

**King Edward VII Trimmed a Prince**

Won 2 Million Marks From Friend of Kaiser.

(By Canadian Press).

Berlin, Jan. 5.—How King Edward VII, when he was Prince of Wales once won two million marks from a son of Prince Radziwill, one of the leaders in Prussian demagoguery and a crony of former Emperor William, has been revealed in connection with the current investigation into the banking policies pursued by the Prussian state bank.

Dr. Karl Van Furchard, the son of former president of the official Prussian bank, is authority for the statement that the Prince of Wales during a visit to Berlin in the middle 90's, won a half million dollars in the course of one night's gambling from young Radziwill. As the debt had to be paid within twenty-four hours the elder Radziwill pledged his vast estates to the Prussian state bank as collateral for the cash covering his son's gambling debt.

Emperor William, who was known to have the Radziwill family eschewed, spared a blot, intervened and the bank condescended to advance the amount needed to cover the winnings of the Prince of Wales.

theory that mankind has never found any better medium for building than the "brick." He said: "Yet the shortage of bricks is causing all kinds of other methods to be revived."

"As you know, houses are mostly built with two walls, the outer and the inner. This method gives protection against dampness.

"In my method the outer wall is of brick and the inner of breeze slabs made of cinders and cement. The real secret of the method lies in the connection between these two skins, which, instead of being by bricks—as at regular intervals—is by specially treated cross-boards. Perfect insulation is obtained, with a great saving in time and the quantity of bricks used.

"I estimate roughly that in a £600 house there would be a saving of £90 alone on the brick bill. Owing to the shortage, German bricks, often of inferior quality, are arriving in this country daily in enormous quantities, and foreign cement is also being offered.

"In my ideal house plaster of Paris would play a big part. At present its use in this country is very small indeed, owing to the scarcity of gypsum. France uses about ten times more than we do each year.

"In Spitzbergen there are vast gypsum deposits, and if the matter were seriously taken in hand there would be a direct and cheap supply to this country. In the United States they are beginning to make remark-

able uses of plaster of Paris, such as in floors. This is really nothing new, as the floors of very many old English cottages are made of plaster and reeds."

**Solicitor's Downfall**

Six Months' Imprisonment For Fraud.

To drink was attributed the downfall of Wilfred James Burton, 57, solicitor, who was sentenced at Birmingham Assizes. He and Frederick Arthur White, 37, signwriter, were charged with fraudulent conversion and larceny. According to the prosecution, accused and a man named Riches conspired to induce people to deposit money with them for the purpose of taking up shares in a new company called Multi Markets, Ltd., to deal in wine and oil, and almost every commodity. It was represented that those who did so would be given positions as canvassers or clerks. Actually there never had been a company formed. Witness told of entrusting to defendants sums varying from £20 to £75, and receiving nothing back. With the permission of the Commissioner, Mr. Hollis Walker, K.C., the charges of larceny were withdrawn. Burton, giving evidence, declared he had nothing to do with the commercial side of the company and knew nothing of the transactions. He merely consented to carry out the legal business in connection with Multi Markets, Limited. The company was not registered because of disension among the directors. Riches, the master mind, received the money, witness receiving payment for work done. He admitted having had no practising certificate as a solicitor since 1921. Mr. Coley, prosecuting: At the time you took £25 from a clerk named Simkins, what chance had you of repaying it? Witness: Lots of chances. Mr. Coley: What! And within a fortnight you had the bailiffs in your office and they sold your furniture, you could not pay £40 on judgment summonses, and you could not take out your practising certificate as a solicitor. I have made £25 on occasions before you could look round. The jury found Burton guilty of defrauding in two cases and conspiring to defraud, and White not guilty of all charges. The latter was then discharged. Burton was sentenced to 6 months' in the second division.

**FINAL SESSION THIS MORNING.**  
PARIS, Jan. 13. The final plenary session of the Allied Ministers' Conference will be held at nine o'clock to-morrow morning for the purpose of ratifying the agreement reached by the various delegations regarding apportionment of the reparations under the Dawes plan, it was announced this afternoon.

