

### HISTORICAL MEMORANDA

IN CONNECTION WITH

## THE FREE CHURCH, COTE ST.

#### NOW

### CRESCENT STREET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

- The Congregation was organized, and for seven years ministered to by Deputies from the Free Church of Scotland.
- 1844.—The Rev. W. C. BURNS, arrived in the Summer, and preached to large audiences in St. Gabriel Street Free Church.
- " The REV. J. MACNAUGHTON, of Paisley, arrived a little later, and continued the work in the same church.
- 1845.—The Rev. J. BONAR, of Larbert, arrived in Spring, preached in St. Gabriel Street Free Church till a temporary wooden church was erected in Lagauchetiere Street. He opened this Church on May 11th, and on the 25th of May ordained the first elders, viz.: John Redpath, James R. Orr, David Ferguson, Evander MacIver.
  - " The REV. W. ARNOT, of Glasgow, arrived about this time, and supplied the pulpit till the end of September.
  - " The Rev. A. N. SOMERVILLE, of Glasgow, took charge during October and November.
  - " The REV. W. C. BURNS, in November, received but declined a call to labour in Canada, the Congregation promising to support him. In December he was again urged to fall in with this request, but finally declined on January 19th, 1846.
- 1846.—The Rev. G. STEVENSON, of Peebles, ministered from January to April.
- " The Kev. T. MACLAUGHLIN, of Peebles, ministered during May and June.
- " The Rev. J. MUNRO, of Rutherglen, ministered during July and August.
- " The Rev. J. ALEXANDER, of Kirkcaldy, ministered from November to March, 1847.
- 1847.—The Rev. J. B. DUNCAN, then a student, ministered during April and part of May.
  - " The REV. J. MACGILLIVRAY, of Aberdeen, opened the Church in Cote Street, on Sabbath, the 16th May, preaching morning and evening, while the Rev. Henry Wilkes preached in the afternoon.
- " The REV. J. BUCHANAN, of Bothwell, ministered from May to October.
- " The Rev. R. BREMNER, of Glasgow, ministered from November to April.
- 1848.—The Rev. J. PATTERSON, of Tranent, ministered from May to October.
- 1849.—The REV. J. LEWIS, of Leith, ministered from April to August. "The REV. J. C. BURNS, of Kirkliston, ministered from September to February, 1850.
- 1850.-The Rev. J. C. FAIRBAIRS, of Allanton, ministered from August to October.
- 1850.—The Rev. D. COUPER, of Burntisland, ministered from November to February, 1851.

1851 .- The Rev. D. FRASER, ordained Pastor, August 8th, 1851.

1859 .- The REV. D. FRASER, translated to Inverness, Scotland, February 3rd, 1859.

1859.—The REV. B. F. GREIG, ministered four months from April, 1859. The REV. HUGH COBBAN, of Braemar, ministered from Sept., 1859, to Jan., 1860.

1860 .- The REV. GEORGE LEWIS, ministered several months from May. The REV. WM. SCRIMGEOUR ministered from Nov., till Jan. 1861. 1860 .- Debt on Cote Street Church extinguished.

1861 .- The REV. D. H. MACVICAR, inducted Pastor, January 30th, 1861. 1868 .- The REV. D. H. MACVICAR, translated to Presbyterian College, Montreal, Sept. 10th, 1868. 1870.—The Rev. R. F. Burns, inducted Pastor, May 4th, 1870. 1875.—The Rev. R. F. Burns, translated to Halifax, February 22nd, 1875.

The Chairman having made some remarks upon the report and work of the past year, then read a long and very interesting letter from the Rev. J. H. MacVicar, our Missionary in China. After praise and prayer, the business of the meeting was brought to a close and an adjournment made to the Lecture Hall to partake of refreshments which had been provided for the occasion.

The year 1889 will henceforth be one of the memorable dates in the history of this congregation, for during its course we were freed from every burden and thoroughly equipped for all the work we have to do. It was thought a fitting occasion to bring to memory facts in our past history unknown to the younger portion of the congregation, and no one was better fitted to do this than one who had so long been pastor of the Church, the Rev. Principal MacVicar, D.D., LL.D. Instead, therefore, of the Annual Address which appears in the report, it was felt that there could be nothing more appropriate or interesting than Dr. MacVicar's remarks at our Annual Meeting. Let us all ponder them carefully, and getting from them that holy stimulus they are so fitted to give, press on, in the strength of the Lord, to higher achievements.

