When the emigrant, says Mr. Wilson, goes out to one of the Australian colonies he perhaps takes a few hundred pounds with him, but he finds this of no ise unless he can obtain the command of very much larger means. If he enters trade, therefore, he buys his stock by means of bank credits and conducts his

pusiness almost entirely with capital supplied in the first instance by the moneyed lasses in the mother country. As an example of how this kind of thing is done. Mr. Wilson has heard recently of an Irishman who left his native country five years ago possessed of £300, and who, at the present moment, conducts a trade in New South Wales involvsupplied by one or other of the local banks. If on the other hand a man goes out determined to become a farmer, he pays for the plot of land he selects by means of advances from mortgage companies, who generally are supported by and the outcome of the joint stock banks. His means to pay for stock comes from the same sources. These companies, and the trading companies, which all exist by credit, supplied him the means to rear and feed the cattle and ent use for a fan. sheep which he raises upon his lands, trusting to recoup themselves with the orop of wool and the yield of mutton or beef when the harvest season comes.