**107 CHURCHES FAVOR UNION.**  
TORONTO, Jan. 13. Well over 700 Presbyterian congregations throughout Canada have announced the results of voting conducted at the question of Church Union. Having voted for union and 123 for secession.

**WILL BRING THEM BACK.**  
QUEBEC, Jan. 13. It was tasted to-day authoritatively that the first steps had been taken through the British Ambassador at Washington to bring back to Canada the United States citizens known by the names of Clark, Campbell and Neal, to face charges in connection with the recent alleged attempt to bring into the Province half a million dollars worth of liquor illegally. The preliminary investigation of those already under arrest now stands adjourned until next Friday.

**JEANNE D'ARC LOST.**  
BOULOGNE, France, Jan. 13. A farewell message from the crew of the ill-fated French vessel Jeanne D'Arc, stating the craft was rapidly sinking without hope of rescue off the Cornish coast has been washed up in a bottle near here. The message is dated December 26th, and was written in pencil on a sheet torn from a note book and signed by the master, Pierre Levinals, of Concarneau. Four vessels are registered under the name of Jeanne D'Arc, one of which is a French hospital ship which works among the French fishermen on the Grand Banks of Newfoundland.

**U. S. SUBMARINE ASHORE.**  
CHATHAM, Mass., Jan. 13. The United States submarine SDX12 with crew of 35, went ashore in a heavy fog on Nansett beach early to-day. She was at first reported in no immediate danger, but later advices said her position was dangerous, due to the heavy seas running.

**CARTER WILL RESUME WORK ON TUTT'S TOMB.**  
LONDON, Jan. 13. Howard Carter, Egyptologist, has reached an agreement with the Egyptian Government under which the work will be resumed on the tomb of Pharaoh Tutankhamen, the exploration of which Mr. Carter took over following the death of Lord Carnarvon, says a despatch from Cairo.

**NO INTIMATION OF VISIT.**  
OTTAWA, Jan. 14. No official intimation of a visit to Canada by the Princess Mary and her husband, Viscount Lascelles, is mentioned in despatches from London to-day.

**STILL ADRIFT.**  
QUEBEC, Jan. 14. The next few days shall decide whether the drifting auxiliary schooner, Rosalba, which broke away from Les Eboulements over two weeks ago, and has since defied all efforts made to succor her, will continue on her present course until reaching the Magdalen Islands or whether she will be made the plaything of another current and be swept through the Gulf of St. Lawrence to the Nova Scotia coast and there be rescued by a passing vessel before she sinks to the bottom. She was reported to-day at Martin River, 262 miles down the river, about five or six miles off shore. She has drifted some two hundred miles since December 27.

**HOUGHTON SUCCEEDS KELLOGG.**  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 14. The appointment of Alanson S. Houghton, of New York, now Ambassador to Berlin, to succeed Ambassador Kellogg at the Court of St. James, was announced at the White House to-day. Ambassador Kellogg will succeed C. E. Hughes, as Secretary of State, in March.

**C.N.R. ENGINEER KILLED IN COLLISION.**  
MONCTON, N.B., Jan. 13. Joseph McDermott, engineer, was killed, and his fireman, Stanley Murphy, had a leg badly injured, as the result of a head-on collision between two freight trains of the C.N.R. at Belle Dune Station, forty miles south of Campbellton, at 2 o'clock this afternoon. A snowstorm was raging at the time, which may have accounted

for McDermott not seeing the extra freight standing on the main line as he approached Belle Dune Station, and crashed into it. A number of horses were killed when their car in which they were being carried, tumbled over.

**CASE AGAINST IBANEZ.**  
MADRID, Jan. 13. The case against Vicente Ibanez, famous author, for the publication of his booklet against King Alfonso, of Spain, has been placed in the hands of a district judge who dictated an order committing the writer to prison unconditionally and demanding from him 10,000 pesetas as cash bond to guarantee his financial obligations. It is generally believed that the extradition of Ibanez was asked.

