

THE TRADES PARLIAMENT.

They Review Our Local Affairs and Pass At the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last night the Legislative Committee in its report commented sarcastically on Miss Whitfield, the African missionary, being presented in Hamilton with a Winter rifle and shotgun to assist her in her work of Christianizing the heathen. They were favorably impressed with the particularly broad and liberal system of municipal government and the mode of attaining it which the Property-Owners' Association would give Toronto did they but

possess the power.

The Municipal Committee was much pleased with the statement that Architect Lennox had stated that he was more than

Lennox had stated that he was more than satisfied by the day labor system as exemplified by the work on the Court House, as it was fully 50 per cent. better than that performed by contract labor.

The committee understood that the City Council was meditating the passing of an order preventing the farmers from selling their produce elsewhere than on the market. They wished to express their disapprobation of any such measure being brought forward.

The Ratepayers' Association was subjected to a severe scorching for its ideas regarding the labor representation in the City Council, which they think might possibly compose half of that body.

Delegate O'Donoghue had heard it said that "that man Alderman Gowanlock" had stated publicly that, regardless of the wishes of his conatitutents, he was going to follow just what course he pleased. The speaker thought it would be a good idea for the electors to show him at the next election that he could not be so independent. Mr. O'Donoghue was surprised that the Municipal Committee had emitted to mention in their report the fact that an effort was being made to raise the market tariff on green produce, and moved in amendament that a clause condemning the raising of the tariff be inserted. Carried.

The Education Committee condemned in strong terms the "Star Chamber" meetings of the Public School Board, and thought that if, as stated, the meetings were held for the purpose of discussing the dismissal of incompetent teachers that such discussion could take place as well in open session as in private.

D. J. O'Donoghue moved that any movement by the City Council to abolish the 15 cent per hour labor statute be met with the most strenuous opposition. Carried.

Lindsay, '93, and experiments by Messrs. G. Anderson and H. D. Moore of the same class. Miss Lindsay, in an excellent paper, class. Messrs. Anderson and Moore, in a series of well-performed experiments, explained and illustrated the theory of "beats" in acoustics. At the close of the program the president announced that the papers read before the society during the term—'91-'92—would be published before the Christmas vacation. These papers are of deep interest and should be obtained by all students of mathematics and physics.



The last regular meeting of the Astro-nomical and Physical Society of Toronto was held at No. 78 North-drive, Rosedale, residence of Mr. Arthur Harvey. Mr. John A. Paterson, M.A., vice-president, occupied the chair. The attendance was occupied the chair. The attendance was large and the meeting proved to be one of the most interesting yet held. Mr. Garnet H. Meldrum was elected recording secretary, vice Mr. Thomas Lindsay, resigned. If was the subject of general regret that the continuously cloudy weather which has prevailed completely precluded the making of observations of any kind, but more particularly of the meteoric showers due between the 24th and 29th insts. Fortunately for those interested the earlier half of the night of the 23rd was clear, and of this night the most was made by some members of the society. Reports were received from Messrs. A. Elvins, A. F. Miller, A. T. Gilbert, J. A. Copland and Miss Anna A. Gray and Miss Sarah L. Tayfor. During three-quarters of an hour, ending at 10.05 o'clock, Miss Gray counted 125 meteors, some of which were very bright. Mr. Elvins counted 23 in a few minutes about 8 o'clock, and Mr. Copland 25 in 6 minutes, between 7.55 and 8.01. In the course of the evening 300 were observed by Mr. Gilbert. 


