

Ottawa, une 2—That \$2.64 unfair profit was made on 560 bags of granulated sugar, and more than 2,000 when the 40 bags of brown sugar are included, was stated by Commissioner Murdock at the conclusion of this morning's hearing into the alleged unfair profits taken by speculators on two cars of sugar purchased by the two cars of sugar purchased by the Ottawa wholesale firm of Provost and Allard from Robert Anderson of Montreal, and through H. B. Marshall, an

Ottawa broker.

O'Connor, acting chairman during the hearing of the sugar investigation, stated that sugar at 30 cents a pound was not justifiable, and that the Board would take every means of preventing this practice. Mr. O'Connor practically predicted a drop in the price of sugar when he said he did not believe it was in the best interests of the consumers to fix the price of sugar, as the consumers would probably benefit more by the Board allowing the price to fluctuate.

They were rescued by Shamrock Shows A fisherman, while endeavouring to save a dwelling, had his clothes burned and was saved from burning to death by rescuers throwing him into the water

FOUR MEN MISSING. It is estimated that the loss to one settlement is fifty thousand dollars The Government is rushing relief food and clothing to the scene. A special train last night reported four men missing, supposed to have been suffocated, but this was not confirmed up to midnight. Telegraph communication to the settlement has been in terrupted, poles having been burns down, and minor losses are reported

from other sections. The following losses were reported last night: Twenty dwellings, twentytwo outhouses, twelve fishing stages two lumber mills, all adjacent to the sea coast and along the railway line The fires originated from sparks from locomotives. Complete and accurate particulars are difficult to obtain yet.

London, June 3 .- The Daily Chroncle publishes a special interview with General Smuts at Cape Town in which he reiterates that the war transformed the dominions into sister states.

"Unfortunately the old machinery still remains," added the General, "and it is astonishing that statesmen have not yet realized the anachronism. T have insisted on a constitutional change in the Empire, and I am also stonished that others have not been equally impressed with its inevitability. The British people must realize this great constitutional fact that there must be a complete equality and freedom enjoyed by the sister states and united by the King. Your constitutional problem is to find new formulas to fit new conditions."

PARIS, June 8. REPATRIATES GREETED.

TRIESTE, June 8. Six thousand Czecho Slovaks, repatriated from Vladivostok, arrived here yesterday, on the U.S.S. "American," by way of Panama. The "American" was received enthusiastically, great crowds greeting the first contingents repatriated from Siberia.

GERMAN CONSUL SUICIDES.

LONDON, June 8. Herr Wustrow, German Consul at Tabriz, Persia, committed suicide, according to a despatch from Teheran, while the Consulate was being besieged by a crowd demanding the surrender of Persian Bolsheviks, who, it was alleged, were being harbored in the building. When the crowd appeared the Consul refused to comply with the request and sharp fighting then ensued, in which machine gups bance Wustrow committed suicide.

BRITISH AGREE, FRENCH OPPOSE.

LONDON, June 8. The belief that the British Government is about to make, if it has not already made, postal arrangements with Soviet Russia through Gregory Krassin, Bolsheviki Minister of Trade and Commerce, is expressed by the London Times, The arrangement, the newspaper understands, will be opposed by the French Government on the ground that it implies recognition of the Soviet administration.

ANTI-JEWISH CAMPAIGN.

VIENNA, June 8. Posters of aviolent anti-Semitic character appeared all over the city on Sunday. One series requested Gentiles to join leagues for the elimination of Jews from business and official life and of the expulsion of non-Austrian Jews. Other posters, signed by the German Officers Association, demand that the army be freed

BOLSHEVIKS MURDER JAPS.

HONOLULU, June 8. The Japanese War Office has announced that, according to Russian witnesses, several hundred Japanese, including women and children, were murdered at Nicolaevsk, Siberia, by Bolsheviki on March 12, and no Japanese had been left alive in the town, according to Tokio advices to the Nippu Juji, Japanese newspaper here. The small Japanese garrison, commanded by Major Miyake, defended their Consulate for five days, but finding themselves greatly outnumbered they burned the buildings with the documents it contained, and committer suicide, the despatch adds.





Thrilling Sea Story.

The four-masted sailing vessel Speedonia, with 1,000,000 gallons of oil on board, was towed into Lorenzo Marquez on Tuesday night, May 18, her arrival marking the termination of one of the most thrilling and dramatic episodes that have occurred in African waters for many years. She is a steel-built vessel of 3283 tons, owned by the Imperial Oil Company, and was outward bound from Singapore to Cape Town, when on March 19 two explosions occurred in the after part of the sbip, followed by a fire which swept the vessel from stem to stern, wrecking the poop and destroying all the stores, spare sails, and nautical instruments. Practical-

ly the whole of the inflammable cargo vas carried below the steel deck. In fighting the fire Captain R. W. Deeks broke a leg and dislocated a thigh, and four other men were badly injured, whilst the wireless operaor jumped overboard and was not seen again. Apparently the captain considered the vessel was doomed, as he, with the second and third officers, a European seaman, and 23 of the Chinese crew, launched three boats and left the ship. They have not

heard of since. The first officer, J. H. Henderson, a young seaman named Strays, and 26 of the Chinese and Malay crew stuck to the ship and succeeded in extinguishing the fire. The sails that were set had been burned to shreds, and the explosion had smashed the rudder, rendering the ship quite unmanageable.

The crew suffered great hardships. as for nearly a month all they had to live on was a little uncooked tinned food and water impregnated with oil.-Glasgow Weekly Herald.

Modern Pirate Gang.

Reminiscent of the exploits of Captain Kidd, an amazing story of piracy on the high seas comes from Constantinople. The steamer, which belongs to the French Paquet Company (Marseilles), left Batoum with a full complement of passengers. There was, it appears, some little excitement on the quay at the moment of departure, to which, however, there ceemed no special reason to attach importance.

While the passengers were still seated at dinner a series of revolver shots rang out. A band of twentyfive masked men at once shepherded all the passengers into the saloon, and a regular sack of the ship ensued. Not once, but again and again, the cabins and persons of everyone on board were ruthlessly searched, and everything worth taking was collected by the pirates, who did not hesitate to strip children to examine their clothing. The gang of marauders of course were unrecognizable, but they spoke Russian, Turkish and Greek. They assumed control of the ship for about five hours, directing her course towards the shore close to Atina, and when within a short distance of the coast ordered the captain to lower boats, in which they escaped in safety, leaving the terrorized passengers little besides such clothing as they did not think it worth while to take away.

Mr. James Wood, a Y.M.C.A. worker from Glasgow, says that the robers showed great courtesy to the passengers. They returned all the Don roubles, saying that they only wanted real money, and had a committee of experts aboard to pass judgment on jewels suspected of be-ing imitations. — Glasgow Weekly The Best by Test-




