

DEATH-DEALING CHOLERA

395 PERSONS SUCCUMB AT NAPLES YESTERDAY.

Naples, Sept. 10.—The situation here is growing worse. In the last twenty-four hours ending 9 this evening, 937 fresh cases and 395 deaths. The ministers urged the king to leave the city, but he refused. Thursday the king visited the hospital...

Rome, Sept. 10.—During the past twenty-four hours 120 new cases of cholera and 68 deaths reported in Italy, not including Naples.

Several physicians who refused to attend cholera cases will be prosecuted. Several mayors have been suspended for not attending to their legal duties regarding the public health.

Another Asylum Outrage.

Louisville, Sept. 10.—Evans Alunt, lawyer, died suddenly at the Anchorage asylum today. Investigation shows that six lives were broken. He had been severely beaten by some of the attendants, and had no medical treatment. The attendants were dismissed.

A Toronto Family Poisoned.

New York, Sept. 10.—D. Mitchell McDonald, a lawyer of Toronto, his wife and children, were taken to the hospital on their arrival here yesterday suffering from cholera. They were taken to the hospital and the cholera was supposed to have been impregnated with copper.

The Franco-Chinese Situation.

Russian Petroleum in Place of American.

LONDON, Sept. 10.—The Standard says there is no doubt that Russia will supersede America as the source of the petroleum supply for the European markets.

Earl Dufferin's High Office.

LONDON, Sept. 10.—Earl Dufferin has been appointed viceroy of India.

CABLE NOTES.

Typhoid fever has broken out in one of the British regiments at Cairo.

Stocks & Co.'s leather works at Leeds have been destroyed at a loss of \$400,000.

The Belgian catholic newspapers are urging the Catholics to boycott liberal tradesmen.
