Ottawa, March 31.—Supplementary estimates for the current fiscal year brought down to date amount to \$897,813.74, of which \$69,553 is chargeable to capital account, \$528,260.33 to consolidated fund.

Under civil government appears the sum of \$246,688 to pay Burgess' salary as chief clerk from 1915 to 1916.

There is an amount of \$1200 to pay high commissioners' rates and taxes. Under the head of incidental appears \$2300 for Sergeant-At-Arms, \$108.50 for printing contingencies, \$35,000 for liability for 1915 to 1916.

One Cent. Deaths Unfailing Harvest.

Nearly Three Hundred Deaths in Toronto in March.

A Decrease Compared With February—An Increase Over Similar Last Year—Diphtheria and Pneumonia Fully Prevalent—Less Typhoid and Scarlet Fever—The Epidemic Passed.

The mortality returns for March are much more favorable than for three months past. There is only a slight increase in last month's number of a year ago and a marked decrease over those in January and February.

The total deaths in March claimed the same number of victims as in February, 22. Pneumonia, however, dropped from over 40, nearly a year ago to 13, in proportion to 18, of bronchitis in 1915. Typhoid has abated, only 3 of the 203 deaths being ascribed to this disease.

The Fatal Cases. In addition to the ordinary causes of death, such as old age, natural decay, influenza, etc., the following figures in last month's mortality: Diphtheria, 22, pneumonia 14, pertussis 13, bronchitis 11, in grippe 5, typhoid fever 3, scarlet fever 2, measles 2, mumps 1, total deaths 143, considerably more than one-half of the above's fatality.
