GRECO-ITALIAN AFFAIR CLOSED.
The Greco-Italian affair, so far as the Inter-Allied Council of Ambassadors is concerned, when that body decided that fifty million lire be deposited by Greece in the Bank of Switzerland, as security for the indemnity which should be paid to Italy. The payment was ordered as a penalty for Greek intransigence in searching for the assassins of Italian Boundary Mission chief, Janina, the slaying of which brought about the Italian-Greco crisis and the subsequent occupation of Corfu Island by Italy. The Ambassadors upheld their decision that in view of Greece's action in fulfilling the terms laid down by the Council, including the payment of indemnity, saluting the Allied fleet at Phaleron, and rendering honors to bodies of slain Commissioners, Italy was in duty bound to evacuate Corfu. It was announced that this evacuation was already begun and would be completed to-morrow.
PRECAUTIONARY MEASURES TAKEN IN BAVARIA.
MUNICH, Sept. 26.
Dr. Von Kahr former Premier, was to-night appointed General Commissioner for Bavaria, with full power to proclaim any exceptional state, and adopt any other military or police measures to protect Munich against insurrection from reactionary or radical sources. The appointment follows upon the action of Hitler Guards or other so-called patriotic Leagues, who are calling for a general review on Friday. This official action is viewed as purely a local precautionary measure and is in no wise aimed at the central government. The rumor that exceptional state has been proclaimed, is officially denied.

MARTIAL LAW IN BAVARIA. PARIS, Sept. 26. Martial law has been proclaimed in Bavaria, according to late advices from Berlin, and former Premier Von Kahr has been appointed General Commissioner of the state. Dr. Von Kahr has issued a proclamation announcing he will take action against all acts of hostility to the country and against any resistance to his orders, by every means at his disposal.

NINE VILLAGES DESTROYED BY EARTHQUAKE.

ALLAHABAD, British India, Sept. 26. Nine villages were totally destroyed and twenty-two partially destroyed by earthquakes which shook the vicinity of Buland, Persia, last Thursday, says a message from Meshap, Northeastern Persia. The shock caused the death of one hundred and fifty-seven persons and injured one hundred and forty-six.

ELECTED CHAIRMAN OF TRADES UNION COUNCIL.

LONDON, Sept. 26. Miss Margaret Bondfield, well known leader among women workers, was to-day elected chairman of the General Council of the Trades Union Congress for the ensuing year. She is the first woman to hold this post, which is the most important in the Trades Union movement in Great Britain.

Discoverer of Insulin Has New Rejuvenator.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—It is reported here that Dr. Banting, discoverer of insulin, the diabetes remedy, also has discovered a new "rejuvenation" technique. He is said to have told some of his friends here on his recent visit to this country. It is declared to be a distinct departure from the monkey gland method hitherto used in rejuvenation cases.

Railway Officials Return

OPERATIONS ALONG RAILWAY PROGRESSING FAVORABLY.

Mr. H. J. Russell, Manager Government Railway, with Messrs. F. Pittman, General Passenger Agent, W. F. Joyce, Engineer, and Ernest Taylor, Freight Agent, who were on a tour of inspection at the respective divisions along the railway since Wednesday last, returning to the city Tuesday morning. Mr. Russell and his assistants covered every inch of the railway between here and Port aux Basques, and report that the line operations all over are working most satisfactorily. The road bed which has been a source of much trouble in the past has been re-conditioned. The heavy congested traffic which has accumulated during the past two months has given the road a good test, and not a single run-off accident has occurred, whilst all trains are running on regular schedule and without losing very much time. The winter supply of coal is now being forwarded from North Sydney to the sections at Lewisporte and Clarendville. The road masters at the respective divisions were interviewed in connection with the handling of freight. A system has been inaugurated whereby there will be no further delays, and all freight trains will be pushed forward in the future as rapidly as possible. The trains are now running over the first diversion from the main line between Howley and Grand Lake. Another four miles of new track will complete the job. The old track at Sandy Pond Crossing is now flooded out, and the water in this section is rising gradually at about one inch per day.



Our Milk Supply.