**TO-DAY'S MESSAGES**

**IBANEZ CASE POSTPONED.**  
PARIS, Jan. 13. The hearing of Vicente Ibanez on the charge of defaming King Alfonso of Spain through the publication of the Spanish author's recent pamphlet was postponed for a few days when the case came up in court here this morning. The postponement was at the request of the writer's Attorney, Marius Montet, the Socialist Deputy who was one of ex-Premier Caillaux's battery of lawyers during Caillaux's trial by the High Court. Deputy Montet told the investigating Magistrate that Ibanez was slightly ill and could not come to Paris from Mentone for four or five days, but would appear as soon as he was able to travel.

**FINANCERERS APPEAL CASE FRIDAY.**  
TORONTO, Jan. 13. The Aemilius Jarvis and Peter Smith appeals will be heard by the First Division Appellate Court on Friday afternoon, it is announced.

**UNEMPLOYMENT INCREASES.**  
LONDON, Jan. 13. The unemployment situation in Great Britain continues to grow worse, according to a statement issued to-night by the Ministry of Labour. Figures presented by the Ministry show 1,370,800 persons are on the lists of the Unemployment Exchanges. This indicates an increase of 33,915 unemployed over last week's figures, and 40,135 more than during the corresponding week of 1924.

**HOUGHTON'S APPOINTMENT A POPULAR ONE.**  
LONDON, Jan. 13. The announcement that Alanson S. Houghton, United States Ambassador to Germany is to succeed Frank B. Kellogg as Envoy to Great Britain was received with much satisfaction by British officials circles. There was said to be a feeling of gratification that Mr. Kellogg's successor is a man having intimate knowledge of European affairs and one who has gained wide prestige in handling important matters for the United States in Berlin.

**PROTOCOL TO BE SIGNED TO-DAY.**

PARIS, Jan. 13. The Protocol embodying the accord reached by Britain and the United States together with the other powers on the payments of the occupation and war damage claims to the United States will be signed at the Plenary session of the Allied Finance Ministers' Conference to-morrow morning. The definite and final provisions include payment to the United States of 50,000,000 gold marks yearly beginning September 1, 1926. This amount to apply and the United States to share in the Dawes' annuities at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent, beginning retroactively September 1, 1924; these payments to amortize the war damage claims which will not exceed \$35,000,000; the immediate release to the United States of \$14,725,154 now in the Federal Reserve Bank where it was deposited by the Allies under the Wadsworth agreement. The United States agreed to waive any claim under the Wadsworth agreement of May 1923, and also agrees that the 2 1/2 per cent, shall not apply on payments made on account of reparations by any former enemy power other than Germany.

**QUEBEC WILL DISPUTE ANY EXPORT OF HYDRO ELECTRIC POWER.**  
QUEBEC, Jan. 13. That the Province of Quebec will fight to the limit any effort on the part of the Federal Government to export Hydro Electric Power, and that any contracts entered into at this end will be made at the risk of the contracting parties, was the emphatic pronouncement this evening of Premier the Hon. L. A. Taschereau in the Quebec Legislature Assembly, when he responded to the address of Arthur Sarva. In the course of the debate on the Speech from the Throne, Mr. Taschereau suggested that United States interests establish their plants in Quebec and thus avoid any complications that might eventually ensue. The Premier also raised the question of pulp wood embargo and called for opinions on this subject. He pointed out that since the pulp wood areas comprised 86 p.c. Crown lands and the remaining 15 p.c.

private property, and that since there was already an inhibition against exporting pulp wood from Crown land, the dangers of export were not so glaring.

**QUEBEC AND B. C. HAVE MOST FAVOURABLE EMPLOYMENT SITUATION.**

OTTAWA, Jan. 13. A review of employment conditions throughout Canada during the past year shows that the most favourable situation as compared with 1923 existed in Quebec and British Columbia. The expansion in construction according to returns received by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics was most pronounced. Large seasonal gains were also registered in lumber mills, canneries and some other manufactures, but on the whole manufacturing was dull during the last twelve months.

# Lighting Contract Between the City of St. John's

and St. John's Light & Power  
Company Ltd.