In seconding the motion for the adoption of the report, Dr. MacVicar spoke to the following effect :—

"In view of the matter and spirit of this report we have reason, as a congregation, to be filled with gratitude and joy. On a memorable occasion in the history of the Old Testament Church it is said, "Then the people rejoiced, for that they offered willingly, because with a perfect heart they offered willingly to the Lord." It appears to me that our circumstances to-night are in some degree similar to those referred to in these words. Our Church debt has been paid, and there has been no diminution, but on the contrary an increase in the measure of support given to gospel work at home and abroad. To God be all the praise and glory because he enabled "the people to offer willingly." Permit me to say that this is no new thing in their history, I have been connected with this Church since January, 1861, and I have looked carefully into its history and accounts from the beginning in 1843, and feel bound to say that the people have been characterized all along by a true spirit of christian liberality.

The erection of the temporary wooden edifice on Lagauchetiere Street, where the congregation met for a time, and afterwards of the substantial and costly church in Coté Street, opened in 1847, displayed a faith and a liberality which perhaps have not yet been surpassed. The memory of the blessed services and self-sacrifices of those days is fresh and sacred in the hearts of some who are still with us, and we certainly do not wish, in this hour of gladness, to forget what was done by the sainted men and women who have gone to their reward. It is well that the present generation should emulate their example and recall what they did for the cause of missions, home and foreign, what they did in planting churches, in founding and supporting colleges and benevolent institutions.

The long succession of distinguished men of God brought from Scotland to serve in the pulpit did much to spread a true missionary spirit in our city and country. I need only mention in the succession, to make the matter obvious, such men as W. C. Burns, Dr. John Bonar, Dr. Walter MacGilvray, John MacNaughton, James C. Burns, John Lewis, James Lewis, Dr. Andrew Somerville, the world-renowned Evangelist, and others who preceded the first Pastor, Dr. Donald Fraser, of London.

Not less important was the part taken in promoting the spread of evangelical truth by our Deacons and Elders. Here are names of some who have passed away from among us that should always be had in honour : James Orr, Dr. MacNider, John Redpath, James Court, John Campbell, Joseph Mackay, Judge Torrance, James Dunbar and James Davison. With the exception of the first two, it was my privilege to be associated with all of them in christian work for years, and I do not expect to see a more devoted and exemplary company of office bearers. I could say much of their fidelity in maintaining purity of communion and of their earnest zeal and noble efforts.

Mr. Court and Mr. Redpath, along with the late Dr. Taylor, of Erskine Church, the late Dr. Wilkes, of Zion Church, and a few others of kindred spirit who joined them, may be regarded as the founders of what has since become our large and prosperous work of French Evangelization. The method of directing the work is now changed, but the faith, courage and liberality of those by whom the mission was projected and sustained at the outset should never be forgotten.

At a later period, during my own pastorate, the congregation founded the Nazareth Street Mission, and erected the building which it occupies. A good and most useful work has been done there under the leadership of Mr. James Ross, one of our Elders, who has faithfully stood at his post for thirty years; and, as an evidence of the spirit of the teachers he has from time to time gathered round him, it may be mentioned that several of them are now Missionaries and Ministers of the gospel.

As the proposal of Mr. Redpath, St. Joseph Street (now Calvin) Church was initiated; and for a considerable number of years, our congregation contributed one thousand dollars per annum towards its support. It is now a strong self-sustaining Church.

The part taken by Mr. Redpath in founding that excellent public charity, the House of Industry and Refuge, of which he was the first President, deserves special mention.

Judge Torrance, who served most conscientiously for many years as Superintendent of our Church Sunday School, was chiefly instrumental in securing the erection of the Mission House at Petite Cote; and he and Mr. David Morrice sustained for a time a similar undertaking, at considerable personal outlay, at Cote St. Antoine, not far from the site of Melville Church. I need not tell you how thoroughly his heart was in the work of the godly training of the young.

The Mile End Sunday School, out of which the vigorous congregation of Chalmer's Church has grown, was opened by me at the suggestion of Judge Torrance, and placed under the superintendence of Mr. Jas. Phymister, who for several years conducted the School with marked energy and success.

Referring to educational work, I have said that this congregation has aided nobly in founding and supporting Colleges. May I be allowed to particularize for a moment. During many years generous contributions were made by it to the ordinary and building funds of Knox College, Toronto.

