Madrid, July 19. - The following is the official list, in which there are some changes from the one telegraphed yesterday: - N. Salmeron, President; Fernando Gonzalez, Minister of Finance; Senor Solar, Minister of State; Senor Rodriguez, Minister of Justice; General Gonzalez, Minister of War; Senor Maionave, Minister of the Interior; Senor Ovelido, Minister of Marine; Senor Polanco, Minister of Colonies; Senor Gonzalez, Minister of Public Works.

IN THE Cortes the vote for the President of the Council of Ministers stood 119 for Salmeron, and 93 for P. Y. Margall.

DURING the debate on the Ministry great excitement and alarm was occasioned in the Cortes by the explosion of an Orsini bomb at the door.

LONDON, July 19. - A special edition of the Daily News, issued this afternoon, announces that a large Carlist force has been defeated by the Government troops at Igualada, in the Province of Barcelona, after a battle of eighteen hours duration.

THE NUMBER of dead and wounded left upon the field was so large that vehicles of every kind in the town were pressed into the service for their removal.

THE INQUEST ON COXE.

ANOTHER VICTIM OF WHISKEY. The investigation into the death of Cox, called for Saturday morning, was adjourned until six o'clock in the evening in consequence of the unlawful removal of the body of deceased, Stephen Cox, beyond the limits of the County of Wellington.

AT THAT hour the inquest was opened at McLaughlin's tavern, before Dr. Keating, coroner, and the following evidence was taken: -

BARNABAS GIBSON, who lives on the York road, in the township of Guelph, said that on Friday evening between 5 and 6 p. m. he saw deceased and another man driving on the road between witness' gate and Mr. Smart's. Witness was upon a hill about fifty rods away; they were talking loudly; saw deceased give the other man a shove; the latter got out, taking a bag with him, and went towards King's tavern; went indoors for about ten minutes, and afterwards saw deceased turn round and trot towards Guelph; about an hour and a half afterwards saw the son of deceased driving his father's team back, and the dead body in the wagon.

WITNESS NO DOUBT have seen it if the deceased's companion had struck him; did not observe any scuffle. Deceased backed his horses in a way which showed that he was quite in his senses.

MARGARET COCHRANE said that about five o'clock she was in Mrs. Darby's, and her little boy ran in the saying that a man was at the gate with his nose bleeding. Witness paid no attention to it, until the boy came in again in half an hour, when she went out and found the deceased's wagon standing in the road. She went to it, and found deceased's face and hand cold; no pulse could be felt; he was getting on his knees with his face pushed against the front of the wagon; his mouth was free for breathing; there was no traces of blood anywhere; close to his nose was something which had been vomited; her little boy, five years old, had told her that when he first saw deceased his head was leaning on his shoulders, he had hold of the reins, and the horses were walking, the boy called "whoa" and the horses stopped at Darby's gate; the contents of the wagon were all in their places.

DAVID KING, keeper of the Rifle Range Tavern, said that about eleven o'clock on Saturday morning deceased and a man named Bennett called at his house, had either one or two glasses of liquor, and proceeded towards Guelph. Thomas Cox afterwards came along, asked if the old man had passed, and then remarked that no doubt he and the man with him would get on the spree before they got home. About six o'clock in the evening deceased and Bennett again stopped at the tavern, remained 30 or 40 minutes, and had two glasses of liquor each. Both had evidently been drinking a good deal. In ten or fifteen minutes after they left Bennett returned alone, saying that deceased had struck him two or three times on the head, that he would not stand it, and had got out. In and out of the minutes deceased passed the tavern in the direction of Guelph, at a trot, apparently all right. Bennett stayed half an hour, and then went away towards Rockwood. He and deceased had no quarrel in witness' place. Bennett had no marks of a scuffle about him. Others were in the bar at the same time as deceased, but he was not struck by any of them.

