The people are awfully dirty and lazy; the women dike out in a lot of bum jewelry, and wear a veil across the lower part of their face. They carry their children straddle of their hips, and on account of their religion won't let the kids "shoo" flies off their face—kind of tough on the kids, and generally makes them have sore eyes.



Of course the pyramid and the Sphinx are the greatest sights in Egypt, and we drove out there from Cairo. There are nine pyramids, and the tallest one is 470 foot high—considerably taller than a New York sky-scraper. They are hollow and were originally built as tombs for the Egyptian kings and queens. The Sphinx is a whopping big stone image of a lion, with a man's head on it, and was worshiped years ago as a god. It is 128 feet leng and 68 feet high.

We went up the nile in a boat as far as Assam, which is over the border in Nubia, where the bla kest colored gentlemen you over saw live. They go in for dress reform over there, and instead of wearing corrects and French heel shoes the woman wear a ring in their nose and one in each en—and a kind of shell girdle around their waist. The children wear rings in their nose and ears and that is about all. Sometimes they wear a string around their waist. They are fine swimmers, though, and live in the water.

No man has yet so complete a control of the market as to "corner' 'the necessaries of life. The farmer feeds them all, which fact is coming to be realized more than ever. He is at the bottom of the productive world. By his exertions, all the delicate social machinery moves. There are other distributors of this wealth, but the farmer is the creator. Hitherto he has borne the heavy end of the stick, and it is time he was assuming some of the good things. Let