Then look at that admirable humane educational establishment, the MacKay Institute, built by the liberality of our late Elder, Joseph Mackay, whose hospitable home was ever open to christians of all ranks and denominations. Few know also what he and others of our Elders did to bring Ministers from Scotland to Canada in the early period of our history when Collegiate facilities with ourselves were far from being what they are now.

The history of McGill College furnishes abundant evidence of the liberality of our people. Peter Redpath, the donor of the magnificent and costly Museum which bears his name, was one of our most devoted Deacons, and was twice elected to the Eldership. To his munificence also that institution owes the endowment of the Peter Redpath Chair and a rich and unique historical department in its library; nor do I forget his gift of Migne's Patrologia and other valuable collections to the library of the Presbyterian College. But the mention of the last named institution brings into view the large hearted generosity of many others. We have these endowments to be perpetually known as the Joseph Mackay Chair, the Edward Mackay Chair, the John Redpath Chair, the Hugh Mackay Scholarship, and the William Brown Scholarship.

The last contribution I mention, and the largest the Presbyterian College has received from one person, and which supplied a most pressing want and greatly promoted the efficiency of the institution, was the gift of an Elder, Mr. D. Morrice, whose labors as Superintendent of our Sunday School, and whose energy and liberality in connection with the building of this Church we all know how to appreciate. I refer to the David Morrice Hall and Library. And here I cannot refrain from joining with him Mr. John Stirling, Secretary of the College Board, whose cheerful liberality, along with that of others, in the recent removal of our church debt, and the improvements which have been made, you have tonight so properly acknowledged from the Chair. Will you permit a word, Mr. Moderator, in regard to your own share in this business. I remember well that, in the first formal interview which the Kirk Session held with you before you consented to become Pastor, you disclaimed all inclination or skill to deal with church debts. But what you have done for the augmentation of Minister's Stipends throughout Canada, and the results of the past year's work, with its income of over forty thousand dollars—so largely due to your personal efforts and energy—all prove that you possess in no small degree the gift of financial management.

I only add that we have all along done something for Foreign Missions, but of late, under your guidance, we have taken up this work in earnest; and we have now three members of the Church along with their wives, Missionaries in China, and one of them wholly sustained by the congregation. Surely these few reminiscences, which I must not further extend, furnish reasons for thankfulness to God and of encouragement in the future. And what is that future to be? Far better, let us hope, than the past. Others are sure to appear who, by divine grace, shall emulate the example of their predecessors and surpass all that they were enabled to do. There is a great future before our country and our city. We are ever apt to forget this, and to expect far too little from God and His Church. Let us then go forward, believing that He will do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think."

Thus speaks our friend with the authority of one who has been acquainted with these things for the past twentynine years, and surely the Divine Voice is calling to us now as really as it once did to Israel, "GO FORWARD."

## Report of the Deacons' Court FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1889.

In presenting the customary report of the work of the Church, specially devolving upon the Deacons' Court, we feel that it discloses abundant cause for thankfulness to God, more especially the fact that the congregation has been relieved of the burden of debt which has been upon us since coming to our present place of worship, while at the same time the other departments of the Church work have been fully sustained. The Treasurer's statement will show that the receipts during the year, from all sources, amount to more than \$40,000.

#### WEEKLY OFFERINGS.

The receipts on this account for the year amount to \$8674.06, of which \$7391.91 in envelopes and \$1282.15 by plate collections, making the weekly average \$166.81. Comparing these results with the previous year's figures, there is a falling off of \$953.49. This may be accounted for by the special effort to liquidate the Church debt, to which reference is made later on. Should we however include subscriptions to the Foreign Mission Fund, amounting to over \$2000, our offerings for Missionary and Benevolent purposes are in excess of the previous year. The Court is hopeful that in response to the recent appeal the Weekly Offering for 1890 may exceed that of past years.

#### PEW RENTS.

The income from this source has been \$4379.85, an increase of \$156.66 over the preceding year. It will be seen that the year began with a debit of \$783.68, and that it closes with a credit of \$127.76, thus showing that our income has exceeded the outlay by \$911.44, which is certainly very satisfactory. The Court, taking into consideration the fact that the charge for interest on debt will from henceforth disappear from this account, has agreed to recommend that the charge for "Manse Rent" shall be debited to this account instead of Weekly Offering, as heretofore, thus enabling us to devote so much more to Missionary and Benevolent Schemes.

