

A HUGE MONOPOLY IN OIL.
The London *Prototype* says:—In our last, we briefly referred to a scheme recently inaugurated in this neighborhood, to raise the price of illuminating oil. Some further facts have since come to our knowledge, which are worthy of being laid before the public. The combination is not directly among the refiners, but is altogether a huge one-man "monopoly." A certain wealthy Yankee, a resident of Chicago, named Judge Higgins, who possesses, it is said, a capital of between five and six millions of dollars, recently decided to speculate in Canadian oil, and that on a very large scale. He visited this neighborhood, and the oil regions of Bothwell and Petrolia, ascertained the quantity of oil in stock in the refineries, visited other refineries throughout the Dominion for the same purpose, and after satisfying himself as to the quantity on hand, made a bid for the whole. After assuring refiners that his object was simply to raise the price from its present low figure to one more remunerative to them, and this being the only possible way to bring about such a desideratum, he succeeded in his purpose, and we believe has purchased or leased some fifty-two oil refineries throughout the Province, for a term of four months, until the 1st of December next, as well as the entire stock of oil at each. In the meantime, the refiners are bound not to manufacture, unless for export; and the whole available stock of oil in Canada has thus become the property of one man. The price, in consequence, will be raised, probably from 9c to 15c to 25c to 30c per gallon, wholesale, and from 20c to 25c to 50c to 75c, or perhaps even higher, retail. Who but a Yankee would have ever thought of such a speculation; how Mr. Higgins must laugh at the gullibility of Canadians. Further, while Mr. Higgins holds all the refined oil, and prevents the refiners from manufacturing until December, he in the meantime is about to purchase up all the crude stuff at the wells, and elsewhere, which, during the next four months, he will store away, and consumers will be left entirely at his mercy for their supplies. Dealers should be cautious not to invest too largely in oil: this unique monopoly cannot remain permanent, and by the end of December, unless a similar arrangement is entered into by Mr. Higgins and the proprietors of the refineries, the article will speedily again come down to reasonable rates. We await with interest the next Yankee-Canadian speculation. This monopoly of Mr. Higgins takes effect from the 1st of August.

THE FAKIR.—There was a large house last night to greet the second appearance of the Fakir of Vishnu. The programme as promised, was entirely new, and some clever tricks were performed. Gifts were distributed as on the preceding night, and lucky ones went home congratulating themselves. It was rather amusing to see the anxiety with which the envelopes that were handed to every one at the door were opened in order to ascertain whether they contained blanks or numbers. If the former were found the countenance of the unlucky individual became as blank as the card, while the expectation of being put in possession of the leading or some other prize lighted up the features of those who found numbers. The principal prize announced for to-night is a walnut-cased dressing bureau and mirror. A number of gifts and a new programme await those who attend.

STILL DEFECTIVE.—The newly constructed tanks after being subjected to such repairs and improvements as it was believed would make them water tight, were filled up again last night, and sad to relate were almost empty this morning. About two feet of water remained, which shows that they have been made a little better since they were first tested, but they are yet very far from being efficient. It is certainly a most unfortunate business.

FIRE AT PARIS.—A fire broke out in Paris on the night of Thursday 23rd inst. in the clothing shop of Messrs. Roberts & Young. The fire was speedily subdued by the active exertions of those present, but not before goods to the amount of \$400 or \$500 had been destroyed, and the building damaged to the extent of about \$300. The building was insured.

EEL PRESENTATION.—A gentleman in Galt, presented the officers of the Battalion assembled there for drill, with an eel which he caught in the Grand River. It was pronounced savoury food. The question whether there is any affinity between the eel and the snake was not discussed after dinner.

The murderers of Prince Michael of Serbia have been tried and shot. The ex-Prince Karageorgewitch, who is commonly believed to have been the instigator of the murder, has been summoned by the Serbian Court, but he will not make his appearance.

THE COAL TRADES.
We find in a statement made by W. S. Jevons, based on the latest returns, the following interesting statement in relation to the annual product of coal in various countries. Great Britain produces 101,630,000 tons; the United States, 25,870,000; Prussia and the Zollverein, 20,610,000; France, 10,710,000; Belgium, 9,935,000; Austria, 4,500,000; British North America, 1,500,000; Russia, 1,500,000; Spain, 30,000; New South Wales, 250,000; Ireland, 123,000—making an aggregate of 176,565,000 tons. It appears that of the total known product of coal in the world, Great Britain raises over 75 per cent., although the population of that island is not one-fortieth of the population of the whole world. Taking the people of the United States and British North America engaged in coal mining to be of Teutonic origin, that branch of the human race produces 73 per cent. of all the coal taken from the bowels of the earth. When we consider the effect which the use of coal has upon the manufactures, commerce and civilization of the world, we can form some idea of the tremendous force extended by the scattered descendants of the old Teutonic inhabitants of Northern Europe.

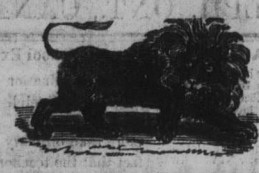

THE NORTH SHORE ROUTE.—It is reported in Ottawa that the Cabinet intend to throw the whole responsibility of the selection of the North Shore or Robinson route of the Intercolonial Railway on the Imperial Government. This is a very good dodge. It has not, however, been shown that the Imperial Government has exercised the least control over the surveys made by the Canadian Government during the past year. The Imperial Government assented to the appointment of Mr. Sandford Fleming to conduct the preliminary explorations for the route, but there their interference ceased, Mr. Fleming is to arrive from England at once. It is pretty well settled there will be no commencement of the railway this year.

EXCITEMENT OF THE POPE.—The correspondent of the Pall Mall Gazette writing from Rome says: For some weeks past the Pope has been in a state of great excitement. He adopts the most rigorous measures against all who are suspected of liberal views, and alienating, and even banishing, his friends. He seems to be laboring under a sort of mania, which not only keeps up a panic in his household, but causes uneasiness to his physicians. Among those who have lately fallen under his displeasure is Monsignor Riccardi, Archbishop of Turin. I have already informed you that this prelate on the occasion of the marriage of Prince Humbert, announced at Turin a plenary indulgence in honor of the event, and that the indulgence was repudiated in the Giornale di Roma. The Pope has followed up this step by summoning the Archbishop to Rome to answer for his conduct, and we shall, perhaps, have another Andrea retraction. The Holy Father is determined to free himself from all association with the marriage of the hereditary Prince of Italy.

The London papers mention as a remarkable fact that Capt. Turner, of the 3rd Manchester Volunteers, made twelve consecutive bull's eyes, at 200 yards, a few days since at Wimbledon.
