They asserted in June, 1899, that the Boers were generally armed with the Martini-Henry rifle, an attempt to popularize the Mauser having failed There were, it was alleged, no more than 27,000 Mausers in South Africa, for the 56,500 combatants whom the British were destined to confront. As a matter of fact, an overwhelming majority of the Boers were found to be armed with the Mauser, while only an infinitesimal proportion were equipped with the old black-powder-using meapons. There were Mausers enough, not only for the levies of the two republics and Cape Colony. On the other hand, the total number of cannon in the possession of the two republics seems to have been stated with tolerable accuracy in the se-cret report. In regard to the efficiency of the gaus, however, the compliers made statements which were not justified by events. They asserted that, both in ma-terial and personnel, the enery's field
