

Telling of His Majesty's Personal At tendants on State Occasions.

The King's body guard consists of the Honorable Corps of Gentlem en-'at' Arms and the Yeomen of the Guard. Membership of the former is limited to ex-officers, but retired sefgants are eligible as Yeomen of the Guard.

The Gentlemen-at-Arms were established in the year 1509, and were originally known as "Gentlemen Pensioners." The qualifications for oining the corps are long and disnguished service in the Regular Army or Marines and the possession of at least one War medal. At present the number of members is forty-five two of whom have won the Victoria Cross. The full dress uniform is of scarlet, with facings of blue velvet.

The Gentlemen-at-Arms and Yeomen of the Guard have the privilege of being in personal attendance upon the severeign at the opening of Parliament and other state occasions.

Since the time of Guy Fawkes, noreover, a special duty of the latter body has been to search the vaults of Westminister Palace in order to guard against "gunpowder, treason,

Members of the Yeoman of the Guard live in their own houses, but they have an orderly room at St. James' Palace, as well as a room adjoining it where their uniforms are kent. Each man draws the Pension of his previous army rank, with ar

extra \$250 to \$375 a year. Another body of ex-soldiers are the wardens of the Tower established in 1509. These men, who are commonly known as "Beef-eaters," are often confused with the Yeomen of the Guard, since they wear a very similar uniform. They are howeven an entirely distinct corps.

Scotland also furnishes the sove reign with a Lody guard. This is the Royal Company of Archers. They were first raised in 1676. The corps is comprised almost entirely of Scotish noblemen, and among its members are the Duke of Buccleugh and Queensbury, Duke of Roxburgh, the Marquis of Breadalbane, Earl of Aberdeen. The corps is composed of veteran officers, and to be appointed to it a candidate must be under 73 years of age, a member of the Church of England, and "a gentleman brought to necessity." If single, a candidate must have a private income of \$250 and if married an extra \$125 for every person dependent upon him. At present the number of Military Knights, is seventeen.



Review of the Year Great Financial Stress.

FINANCIAL STRINGENCY.

Among the oustanding features of the year which closes to-day were the close of the first Balkan War, the outbreak of a second Balkan War between the victorious members of the allies and the stringency which followed and which it is hoped will take a turn for the better with the coming of the new year. The year 1913 was one of the worst years ever known in the London Stock Exchange. The Balkan War led to a hoarding of money throughout Europe and at the same time there was a great demand for new capital for government and commercial enterprises. Gilt edge securities fell, and among them British Consols fell in June to 721/2, and established a new low record for Consols. Colonial Government stock fell, and Canadian Municipal borrowings received a decided check. Many issues of Colonial Governments and Colonial cities were received coolly by investors and the loan issues were failures. We notice that Mr. G. W Farrell, stock broker, on his return to Montreal, stated that there was a general expectation of money in abundance after the turn of the year, and that the rates would be a good deal lower than those prevailing at pres-

Altogether 348,000 men were either killed or wounded, and the money losses were £245,800,000 sterling. Bulgaria was the heaviest loser. Her war bill came up to £90,000,000 sterling and her casualty list of killed and wounded to 140,000. After the debacle of Bulgaria the London Times commented thus: "Less than a month ago Bulgaria stood at the zenith of her military fame. If her star now sets for a time, we must attribute her disasters to their right cause -namely, unprincipled and impudent diplomacy.'

THE IRISH QUESTION.

At home the question of Home Rule holds the centre of interest. The present Home Rule Bill has now been passed in two successive sessions by the House of Commons and rejected by the House of Lords. Under the Parliament Act, its passage by the House of Commons at the next session, which opens in a few weeks, even if it is rejected thereafter by the House of Lords, will put it in a position to receive the assent of His Majesty the King. There is thus nothing so far as Parliamentary action is concerned which is likely to militate against the bill becoming law. But there is a strong disposition among moderate men of all parties to find a way to secure the passage of a Home Rule bill by general consent, particularly in view of the militant attitude of many of the opponents of the present bid in Ulster, who are led by Sir Edward Carson. Lord Loreburn suggested some time ago the desirability of a conference between the Government and the leaders of the Opposition. The chief incident of his first year of office was the carrying out of the Democratic's Party's pledge to effect a sweeping reduction in the tariff. This was effected in the Underwood - Simmons Tariff Act, which is now in force and which is of chief interest to Newfoundland because it places fish on the free list. TRADE CONDITIONS GOOD.