BIDWELL BENNETT, painter by trade, living on deceased's farm in the Township of Nassagaweya, said he left there with deceased between 7 and 8 a.m. on Saturday. On the road deceased had two glasses of whiskey at Martin's Hotel, and another glass at King's. Witness named the various places they went to on arriving in Guelph. They stayed at the Western Hotel, where they had some ale and bread and cheese. Witness left deceased at the stable door for half an hour, and found him in the stable on his return. They each had a glass of whiskey, and then started for home. They had three glasses of liquor each at the Rifle Range, perhaps more. Deceased was helped back into the wagon by a man named Henry, who was in the bar. Witness drove about a hundred yards, when deceased told him he was driving the wrong road, and that if he did not stop and give him the reins he would "knock the devil out of him" that the horses were his and he would drive them himself. Witness remonstrated and said he was going the right road, whereupon deceased jumped up and struck him three or four times about the head and neck. Witness got up, laid his hand on deceased's shoulder, told him he had had enough of this, got out, and returned with his own bag and books to the Rifle Range tavern. Witness was positive that he neither struck nor kicked deceased. Did not see deceased after that. Mr. King remarked that he would have stopped the horses when deceased passed if he had been aware. Witness was very much in liquor when he left the Rifle Range the last time, in Taylor's wagon, but was able to get out without assistance. Witness got up, laid his hand on deceased's shoulder, told him he had had enough of this, got out, and returned with his own bag and books to the Rifle Range tavern. DR. HEROD, who had made a post mortem examination of deceased, said there were no marks of violence upon the body. The lungs and heart were healthy, but not the stomach, the walls of which were very thin, and the cul-de-sac congested; all the other viscera appeared healthy. The membranes of the brain were considerably congested, but it was otherwise healthy, and there was nothing to show that any blows had been inflicted. He found nothing in his examination to show the cause of death, but from the evidence he thought it might be accounted for by excess of drink and excitement.

THE JURY returned a verdict of "Death from Excessive Drinking."

The Great Scandal.

The developments of this morning in reference to this all-absorbing topic are the publication of a denial from Attorney General Oumet that he ever received the \$6,000 stated by Mr. McMullen; and the issuing of the following manifesto in this morning's Mail and Leader: "We are authorized by the members of the Government referred to in the communications of Messrs. McMullen and Foster, published in the Montreal Herald and Toronto Globe of Friday, and in the Montreal Gazette of Saturday last, to state that in so far as any part of those communications, or of the documents published with them, tends or purports to implicate any member of the Government in any agreement, promise or understanding, to grant or to further the granting of the charter of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, or the contract for the building of that railway, as compensation for assistance to the late general elections or for pecuniary considerations of any kind, or upon any ground or for any reason inconsistent with their duty as members of the Government, those communications and documents are either absolutely and entirely false, or so expressed as to convey an absolutely false impression; that the arrangement referred to by the late Sir George Cartier in the published letter of the 24th August last was an arrangement personal to himself and Sir Hugh Allan, independent of, and, until published, unknown to the other members of the Government, and that it had no reference to the Canadian Pacific charter, or contract, or to the granting of furthering the granting of either of them; and that at the earliest possible moment the whole of the facts and circumstances will be laid before a tribunal competent to receive evidence respecting them under oath." This denial is in effect the same as what was stated at the time of Mr. Huntington's first making his serious charges against the Ministry, and consequently adds nothing new to the controversy. What the public want now, and what they will have, is evidence and facts, not merely shouts of "It's a lie!" The Ministry are kind enough to promise an investigation "under oath," and we suppose that the pressure of indignant popular opinion will now force on a rigid enquiry immediately, for nothing less will content the country.

"Slimy Adventure" is the Mail's latest pet name for Mr. McMullen.

The immediate assembling of Ministers is expected to take place.

The Reformers of Ottawa intend giving Mr. Huntington a grand public reception on his next arrival at the capital.

The inquest yesterday on Stephen Cox completely exculpated his companion from any suspicion of violence, and the evidence pointed to the probability that excessive drinking was the cause of death.

The publication of McMullen's statement, and the documents connected therewith, has created a profound sensation at Ottawa. Disgust, indignation, and shame is expressed by all parties.

The Spanish soldiers are beginning to vindicate their reputation for bravery and efficiency, which has sadly deteriorated of late. A telegram from a thoroughly reliable source states that they defeated a large force of Carlists, after a most obstinate and sanguinary resistance by the latter, at a town named Iquidana, in the province of Barcelona.

The Hamilton Times says:—"From the little information we have received from parties who know him personally, we are informed that the said G. W. McMullen has hitherto borne an excellent character, and comes of a good Canadian family, who formerly resided at Picton, Ontario; that a few years ago the family removed to Chicago, where they have remained since; that Mr. McMullen was connected with a newspaper there and those who knew him well say they have a strong belief that what he says is true. At all events, we are inclined to think McMullen's word will be as worthy of belief as the ex-Finance Minister, a man who was stigmatized by Sir John A. Macdonald as having been "steeped to the lips in corruption."