Police Court cases in which the defendant is a milk vendor are not often heard in St. John's.

One dishonest milkman covering as he does a considerable section of the city in his round is a menace not only to his customers, but to those other vendors who take every precaution in the matter of cleanliness and who pride themselves upon the purity and the quality of their milk.

We have in the city a Child Welfare Association, a band of voluntary workers, who are trying in every way to improve the physique of our infant population, to assist those who are suffering from malnutrition and by their efforts they are succeeding in reducing the death rate among children.

However much good their efforts may achieve, a plentiful supply of pure wholesome milk can do more; further, their work of years can be undermined in a short time by an impure or adulterated substitution. The dishonest milkman is in the same category as the shopkeeper who sells his customer underweight, with this difference that his action affects for the most part defenceless children.

We are paying for milk at the rate of twenty cents a quart, a price which makes it prohibitive for the poor, and considerably reduces the consumption in the families who are in better circumstances.

In view of these circumstances, we call attention to the warning issued by the presiding Judge in the Magistrate's Court yesterday, and trust that it will have a salutary effect.

Much Ado About Nothing.

The Advocate asserts that the opinions of the Evening Telegram count for nothing. Nothing therefore was the cause of its wrath and violent language on Monday. Nothing prompted it to cover half of its Editorial page yesterday. In fact it wholly disproves the theory that out of nothing, nothing comes.

Dr. Hanson's Visit to the City.

Last night at the Presbyterian Hall the first of a series of services was held in preparation for Dr. Hanson's visit. The minister took as his study "Revelation in the Bible, their nature and manifestation." Special prayer was offered for Dr. Hanson, the people of the Kirk and community. October 14th will commence the week of special services, there will be the teaching services each morning of the week and the evening services will be of a more general nature. Serious Shooting Accident.

As a result of a gunning accident which occurred shortly after 7 a.m. today, Mr. Archibald Wiseman, foreman at Bartlett's Tinsmiths, had to have his left arm amputated. Board of Trade Favor Flour Mill Project.

After a debate lasting nearly one hour and a half and in which quite a number of speakers took part the Newfoundland Board of Trade at a meeting this forenoon expressed itself in favor of the proposed flour mills by the passing of the following resolution: "The Board of Trade in general meeting do hereby recommend that the proposed flour mill project be supported and that only duty on wheat and not sales tax be remitted. A rider to this resolution was adopted stating that it was the general opinion of the meeting that St. John's would provide the most suitable site. The proposition was made by Capt. A. Kean and seconded by Hon. W. J. Ellis. Mr. Palmer the promoter of the flour mills was present by request and answered to the satisfaction of everyone the many questions put to him. Regarding the employment he stated that there would be about 90 employees in the mill with 80 to 85 coopers, and 3 to 400 men in the woods annually. The packages he said would be made from spruce fir and birch regarding the feasibility of the project he thought that was a matter for the promoters. They were asking no subsidy from the Government and will pay the usual sales tax. They, however, required that the proposition be ratified by the Government. The site he stated had not been decided upon. The plans called for a half million bushel mill and the full plant would cost \$250,000. Port Union he said was not considered for a site nor had the Hon. W. P. Cosker anything to do with the proposal. The principal speaker at the meeting, Capt. A. Kean, replied at considerable length to all the objections raised at yesterday's meeting, quoting from the report in the Telegram of yesterday's meeting he demolished the arguments put forward by the opponents of the project. He thought it ridiculous to assume that if the duty on the flour was lost to the Government that the people would not have the money to spend otherwise. The loss to the truckmen would not be anything and they would benefit by cheaper mill feed. His statement as to the fact that its products would still have to be distributed in the city by the truckmen. Regarding light dues instead of a loss there would be a gain as the milling company was employing two ships to bring the wheat here. Regarding the number of men employed it was re-posterous to argue that 65 men could run the mill and cut the lumber to be used in making packages, etc. As to the third grade flour which would be produced and which would be marketed abroad, he thought it was the only justification so far put forward for the establishment of a West India Service for with flour and feed to export, the prospect for the service looked good. Mr. J. R. Bennett took the position that the project by its far reaching effect on the country in general should be brought before the Legislature. Other speakers were Mr. G. R. Williams and Hon. Dr. Robinson. The latter expressed himself pleased with the manner in which Mr. Palmer answered all the questions put to him. The resolution passed was forwarded to the Executive Government this evening.