On the 15th day of May, 1922, under the provisions of the Act in that behalf the Company shall undertake to perform for a period of twenty years from the fifteenth day of May 1922, the electric street-lighting service within the city limits upon the terms and conditions, that are as follows:

The Company shall provide and maintain lights of two classes, namely (a) the large standard street lights of the type at present in use in St. John's, hereinafter called "large lights"; and (b) the smaller standard street lights of the type at present in use in St. John's, hereinafter called "small lights."

The City shall pay to the Company during the continuance of this Agreement, except as hereinafter provided, the sum of Fifty-four dollars and eighty cents (\$54.80) per annum for each large light, and the sum of Twenty-four dollars (\$24.00) per annum for each small light; provided, however, that at the end of the fifth, tenth and fifteenth year of the term of this Agreement either party hereto shall be entitled to require a revision of the said rates or charges, which revision shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of the next succeeding paragraph hereof.

Either party hereto may by six months' notice in writing to the other, during the fifth and tenth and or fifteenth year of term of this agreement and expiring before the end of that year, require the rates or charges for lights supplied by the Company to the City under the provisions of this agreement to be revised, and in default of agreement as to such rates or charges the same shall on the application of either party to be settled by two arbitrators, one to be appointed by each of the parties in difference, or by an umpire to be appointed by the said arbitrators, and such arbitration shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Arbitration Act, provided always that the said arbitrators or their umpire, as the case may be, shall in no case be bound to alter the said rates or charges, but may order the same to be reduced or increased or to remain the same as specified and fixed by clause two of this agreement, and that for the purpose of such arbitration the rates fixed by clause two of this agreement shall be deemed to be fair, having regard to the present price of labour and material and other items affecting the cost of supplying the lighting service.

As the Company at the present time supplies the City with Two hundred and twenty-one large lights and forty-five small lights, which at the rates mentioned in clause two hereof would yield to the Company a gross revenue of Fifteen thousand four hundred dollars and eighty cents per annum: NOW IT IS HEREBY AGREED that during the continuance of this agreement the Company may require the City to provide new lights of either class in addition to those now existing, and (2) to remove lights from one location to another, and (3) to substitute large lights for small lights and vice versa, and (4) to discontinue one or more light or lights of either class, but so that in no event shall the gross annual revenue to the company in respect of lights supplied to the City fall below the said sum of Fifteen thousand four hundred dollars and eighty cents while the rates mentioned in Clause two remain unaltered, or in case of an increase or reduction of the said rates as provided for in said Clause two, below such sum as at the rates so altered would be the gross annual revenue from two hundred and twenty-one large lights and forty-five small lights.

New lights shall be located at the expense of the company in positions to be determined by the City Council. The actual cost of removal of lights from one position to another shall be borne by the City.

## Our Montreal Letter

(From Our Own Correspondent)

### THE UNEMPLOYED STILL A BIG PROBLEM.

The problem of the unemployed is still a hard one to solve, and will remain so for some time. The situation is being felt at this particular time more than ever owing to the severity of the wintry weather. All the charitable organizations have been taxed to the limit to relieve those in need, but work valiantly on in the cause of suffering humanity. In spite of all the distress and the supposed scarcity of money, the revels at the different hotels on New Year's eve, in point of numbers, eclipsed anything ever seen in the Metropolis of Canada; and the hockey games are crowded also. At the new Forum, over eleven thousand (11,000) attended a game between Montreal and Canadians. In the Arena, the game between Ottawa and the Canadians, thousands were unable to obtain admission. And yet, able-bodied men with large families walk the streets, both cold and hungry. Thousands enjoy themselves, while thousands of others groan under the heavy weight of poverty and dire distress. The number of unemployed at present is unprecedented in the history of the city. For many months thousands here have not worked. So great was the acuteness of the situation that the directors of the Montreal Star Publishing Company agreed unanimously to put aside enough money to provide 10,000 meals for the unemployed. The meals will be served in the lunch room at No. 4 St. George St., a part of the Star building. The Santa Claus Fund, to which so many of the Star's generous readers contributed, will give an idea of the distress prevailing here. The following articles were distributed:

