The policy of having down the land in permanent pastures, and allowing it to re-main until the whole of the salts and alkaies are extracted from the soil, and the surface overrun with poisonous plants and insects, disease of the stock by bloating them up with acrid fat. I have constantly observed, that fat animals perish in the ex-tremes of heat and cold; the heat melting the oil, their bodies run off in a state of fusion. In cold weather the internal heat is not sufficient to prevent the condensation of the fat; and consumption of the lungs is sure to follow; and what is worse, the disease is communicated to the inhabitants. In order to demonstrate the propriety of ploughing up the old grass land, and routine cropping the soil, I will point out some remarks from the agricultural report for the year 1834, which states that there were 32,000,000 agres of land under cultivation. capable of being enlivated; 3,250,000 acres were employed in the growth of wheat, the remainder for other crops; 6,000,000 acres of waste land; but it was stated that it was not advisable to bring the waste land into a state of cultivation, because it was necessary to keep up the price of corn. There are 17,000,000 acres of the amount in pasture land. To convince the landholders of the practicability and necessity of adopting the routine cropping and soiling, or feeding the stock with mowing grass, I will point out the various experiments made in the county of East Lothian under the auspices of Sir John Sinclair, Arthur Toung, Mr. Rainey, Dr. Anderson, and others for the purpose of second Anderson, and others, for the purpose of as-certaining the comparative merits of rontine cropping, soiling and pasturing hus-bandry. Ten acres were pastured, the animals were weighed before being put in the pasture, they gained 192 lbs. avor-dupoise weight per acre, per annum, of beef and mutton. Upon the supposition, that a healthy person requires one pound and a-half per day to support him, this would be consumed in 128 days. Cattle and sheep soiled on the produce of an acre of ground, yielded 400 lbs. of beef and mut-ton, which would maintain double the number of men that pasturing would; oiling is a more cleanly way of feeding stock. In Belgium the process of soiling is generally adopted, and their butcher meat ter is infinitely superior to ours; and more than double the quantity raised from the same surface of land. How To WASH FLANNEL .- Some women possess quite a knack in washing flannel so as to prevent it fulling. It is not the soapsuds nor rinsing waters that thicken up flannel in washing, but the rubbing of it.— Cloth is fulled by being "pounced ank jounced" in the stocks of a fullingmill with soapsuds. The action of rubbing flannel on a wash-board, is just the same as that of a fullingmill. Flannel therefore should be washed in very strong soapsuds, which will remove the dixt and grease by squeezing, better than hard rubbing will in weak soap-suds. "It should also be rinsed out of the soap in very warm water, and never in cold as the fibres of the wooi do not shrink up as out of the warm soapsuds. Great care should be taken to rinse the soap completely out of the flannel. This advice will apply to the washing of blankets the same as

ladies who wish to see their lords wearing nice, glossy shirt bosoms, will to well to observe the following recipt: "Take two ounces of white-gam arabic, powder it in a pitcher, and pour on it a pint or more water, according to the degree of strength you desire, and then, having covered it let it set all night.