FORCE OF EVIDENCE.—The Mail and Leader continue to maintain the innocence of the Government, but the Montreal Gazette is not so hopeful. Its issue of Saturday it remarks:—"If the Government have explanations to offer of the extraordinary documents which are now before the public, the people of Canada will rejoice at the fact. They are entitled to a suspension of judgement until they have time to

offer those explanations. But if there is no explanation to offer, if they cannot satisfy the public either that these telegrams and despatches never were sent or received by them, or there are circumstances connected with them which remove the impression which they have created upon the public mind, the country will demand their retirement from office as the just penalty for conduct which, if not criminal, was at least indiscreet and compromising."

FINANCIAL AND STOCKS.—The Monetary Times says:—"Money is decidedly easier, and the market is very quiet. In Montreal good business paper is readily discounted at 7 1/2%; weak paper is difficult to negotiate, as there is a disposition to scrutinize everything offered very closely. Stocks continue very weak. There is a good deal of anxiety to sell, and any real sales in consequence seem to exercise a further depressing effect on the market. The speculators have all lost heavily, presuming that they must sell out at current prices, and the crippling which must ensue may only be developed hereafter in suspensions. Large shipments of specie from New York to England are attracting some attention. During last week about three and a half millions were shipped, and there are no signs of abatement, the state of the exchanges rendering exportation very profitable."

IS ROWING HURFEL?—It has always been a disputed point amongst medical men whether the great rowing matches which for the last forty years have formed such a marked feature in the great English Universities, have upon the whole acted injuriously or beneficially, as regards the health of men engaged in them. This point may now be regarded as settled by the work just published, entitled "University Oars," the production of Dr. J. E. Morgan, who possesses the double qualification for his task that he is both a well known surgeon and at the same time an eminent oarsman. By laboriously seeking out the three hundred men who have taken part in the inter-University contests, and enquiring carefully as to the results of their rowing practice upon their health and strength, Dr. Morgan found that one hundred and fifteen declare themselves to be benefited by their work, one hundred and sixty two have remarked neither special injury nor special benefit, and seventeen have been clearly injured. Upon the whole, Dr. Morgan concludes that the proportion of men injured by rowing is extremely small, and that no other pastime would, if carefully examined in the same way, exhibit such a small per centage of injury to its votaries.—Canadian Monthly for July.

A PERSUIT AND A RESCUE.—Yesterday morning, as a steer was being driven along Queen-street, St. Catharines, it suddenly became enraged, and pursued a little boy named Thomas Hastings, who ran away, and in his endeavors to get away through a hole in a board fence which was too small, he stuck fast, and the animal began butting him, till a woman rushed out and pulled him through. The steer had finally to be shot and wounded before being got under control.

The contract for the new car works and repair shops of the Great Western Railway has been awarded to Messrs. Christie & Green, of London.

The Young-st hotel, Aurora, has been burned. Insurance \$1,200.

A boy named James Gordon was drowned in the Niagara River opposite Fort Erie at 9 o'clock on Thursday morning. At last accounts the body had not been recovered.

With a wonderfully good grace, therefore, and with the aspect of one who was not only satisfied but delighted with his position, Jim unhesitatingly adopted the Indian ways, and many a time had he inwardly laugh at his strange fantastic appearance, and the curious things he required to do.

"Good gracious!" he would say to himself, as he swaggered about under the trees, "wot would Master Philip say if he saw me now? Or if he saw me in the street, or in the middle of a Regatta? My eye! if Sally Purpess got but one glimpse of my visage she'd scream and run and never look at me again. Heigh-ho! shall I ever see Sally again, or get back to civilized society? Or is it to be my fate to remain all the rest of my life among these Redskins? Goodness gracious me, the thought is frightful, and if I don't manage to bolt at once every mile we go makes the chance less."

This soliloquy was uttered by Jim towards the close of the following day, when, as the shadows of evening drew on, the party sought about for a suitable place to encamp for the night. They had journeyed all that day, and had now reached the banks of a river not very broad, but strong in its current, as was evident by the quickness with which an occasional reed floated past.

It was along the wooden shore of the stream they were now progressing in search of a glade or open place whereon to pitch their tents. Having thoroughly mixed, I dusted it with the top of a watering cruse on the potato vines in the dew of the morning about two weeks ago. There is not a bug to be seen and the potatoes are splendid. I should have added that the Paris Green was still further diluted with flour. I think one pound of the poison with twenty lbs of any white mixture that could be very thinly dusted on the vines, would be quite sufficient for an acre or two.
