

The mortality returns for the past month show a decrease of 25 compared with those of the previous month. For the first time this year no death is attributed to typhoid fever, though there is an increase from 6 to 7 in the deaths from scarlet fever. Diphtheria is only credited with 7 deaths, the lowest figure touched this year. The deaths of children and of old people are considerably below the average.

Analysis of the Returns.

At Mount Pleasant Cemetery, out of the 49 interments 19 were those of children. There were only 5 persons buried above 70 years of age; their ages respectively were 74, 77, 82, 85, 86. Heart disease was credited with 4 deaths, phthisis, diarrhosa, cholera infantum 2 each, scarlet fever, bronchitis and suffection 1 each.

5 the Necropolis the interments were three more than in the corresponding month last year. Thirteen were children, and there were only three above 70 years of age—75, 80, 84. Among the certified causes of death were. Heart disease, scarlatina, phthisis 3 each, diarrhosa 2, bronchitis, diphtheria and scarlet fever 1 each.

At 8t. James' Cemetery, out of the 49 interments were 45 fewer than a year ago. Out of the 77 interments, 64 were those of children under 14. Only two of those buried were above, 70 years of age. There were nine deaths from convulsions, 5 from phthisis, 4 each from diarrhosa, cholera infantum diphtheria and drowning, 2 from scarlet fever, 1 each pneumonia, consumption, paralysis and accident.

At 8t. Michael's there were 52 interments.

At St. Michael's there were 52 interments, a decrease of five compared with July last year. Twenty-eight ohildren were interred and six old people. The ages of the latter were 73, 74, 78, 78, 84, 88. The following were among the causes of death: Consumption 5, cholera infantum 4, scarlet fever 3, diphtheria 2, paralysis 2, heart disease, phthisis, brouchitis, convulsions I each.

At Prospect Cemetery there was a decrease of six in the number of interments compared with a year ago. Four out of the five interred were infants.

At Humber Vale Cemetery there were 14 interments—an increase of four on the pravious month.
