The adjourned inquest into the death of Walter Hamilton Dundin, one of the nine victims of the drowning accident off Sunnyside, on the morning of Friday last, July 26, was continued last night before Coroner J. E. Elliott. Experts swore that in their opinion the boat was badly constructed, not enough flooring being allowed to make the launch sit safely on the water. The inquest was adjourned till Aug. 8, when further evidence will be submitted.

PERMANENT COURT FOR WORLD'S PEACE

With Expenses Borne by All, to Encourage Appeals to its Wisdom.

THE HAGUE, Aug. 1.—Mr. Choate, supporting the proposal for the establishment of a permanent court of arbitration, said the instructions given to the American delegates were to see that the judges of this court be selected from the different countries and should represent the different systems of law and procedure and the most important languages of the world. The court was to be of such dignity, consideration and rank that the best and ablest jurists could accept appointment thereto. The whole world must have absolute confidence in their judgments.

LITTLE GIRL THE VICTIM OF THIRD BRUTAL MURDER

Had Been Assaulted—Body Then Concealed in Cellar—A Maniac's Work.

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—The graveyard, as the foreign population part of First-avenue, between Thirteenth and Fourteenth-street, is known locally, was the place of a fresh crime, it was discovered to-day by the police. The victim was a little girl, who like her mother, was a victim of a third murder. The latest found victim was an eight-year-old girl, who was brutally murdered before her death. The three murders apparently were committed in a single day, and the police are strikingly similar means.

DOMINION GETS TRENT PROPERTY TO AVE POLICE

The Province Transfers Locks, Dams, Water Rights and Lands—Patentees Safe.

OTTAWA, Aug. 1.—(Special).—An agreement has been reached between the Dominion Government and the Government of Ontario, by which the province transfers to the Dominion all the locks, dams, rights in waters and flooded lands owned by it along the Trent Valley Canal.

BIRRELL DEFENDS.

LONDON, Aug. 1.—Defending the action of the government in rushing 7000 troops into Belfast for strike duty, Chief Secretary for Ireland Birrell declared in the house of commons to-day that the mutinous action of a portion of the constabulary and the continuation of the strike necessitated decided measures.

C. P. R. CROP REPORT.

MR. FOY, J. WALTER CURRY, THE GRAND TRUNK AND THE "REPEALED-BY-IMPLICATION" DOCTRINE.

Two cents a mile railway passenger travel is in sight in Canada. It will be here much sooner than most people imagine; but there is a good deal of fighting yet to be done and a good deal to be done in the way of exposure of the enemies of cheaper rates and especially those enemies who take the shape of newspapers and public men. Most of our rivals are feeling very bad that The World's girls who are off to London to see the King and The World's fight for a penny-a-mile both made good on the same day.

INSISTS ON PUNISHMENT.

MADRID, Aug. 1.—The impartialists at Casablanca must be punished. This paper believes that European rivalries as well as the ferocity of the natives are responsible for the bloodshed at Casablanca and it advocates either the denunciation of the Algerian agreement or the convocation of a new conference.

FRANCE ROUSED BY MOROCCAN MURDERS

Arabs Attack and Kill Europeans in Holy War Outrage—Sultan Will Have to Answer For it!

TANGIER, Aug. 1.—On the pretext that there were displeased with the harbor works, three tribes raided Casablanca, one of the chief seaports of Morocco, and massacred the native guards and five Frenchmen, two Spaniards and one Italian. The other Europeans in the city, together with a number of Jews, took refuge on a German ship, which has arrived here.

On Monday a number of Arab chiefs entered Casablanca and demanded that the harbor improvement works cease. The pasha of Casablanca pointed out that this work was being done with the sanction of the sultan, whereupon the chiefs replied that the sultan was no longer their ruler, as he obeyed the Christians. They then began to incite the natives to exterminate all Jews and Europeans in the town.

SHOT DOWN IN STREETS.

On Tuesday morning the natives began their attack by stoning a European and as the man tried to flee he was surrounded and hacked to pieces. This was the signal for a general attack. As soon as the danger became known the French and Spanish residents rushed to their respective consulates for protection.

M. D'Euville, the French consul, demanded that the pasha provide a court for the recovery of the bodies of those killed. The pasha pleaded at first that he had no jurisdiction, but upon further representations he finally supplied an escort. When this rescue party, however, reached the scene of the attack they were met by a force of Arab cavalrymen and forced into flight.

PASHA'S LIFE A FORTUIT.

PARIS, Aug. 1.—The Pasha of Casablanca will answer with his head to the French government for the general security of the city. This is the ultimatum which the French cruiser Galilee, due to reach Casablanca to-day is conveying. The French cruiser Forbin, now at the Azores, also has been ordered to proceed to Casablanca immediately.

BRITISH COMMENT STRONG.

LONDON, Aug. 1.—The morning papers comment strongly on the state of anarchy revealed by the massacre at Casablanca, Morocco, and declare that it is evident that the sultan is powerless to preserve order. The powers, therefore, they assert, are bound to take measures to exact retribution and stem the lawlessness.

THE DAILY NEWS SAYS: "NOBODY WOULD BLAME FRANCE FOR DECIDING THAT IT IS UNWISE TO PROCEED WITH A POLICY WHICH MERELY TOYS WITH THE FRINGE OF THE QUESTION."

The Daily News says: "Nobody would blame France for deciding that it is unwise to proceed with a policy which merely toys with the fringe of the question. In the end, however, the Moroccan difficulty must be solved in Berlin before it is faced at Fez." The Daily Graphic declares that the whole of Morocco is laughing at the inability of Europe to secure Maclain's release. The Algerian compromise, it asserts, is worse than useless, and the time has arrived for the powers to authorize France and Spain to occupy Fez.