One of the notable features of the year was the buoyancy of the fall trade. A principal head of one of the largest of our retail establishments told us that he had never known such a brisk and encouraging fall trade in any year before when the fishery had been short. There seemed to be quite an abundance of cash and a disposition to spend money. This is no doubt due to the remunerative returns obtained for fish and fishery products and the abundance of employment. The shortage in the Newfoundland fishery coincided with a shortage in other fish producing countries and with the free entry of fish to the United States. At the same time merchants have seen the wisdom of having some few agents in fish buying countries, and the fishermen of the North have bound themselves together in a strong organization to get the best they can for what they take out of the sea. All these factors have contributed largely to make the fishery remunerative to ergy and heroism of the rescuers, reaped much benefit from it as well as the fishermen and laborers.

FISHERY CHANGING.

A perusal of our advertising columns throughout the year indicates one great change which is coming over the fishery. Motor engine firms are competing with one another to place the advantages of their engines before fishermen. They clearly find that fishermen are turning their attention to motor engines to propel their boats, and they find the business with them profitable. Fishermen with motor boats can reach grounds they were unable to reach before without an excessive amount of toil and a large consumption of time. Fishermen without motor boats find themselves handicapped, and they are doing their best to equip themselves with them. There can be no doubt that in a short time the Newfoundland fishermen will see to it that they are as well furnished in this matter as their Norwegian rivals.

Another change is to be seen in the decay of the supply system. The St. John's merchants are not supplying on anything like the scale they used to do, and fishermen are gradually finding themselves able in a greater degree each succeeding year to deal more and more on a cash basis. This gives the fisherman a greater chance of obtaining more and more out of their catch. It stimulates them to greater efforts to save the voyage even when fish is not plentiful, and it lessens the risk of the merchants and ensures better returns for the voyage generally. The organization of fishermen and the reluctance of merchants to give supplies both tend in the same direction and assist to put the year's fishery venture on a safer footing.

THE GRAND FALL INDUSTRY. Steady development has gone on at Grand Falls, but unfortunately it has not yet been found possible to declare a dividend on the ordinary shares of £1,178,353 share capital. A grave question in reference to the tariff is involved. and that question is whether it would be better to allow material required for the mills either on a lower tariff or continue a state of affairs which makes it highly improbable that no other firm will make a venture in paper making in Newfoundland while a well equipped plant like Grand Falls is unable to declare a dividend. It is a matter which merits strict enquiry at the hands of the Government.

THE F. P. U.

During the year the F. P. U. has continued to grow and is now extending its Councils to the West. The Fishermen's Advocate in its comments on the closing of the year 1913 states that during the year 3,000 members were added to the roll: about 47 Councils established; twenty Union stores were opened, and about \$70,000 added to the capital invested in companies connected with the Union. "To-day the membership exceeds 18,000; the Councils number 200; and the Trading Company's capital is nearing \$100,000, while the F. P. U. funds are about \$10,000. although during the year a large expenditure was incurred chiefly in connection with the elections."

The Supreme Council had a highly successful series of meetings in the city early this month and transacted considerable business, part of which pertained to the Union and part was of interest to all the community at

ELECTION YEAR.

This year has been Election Year, and its advent was indicated at the session of the Assembly by the placing on the Free List of sugar and other articles of common consumption, and the aftermath has already been exhibited in a considerable shortage of revenue. The General Elections gave rise to much unnecessary heat and were disfigured by reprehensible tactics which added to the friction common to election times. The Government supported the party

The advent of the election brought those supporting the Fishermen's Protective Union in coalition with the Liberal Party, under the leadership of Sir Robert Bond, to oppose the Government party under Sir Edward Morris. The Opposition Party, however, were not successful in capturing sufficient seats to oust the Government, though they succeeded in capturing a plurality of votes and the majority of the electors. This has caused many to begin to think that it is time that the inequalities of the electoral districts. due to the shifting of population and immigration and emigration, should be rectified. One of the marked features of the Opposition campaign was the capture of the District of Bonavista by Mr. Coaker and his colleagues. Another was the extraordinary majority piled up by Sir Robert Bond and his colleagues in the Twillingate District. Two of the Ministers of the Crown were defeated and an extraordinary situation has ensued. These Ministers have been kept in office and up to the time of writing no indication has been afforded by the Government as to the course they intend to pursue in regard to these defeats. The Governor has been approached on the matter by the Sitpreme Council of the F. P. U., and in reply His Excellency intimated he intended to ask the Prime Minister what his intentions were in the premises, and there the matter rests for the present. 