Fire on Rennie's Mill Road.

Shortly after 10 a.m., a still alarm brought the Central and East End Fire apparatus to the residence of Mr. E. Stanout, R.H.A., where the roof was in a blaze. TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

JAPAN AGAIN VISITED BY SEVERE EARTHQUAKE. TOKIO, Sept. 27. Another severe earthquake occurred in Japan Monday in Hiroshima district. The extent of the damage is not yet determined. Floods have followed a typhoon in the Fukagada and Honja, wards of Tokio. Many have suffered as thousands of refugees were encamped in rude shacks in the wards. BERLIN, Sept. 27. A Presidential decree has been issued curtailing the number of constitutional rights in Germany and conferring executive power in the Minister of Defence. Among the rights restored are the freedom of the press and right of meeting.

REVOLUTION IN BULGARIA OVER.

A semi-official statement says that the revolutionary movement in Bulgaria may be considered as approaching the end. The statement adds that the leaders are surrendering in parties saying they were inveigled into the movement.

130 KILLED BY EARTHQUAKE.

TEHRAN, Sept. 27. One hundred and twenty persons were killed in an earthquake at Khorasan yesterday, according to a despatch.

The Unfriendly Arctic.



ENGLAND'S HOPES.
 (By OLYMPIAN.)
 The search through England for a heavyweight boxer who might become champion of the world, which was instigated by British sportsmen in America and conducted by Mr. Tex O'Rourke, resulted, as that gentleman announced at a luncheon the other day in the finding of five possible hopes.

These are: Henry A. Walker Macrae, a Bristol policeman; Isaac Ingleton, an employee of a Liverpool sugar factory; Basil Price, another Bristol man; William Maurice Prestage, a Birmingham product; and fifthly, and lastly, a burly London policeman whose name had not been divulged at the time of writing this article.

Macrae stands 6 ft. 3 ins. in height, weighs 157 lbs., and is twenty-two years of age. He is described as being tremendously aggressive, the fiercest natural fighter one has ever seen.

 Isaac Ingleton was discovered loading bags of sugar, each weighing 200 lb., on to a dray. He has done some boxing, but decided that he would do no more until he had been taught.

Basil Price is the son of the proprietor of the Spa Hotel, Clifton; stands 6 ft. 2 1/2 ins. high, and weighs 15 st. 10 lb.

William Prestage is 6 ft. 3 ins. in height, weighs 14 st., and has a reach of 80 ins.
 The London policeman is the son of an architect, is twenty-one years of age, stands 6 ft. 3 ins., and is declared to be a model of an athlete.

These five men, who are about to go into a training-camp at Malvern, are to be trained according to American methods, and are to be ready to fight in six months' time.

So much for the men and the money. But the question which forces itself upon my mind is this: Can one find a heavy-weight boxing champion in this way?

I very seriously doubt it. Either a man has the fighting instinct and the force of character and control, in a Ring sense, that go to the making of a boxing champion, or he has not. It might be possible to impart it with suitable instruction, and the right kind of training, but—well, I must confess myself a pessimist where this particular campaign is concerned.

Size Not Everything.
 Height, weight, and strength are desirable qualities, of course, in the making of a heavyweight champion, but they are not everything.
 America has produced quite a crop of very big men in the heavyweight division, some of them more than useful; but Jack Dempsey, the holder of the title, is well under the weight of Jess Willard, Carl Morris, and Luis Firpo, for example, and he has a very convincing record.

Fitzsimmons was little more than a middleweight. Charlie Mitchell, ditto. The names of other famous boxers who laid low many a giant will come readily to mind. But most of them took to fighting or boxing by freedom of choice. Nobody went out to search for them.

This establishment has already played an important part in the Western live stock industry, and its continuance will promote faith in the future, and will also be a stimulus to others engaged along the same lines.