1,500 Mufflers, 1,500 Toggles (Caps), 1,500 pairs Stockings, 1,500 pairs Mitts, 1,500 Fleece Undervests; also, 80 large packing cases of garments consisting of overcoats, suits, boots, dresses, bloomers, shirts, trousers, blouses, layettes, petticoats, bed comforters, gloves, socks, blankets, mattresses, rubbers; 1,500 packages Quaker Oats, 1,500 boxes Biscuits. Amongst the contributed articles, independently of the aforementioned, were dolls, games, picture books, puzzles, boxes of candies, toys, to the total number of upwards of one thousand.

The Fund also sent over \$2,000 to the emergency Relief Committee for the unemployed, besides the distribution of coal to over 200 needy families. And to this list, the work of twenty or thirty organizations helping in a similar manner, and then you will have a much better idea of the herculean task in providing for those in want.

### BANDITS ROB MONEY FROM A CHARITABLE INSTITUTION.

The gunmen still stalk through the city, and carry on their nefarious trade of robbing citizens. Their plans are well laid and they manage to get away with their booty. As he was on his way to the Deaf and Dumb Institute, at 3600 St. Lawrence Boulevard, to turn in a large sum of money collected on the sale of benefit tickets, Henry Blaquiere, of 691 Fabre Street, was held up at the point of a gun and relieved of \$137. The police have as yet not located the gunman.

Mr. Blaquiere was walking along Isbena Street, when, at the corner of De Guepe, two men approached him. The taller of the pair produced a gun and, speaking in French, demanded his money. The victim carried \$100, which was the property of the institution, in one pocket, and \$37 of his own money in

the other. He gave the bandits \$2 and, this not satisfying them, handed over the remaining \$35 of his own money, insisting that this was all he had. "You have some more," declared the man behind the gun. At the same time his companion tore open Mr. Blaquiere's pocket and secured the \$100 which he had done his best to save. "Go right along and keep quiet," was the parting advice of the bandits, and their victim had to obey. He reported the matter to the nearest police station, but all efforts to locate the gunmen failed.

### JUMPED TO SAVE HIMSELF BUT MET DEATH.

An unfortunate and fatal accident happened at Lachine a few days ago when Louis Deneault, 37 years of age, met with instant death when he was crushed beneath a two-ton truck. The accident occurred on St. Patrick St., near the lift bridge over Lachine Canal at Dollard Street, Ville LaSalle. Deneault, in company with two other men employed by Dawes Brewery, was returning with the truck to the brewery.

In swerving to avoid another vehicle the truck ran into the ditch and toppled over on its side. While the vehicle was still in motion Deneault jumped from the driver's seat, lost his footing in the ditch, and before he was able to clamber to safety the truck was upon him. The next two men held their positions in the truck and escaped uninjured.

### WHY ARE CHILDREN BAD?

In a magazine entitled, "Hygeia," the editor says:—

Delinquent children are usually under par physically. This is shown by a study made in New York of 743 children brought before the children's court. Examination of these children indicated that the physical condition of delinquent children in general is much inferior to that of ordinary school children. Seventy-nine per cent. of the children before the court had physical defects, while only 35 per cent. of public school children living in the same districts and of the same ages and nationalities had defects. The chief difference between the two groups so far as physical conditions were concerned seemed to be in nutritional and glandular disturbances.

A young fireman was crushed to death when two of the fire trucks collided at the corner of two narrow streets. The Herald, in an editorial, under the heading of "Speed and the Fireman," says:—

It has often been said, and we believe with truth, that Montreal has the most efficient Fire Brigade on the continent. At the same time there can be no doubt that the firemen, in order to save damage and possibly lives, habitually drive thru the crowded streets at a pace which endangers their own lives and those of others.

It would be difficult, of course, to fix a speed limit for them but it would seem to be only a part of wisdom for those in authority to exercise some restraint upon the members of the Brigade in the matter of speed. At present "the sky is the limit."