#### BUILDING FUND OR REAL ESTATE ACCOUNT.

In our report for 1888 reference was made to the effort for liquidation of the debt, and for other objects, and it is our pleasing duty to report that this has been crowned with abundant success, as will appear by reference to the Treasurer's statement. The total of subscriptions promised amount to \$34,105, of which \$23,405 have already been paid in, and the balance is bearing interest. This gratifying result has enabled the Court to wipe off the debt due upon the Church, to procure a first class organ, to renovate and re-carpet the Church, to build the porch on Crescent Street, to fit the Church throughout with electric wires, preparatory to that mode of lighting; as well as other necessary and useful improvements, all of which the Court trusts may be fully appreciated by the Congregation. The lot on Dorchester street has also been sold subject to such restrictions as were considered essential for the protection of the Church property. The Treasurer's account will show the disposition of money received on this account, so that farther reference to it is needless here.

The Court cannot pass from this subject without congratulating the Congregation upon the spirit of liberality which has enabled it to reach this long desired end, but at the same time it is but right to place on record our appreciation of our Pastor's untiring exertions in this connection, and to which its success is mainly due.

#### ALLOCATIONS TO MISSIONS.

Notwithstanding the falling off in Weekly Offerings it is gratifying to know that after providing for the regular charges against the fund, there remains a balance of \$2302.21 for distribution, being \$428 in excess of last year. This result has only been made possible by the extinguishment of the debt, a proportion of which was formerly a claim upon this fund. The Court recommends the allocation of this sum to be as follows:—





His engagement commenced on first July last, and the generous contributions to this fund enabled us to send Mr. MacVicar, and his wife, to their field of labor free of charge upon the funds of the Foreign Mission Board.



Comparing these figures with those of the previous year there is a decrease of two in our teaching staff but an inrease of thirty-five in scholars, which latter is cause for thankfulness. We are much in need of additional Teachers, and therefore extend a cordial invitation to any who may be willing to aid in this good work to join us.

#### BIBLE CLASSES.

Mr. Robt Johnston having been called away from the City we were thus deprived of a valued worker. We are glad however to be able to report that such arrangements have been made that we have now, connected with the School, three Bible classes, taught by Miss MacMaster, Mr. S. S. Bain, and Dr. F. W. Kelley, and that these are all well attended. In addition to these the Rev. Principal MacVicar conducts a class, every Sabbath afternoon, in the church, at which there is an average attendance of over one hundred. It will thus be seen that the instruction of the young as well as those of more mature years has been fully provided for.

#### MISSIONS.

In this department of our work we have continued cause for thankfulness, the financial results showing a slight advance over 1888, which, up to that time had been the premium year in the history of the School. Our contributions are made up as follows:

In addition to this a "Thanksgiving day" offering, for the Children's ward in the Hospital, was also asked for and liberally responded to.

Now that our church has as a Missionary in the Foreign field, one who was formerly a member of the School, we look for an even increased interest in Mission work, stimulated no doubt by occasional letters from Mr. MacVicar to the School.

#### LIBRARY.

We have again to record a substantial addition to our Library, and at the same time have been enabled to assist two country schools by donations of books removed to make room for new ones.

#### PAPERS.

We continue to distribute monthly, the following Sunday School papers viz:—"British Workman," "Children's Friend" and "Infant's Magazine." In addition to these the Deacons' Court supplies to the Congregation, and thus of course to the children, the "Messenger for the Children," which contains much interesting Missionary intelligence.

#### PIC-NIC.

A new departure in this connection was made this year in having our gathering near home. On Thursday, 20th June, a very pleasant day was spent at the Athletic Club House and Grounds, and we have reason to believe that the change gave much satisfaction. We have again to thank the friends by whose liberality we were enabled to have the gathering.

#### REWARDS.

At the request of the Teachers our Pastor, Dr. MacKay, prepared the questions for our usual examinations on the lessons and golden texts for the last quarter of the year, and also conducted the examinations. Dr. MacKay reports that the results showed a very fair acquaintance with the lessons by all who took part. It is to be regretted that a larger number of Scholars do not take part in these exercises, the preparation for which would doubtless impress the lessons more fully upon their minds and hearts.

The recital of the Shorter Catechism has also been continued during the year and the report to be made by Dr. MacKay will show that considerable interest has been taken in the exercise.

