A MODERN PARADISE.

THE TORONTO CITY SETTLEMENT IN THE CREEK VALLEY.

A special train from Toronto to Qu'Appelle... The departure of the first lot of settlers who were to open up the Crescent City Settlement in the Northwest territory.

Desiring to learn some interesting particulars in regard to the trip, the World... Mr. Moore will you kindly give me an account of your last trip to the Northwest territory or Crescent City settlement?

How long was your stay? Three weeks. Your train had a fast run? Yes! About half the time covered by any similar train. Only three days and nine hours to Winnipeg.

How did you enjoy your trip? Very much indeed. How long were you away? Three weeks. Your train had a fast run? Yes! About half the time covered by any similar train.

Where did you get your best runs? On the Michigan Central, 120 miles in 5 hours and on the Qu'Appelle, 125 miles in 11 hours and 30 minutes. Will you kindly give me a detailed account of the entire trip from the start from Toronto?

Certainly. The train was made up of eleven cars, and was occupied exclusively by the settlers proceeding to the Crescent City district, their farming implements, machinery, baggage and personal effects valued at over \$50,000.

Did you experience any trouble from the custom house department in Toronto in the examination of baggage, etc. None, whatever, and trouble of this kind must be altogether a thing of the past.

Well, an engine on the Chicago and Northwest broke down at the first station, and a considerable delay was occasioned in substituting another. Were you fully supplied with a comfortable coach during the entire trip? Yes, a Michigan Central coach to Chicago and a Chicago & Northwest coach to Qu'Appelle, a courtesy which added much to our convenience.

Did you meet with much snow upon your arrival at Qu'Appelle? No, none, save a few flakes at one point east. There was scarcely any snow upon the ground. Three days after we arrived there was all gone and plowing was commenced.

Will you have a railway near to the settlement there for the first year? Yes, a Michigan Central coach to Chicago and a Chicago & Northwest coach to Qu'Appelle, a courtesy which added much to our convenience.

Those who have resided there pronounce it delightful. In fact, the further west you travel, the better the climate becomes. Our Crescent Lake settlement is far ahead of Winnipeg, as Ontario is milder than Quebec.

Have you any word on your lands? Abundance. Here is one opinion from the report of Charles Falconer Milne. He says (quoting from the report): "With reference to your enquiries as to your location west of the second principal meridian, I beg to state that some of your townships came under my immediate observation. The country is a rolling prairie, with abundance of wood and water, and easy facilities for farming. The soil is excellent, consisting of rich, black clay loam, with clay subsoil. No locality in the country is better adapted for settlement, or furnishes more advantages."