### MCGILL'S NEW GATES ARE UNFINISHED.



### Naval Insurance

Ottawa Journal: The United States is the greatest Power in the world with the possible exception of the British Empire. No country would dream of attacking the United States without the most extreme provoca-

tion. No country would dream of contending with the United States save in utter desperation or through practical insanity. The United States maintains a great navy and a strong army from motives chiefly of national self-respect. For that reason, its people are proud to pay close on \$3 per head per year for naval representation, where Canada, partner in the British Empire, limits her expenditure to less than 30 cents per head and allows other British countries, chiefly the desperately-taxed Motherland, to make up the balance of the expenditure necessary to safeguard the trade of the British peoples.

### Perfuming the Atmosphere

A perfumed subway will be the latest boast of Paris according to a decision of the directors to-day. Following hundreds of protests of bad air and disagreeable odors the underground line has decided to install a hygienic apparatus in stations and cars, giving off a delicious perfume.

### 330,000 Miles in Lift

London was the first great city to run railways just below the surface and the first to develop a system of rapid-transit electric railways many feet below the surface of the streets.

There are seventy-seven miles of single-track Tube tunnels, all made means of a tunnelling shield, lined from end to end as the work proceeded, with cast-iron rings bolted together. If all the Tube tunnels were placed end to end along the route of the Great Western Railway to form a single continuous tunnel, a train starting at Paddington would emerge at Swindon.

The lifts still in use travel between 903 miles vertically every day—about 330,000 miles in a year; making 760 trips every twenty-four hours.

The deepest lift shaft—at Brompton—measures 191 feet from top to bottom, or 20 feet more than the height of the Nelson Column.

**St. Bon's College Prize Day**

Under the distinguished patronage of his Excellency the Governor and his Grace the Archbishop the St. Bonaventure's Annual Prize Distribution took place last night at the Casino Theatre. The hall was filled to overflowing, and many were unable to gain admission. Amongst those present were his Excellency the Governor, Lady Allardice, Capt. Goodfellow, A.D.C., his Grace Archbishop Roche, Rt. Rev. Mgr. McDermott, his Worship Mayor Cook, and a large number of clergy. The proceedings opened with the presentation of a drama entitled "A Double Triumph," a beautiful story of the struggles of the infant church during the reigns of the Emperor Trajan and his successor Adrian. The play was an unqualified success. The staging and the costumes were as complete as the elocution and acting was perfect, and every credit is due, not alone to those responsible for the training of the students, but also to Capt. O'Grady, who helped with such success in "making up" and Mr. Holmes, whose genius was mainly responsible for the gorgeous tableau with which the play concluded. Between the acts items were supplied by Messrs G. Martin, J. Bradshaw, T. Meaney, A. Grant, F. Phelan and M. Frelich. The accompaniments being played by Miss M. Meaney, whilst John Phelan added materially to the musical effects during the play.

The following is the report of the Rev. President:—

In the language of the Gael do I wish his Excellency and Lady Allardice a Caed Mile Falte to our annual Prize Distribution, and I could wish that for many years to come St. Bon's should on these occasions be honoured by their distinguished presence.

During the past half century the Gubernatorial Residence has been graced by many noted personages and most successful Governors, but it is beyond question that during that period the "Oldest Colony" has not had a vice-regal pair who have manifested more interest in her welfare than have his Excellency and his highly esteemed Lady.

Most heartily do I also welcome our good Archbishop, of whom his Alma Mater is very proud. We are indeed glad that his health is now nearly all that his friends wish, and we pray that he may be spared long to guide as Metropolitan the destinies of the Church in Newfoundland.

It gives me pleasure beyond expression to bear testimony to the very excellent comportment that is in evidence among the students of St. Bonaventure's. Brothers who have been associated with the institution for the past thirty years say that in their experience they have never met better boys at the College. This is all the more gratifying when we compare them to the present product of the Public Schools of the United States where the number of boys and girls between fifteen and eighteen years of age who figure in the Criminal Courts has assumed the most alarming proportions. Brother Ryan, our Provincial Superior from New York, after spending some weeks said "the edifying piety and genuine goodness of the students delighted me." The highest ideals are aimed at. Many measures up to that standard, but of course as in the School of the Apostles there will be the some who will disappoint.