The prizes in connection with these examinations will be presented this evening.

#### OFFICE-BEARERS.

We have no changes to report in this connection, but think it well to refer here to the effort made by Scholars and Teachers to mark their appreciation of the long and faithful service rendered to the School by our Honorary Superintendent, Mr. Morrice. It was decided to have a portrait, in oil, of Mr. Morrice to be hung up in the School, which has been done, and there being a surplus of funds it was further agreed to furnish a room at the Pointe-aux-Trembles Schools to be called the DAVID MORRICE ROOM, thus identifying our School with a work which for many years has had our sympathy and support.

#### MEETINGS.

The regular monthly business meetings have been held as usual and also the Sabbath afternoon meeting for prayer. At this meeting the attendance has been unusually encouraging. God grant that in answer to the prayers there offered up an abundant blessing may indeed follow the teaching of His own Word.

In presenting to our friends our 31st annual report, we do so with much thankfulness to God for manifold blessings during the past year, and that we are privileged to meet together at another Christmas Social.

Thus after a careful revision we have an increase of 7 scholars.

Our annual picnic was held this year at Beauharnois, we went by boat, and altogether a very pleasant day was spent.

We have a well filled Library of good books, which is used pretty generally by the scholars, who are also freely supplied with religious papers and tracts.

Prizes are given to those who correctly repeat the Shorter Catechism and Golden Texts for the year, and a Silver Medal and Books to those bringing in new scholars during the year.

The Lady Teachers have met every Tuesday since October 8th, till the end of December as a Dorcas Society, and clothing, shoes, etc., are distributed to those who are in need.

Singing classes have also been held every Tuesday since October 8th, conducted by Mr. A. Hyde and Miss Dawson.

The Band of Hope, with Mr. A. Hyde as President, resumed its meetings on October 18th, and are held every Friday fortnight since, there is a good attendance and many have signed the pledge. A choice and attractive programme is given at each meeting, and the principles of temperance brought prominently before them.

A Missionary society of the young people of the School meets every second Thursday, when missionary items are read, and considerable interest is manifested in it.

We have this year purchased a new organ, replacing the old one, that has served us for many years

Our collections this year amount to \$267.84, a slight increase of \$13.93 over last year.

## Mission Work in Griffintown.

Our report of missionary work done in Griffintown dates back to the beginning of May, at which time Messrs. Johnston and MacVicar severed their connection with the mission.

The services have been continued as formerly, viz:-Sabbath evening service at 7 o'clock, and the weekly praver meeting every Thursday evening at 8 o'clock. Both these services have been attended all along very fairly. Strangers have found their way into the mission hall at almost every meeting, and in this way we have been enabled to reach not a few families in the neighbourhood. The services have been characterised by good order throughout, and the attention all that could be desired. The number present at our Sabbath evening service has varied from fifty to one hundred and thirty, and the prayer-meeting from fifteen to forty. As far as we can ascertain, the class of people who usually attend go to no other church, nor indeed could the majority of them be induced to go to any of the up-town congrega-A rather encouraging feature we should here refer tions. to-the number of young men and women who attend our Sabbath evening service. We look upon this as a rather healthful sign in a district where so many adverse influences are at work.

Cases of destitution are not so frequent as we anticipated this winter, but we have come across a sufficient number to indicate the helpless condition of the labouring classes when employment is not to be obtained. The amount so generously donated to us from the Bible Class has been a great boon on our rounds in the alleviation of some very deserving cases, also the articles of clothing kindly sent by members of the congregation. We would take the liberty through this report of suggesting to the members of the congregation who have time at their disposal, the valuable assistance they could render the work in Griffintown by dropping in occasionally to our meetings. We are convinced that nothing will supply the lack of coming personally into contact with those whom the mission aims at benefitting. We could not over-estimate the valuable assistance rendered to us by the teachers. Through their kind co-operation we have succeeded in gaining access to not a few homes otherwise unknown to us. Indeed in some instances they have induced the most hopeless cases to attend our meetings, some of which appear now promising.

Before closing this report we must make reference to the high esteem in which our predecessors were held by all with whom they came in contact. We look upon it as a privilege to enter on the labours of those who were so highly appreciated in the neighbourhood. We trust our labours will also be fruitful with some results, though we cannot hope to follow in their foot-steps but a great way off.
