention. How long did ye say the bastes were coming over the wires from St. John's?"

The butcher, taking in the situation, replied: "Only about five or six minutes; but they'd do it quicker only for that big black bull got obstreperous and put the rest in a tangle on the wires. But the next crowd will come over quicker to-morrow."

The livelies who were standing within hearing distance cocked their aricular appendages, and one of them acting as spokesman, addressed the crowd in a hoarse whisper:

"Good Lord, Garge, do ye 'ear dat? It's the dell's own invention, and dare be no luck or grace in the country since the dell's work ha' ben started. I votes to keep 'em down,"—and the crowd dispersed with grim determination depicted upon their visages. The next morning the poles were cut, lines

broken and the telegraph communication between St. John's and Harbour Grace was entirely interrupted for several hours.

Upon another occasion a lanky individual from a distant outport came into the telegraph office to send a message, and after very hard work on the part of the operator to grapple with what the lanky fellow had to say, the message was written, paid for, and as a personal favor the sender wished to see the message so, just for the "curiosity of the thing," so that he could have to say when he went home that he had that great privilege. He started darting round, asking questions, and would be satisfied with nothing else but the liberty of placing the telegraph form on the relay to watch it going. In those days the main battery, of which there were fourteen or fifteen cups, was composed of sulphuric acid in a certain quantity which acted on the zincs, etc., and produced a very strong current. The operator was bound to be even with the curious individual, and disconnecting the two battery wires from the main line, handed him one of them, and told him to hold on. He did so, and in a fever of curiosity and expectation kept his eyes riveted upon the written paper. The operator then told him to catch hold of the other wire. Great Scott! the poor mortal commenced to twist and turn, shake and shiver, and ere twenty seconds had passed the operator was even more frightened than the victim, because he thought he had actually gone too far with the joke. The operator was up to his work and pulled the wires from the poor fellow's grasp, and

Years passed on, and one day, when the same operator was on duty, the lanky individual of former days appeared in the office in the flesh— hale and hearty. ere afore, dere was a 'miscellaneous' young dell of a feller like ye, old with no whiskers, dat almost shook I out of me boots—darn 'im. But I'll be even w' 'im if I lay me grapple irons on 'im." It is needless to say that our lanky friend did not put forth a request to view the curiosity of the telegraph again.

Launching of S. S. "Kyle".

Special to Evening Telegram.
NEWCASTLE-ON-TYNE, Eng., April 22.

On Monday, the 7th Inst., the R.M.S. "KYLE", which is being built and engine'd at the Neptune Works of Swan, Hunter, & Wigham Richardson Ltd., Wallsend-on-Tyne, to the order of the Reid Newfoundland Co. of St. John's, Newfoundland, was successfully launched. The steamer is intended for the mail & passenger service between Newfoundland and Labrador coast and is exceptionally strong ly constructed for running through the lee which she will frequently meet on service. She is 220 ft. in length by 32 ft. beam and will be rigged as a two masted schooner. She is to be fitted with accommodation amidship for 68 first-class passengers, including dining saloon with seating accommodation for 32 ladies' room, smoking room, etc., and there will be a good promenade deck for the passengers use. All there is to be accommodation for second-class passengers, 102 men and 40 women, and there are two hospitals, one for men and one for women in a deckhouse above. There will be a complete installation of electric light including search light, efficient arrangement of steam heating, suitable for the climate, and wireless telegraphy will also be fitted. The steamer will be propelled by a single screw triple expansion engines, working under Howden's forced draught, and the steamer is expected to attain a speed of 13 knots per hour.

The naming ceremony was gracefully performed by Mrs. R. G. Reid, wife of one of the managing directors of the Reid Newfoundland Co., who was also present at the launch.