If vocations to the Clerical or the Religious life be the surest criterion of vigorous Catholicity, then the College upholds its best traditions. In that direction as may be seen by the number of her sons whose ambition it is to devote their lives to the service of the Altar or to that other Apostolic work—the Christian education of youth.

The daily half-hour religious instructions together with the boys' Annual Retreat are rightly regarded as the most important of the school curriculum, and account in a large measure for the fine spirit which prevails. In this connection I want to thank Rev. Father Kennedy for the fervent Retreat given by him. His example coupled with his whole-souled appeals gave the students an inspiration which they will carry with them to the very end of their lives.

Last year I was able to announce that we had won the Jubilee Scholarship, as well as the trophies for Football and Hockey but this year we were not so fortunate; yet our general results at the C.H.E. were never better as our passes, namely 131, have been a record for the College. In the Senior Associate—the highest grade—St. Bon's leads the schools of Newfoundland in the number of successful students. Of all who took the exam throughout the Island fifty per cent passed; our percentage is 71. We did not expect the Scholarship as all our pupils in this Grade were First Year students. Fourteen Associates satisfied the examiners in all their subjects. Mr. Joseph Peddle wanted four marks to lead this grade. He wins a Twenty Dollar Gold Piece presented by Father Kennedy. Thirty-three Intermediate Candidates passed their exam. In Preliminary Grade we had forty-eight passes and thirty-one in the Primary. This class as well as Senior Preliminary gave us but one

failure. Five pupils got maximum marks in Preliminary Arithmetic; three of these were from St. Bonaventure's College. Our Primaries had seven with a full score of 100.

From last year's Jubilee Scholarship winner, Mr. George Power, we get a very fine report showing that the reputation of the Old School is very safe in his hands. He is in the van in most of his subjects at St. Michael's University, Toronto.

In Athletics St. Bon's has done well as was shown by the fine exhibition given on Sports' Day. At the Highland Games Masters Cotter, Slatery and Cotter won the Relay Cup for the third year making it theirs for all time. After capturing the Football Cup for eleven consecutive years we lost it this year chiefly through the illness of some of our best players. Our hockeyists too, having held the trophy for eight years without a break, met the same fate. A rearrangement of players would probably have given a different result, as we never had a more carefully trained team. Having won nineteen championships in eleven years the College can gracefully afford to take a reverse of fortune, thus showing that they can be good losers as well as good winners.

I want on this occasion to congratulate the Old St. Bon's on their wonderful feat of having the past pupils of one school win the Hayward Trophy for the third year. I would also compliment them not only on winning the Hockey Tie Cup but still more on the many game they played which received most favourable comment from lovers of true sport. Loyalty to their old school was the chief motive power that led them to victory both on St. George's Field and in the Prince's Rink.

The Boy's Physical Development goes on apace especially that under Captain O'Grady. Those beautiful exhibitions of drill given on our Annual Field Day are the culmination of the care that is taken almost daily of forming healthy bodies which usually help students to do sound thinking.

During the year, debating in the various class rooms received that attention which it deserves. The Senior Prize Debate especially, in which the respective merits of Scott and Dickens as authors were discussed, proved one of the most interesting and successful events of its kind in the annals of St. Bonaventure's.

The Rink has in part assumed as was intended the form of a gymnasium in which basketball has been played during the Fall season. For several weeks past the pupils have been regaling their hearts' content on the fine sheet of ice at their disposal. Truly we find the rink an investment which pays very large dividends in the form of fine exercise and recreation for our boys.

If there be any section of the College that gives us particular satisfaction it is the Junior Department where the crowds of happy children enjoy a veritable Garden of Eden in which they pluck freely from the Tree of Knowledge. One small boy when recently describing his school said "It is a Paradise." Those classrooms are in charge of experienced teachers who can get their pupils to do much study while making their young charges perfectly at ease and at home.
