FINANCE AND TRADE.

A despatch from Ottawa yesterday afternoon states that the Hon. Mackenzie Bowden, emphatically denies the reports in the Globe of yesterday that the Insolvency bill will be shelved this session.

"It is questionable if anything of the kind can be accomplished in the near future," said an official yesterday to a World representative.

The drygoods section met yesterday afternoon. It was decided to join the Montreal drygoods men who are anxious to have certain changes made in the tariff. The matter of "dating ahead" will be further discussed at a future meeting. Mr. D. E. Thomson was appointed solicitor for this section.

The total imports of Vancouver, B.C., in March are valued at \$71,835, and the duty collected \$17,900.

Miss Robertson objected to this and kicked at the hotel proprietor, fracturing his watch chain. Miss Robertson claimed that Burgess slapped her face before she kicked at him. There was much contradictory testimony as to whether the young lady was slapped, but all agreed that no serious damage was done. Justice Street's charge to the jury was rather against the plaintiff. A big howl was made by some parties that Contractors Van Vlack and Farquhar were sub-letting portions of their contracts, contrary to bylaw. Engineer Keating investigated and found there was nothing in the report.

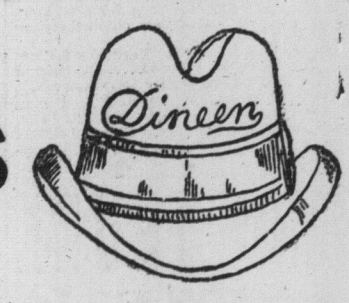
It is rumored around the hall that Otto Guelich, the Detroit contractor, has bobbed up again, and will tender for asphalt paving.

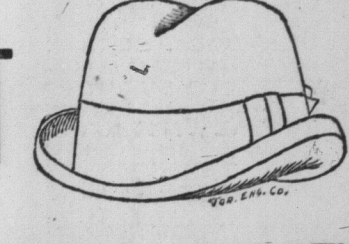

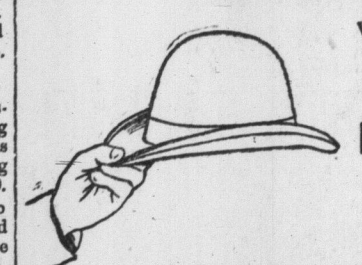
