The Iute ior of New Church of the Immaculate Conception—The First Lecture, Concert and High Mass-The Bles sing on the 17th.

The Free Press has had from time to time descriptions of the new church presents a very fine appearance. Street. The appearance of the exterior of the edifice, which is of brick veneer a handsomely painted roof, is attractive and highly creditable to the enterprise of the congregation, but the beauty of prise and admiration. Even the Byzantine style of architecture, scarcely prepares one for the first sight of the interior descorations. A hasty observation has led some visitors to suppose that the walls have been papered; but such is far from being the case, as the whole is painted by hand. 




