THE SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK AND PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND CONFERENCE, began in ST. JOHN, New Brunswick, at 9 o'clock, a. m. on Wednesday, June 23rd, 1880; the REV. HEZEKIAH McKEOWN, President, in the chair.

After the reading of the Scriptures by the Secretary the 478th hymn was sung, and the Revs. Drs. Stewart and Pickard offered prayer.

**Question VII.—Who have died since the last Conference ?**

**REV JOSEPH HART**

was born in Guysboro', N.S., in the year 1833. He was the child of pious parents, whom God has singularly honoured, in calling three of their sons to the work of the Christian Ministry in the Methodist Church of these provinces. At the age of fourteen, he was converted, and was favoured with an indisputable evidence of his acceptance with God. Although early impressed with the idea that God would have him labor in the work of proclaiming the Gospel, he for sometime timidly shrank from the thought of devoting himself wholly to this sacred service.

By a train of most unlooked for circumstances, the path of duty was made unmistakably apparent. His convictions of a Divine call to the Ministry, ever afterwards, were most clear and strong. In speaking of it, he was wont to say, "I was thrust out into the work." In the year 1853 he was received on trial for the work of the Ministry, and having fulfilled a highly satisfactory, and useful probation of four years, was taken into full connection, and ordained at the Conference held in Sackville, N.B., in the year 1857. His ministerial life of 26 years was spent in various spheres of labor.

In Nova Scotia, he occupied in succession—Margaret's Bay, Horton, Shelburne, Newport, Lunenburg, Petite Rivere, Liverpool, Annapolis, Yarmouth, and Granville circuits. In New Brunswick, his stations were Sackville, and Exmouth street, and Centenary churches of St. John. Mr. Hart's qualifications for his life's work were of no common order. His natural endowments were of a superior stamp. He was possessed of a high

ly vigorous and active intellect, associated with fine mental tastes. These precious gifts he sought through his whole life to develop and mature by the most diligent and conscientious study. His love of books rendered him familiar with the higher walks of Literature and Science.

Having a justly large conception of the attainments required for the ministry, in view of the claims of the Church and of the age, he laid the foundation of his knowledge broadly, and availed himself of every facility within his reach, to secure acquaintance with any subject which might bear upon the work of his life. Thus equipped he was prepared as occasion required, from time to time, to expose the fallacies of certain principles of modern philosophy which conflict with the word of God. His Spiritual investiture was equally rich and full. When a student at Sackville, having been led to make an entire consecration

himself to Christ, he experienced such a plenary baptism of the Holy Ghost and obtained such an assuring insight into the mysteries of the kingdom of grace, as rendered him through all following years strong in the Lord and established in the faith of the Gospel. Thus intellectually and spiritually prepared is it any wonder that Mr. Hart's ministry should have been distinguished by marked success. His preaching was distinguished by large intelligence, soundness of doctrine, evangelical truth, irrespressible earnestness, and most impassioned appeal. In every field of toil he proved the truth of the Divine promise, "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him." On some circuits more especially was this the case; and we have reason to believe that large numbers gathered into the Church of Christ through his instrumentality will be stars in the crown of his rejoicing in the day of the

Lord Jesus. As a pastor he was rarely gifted with those qualities which adapted him to this important department of ministerial service. His deeply sympathetic nature and great hopefulness of disposition, made him ever welcome in the chamber of the sick and dying. The fruits of his devotion to the spiritual welfare of all who came within the sphere of his influence, will never be known in their full extent until the grand "Harvest Home" shall arrive. The material, as well as the spiritual, interests of Methodism ever commanded his enlightened regard, his most liberal patronage and powerful support. In many parts of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, church edifices, notable for their commodiousness and architectural beauty, are standing today as monuments of his advanced ideas and enterprising zeal. Such were his administrative ability, and his loyalty to the doctrines and entire economy of Methodism, that not only were the most important circuits entrusted to his care, but he was invested with the highest honors it was in the power of his brethren to bestow. Elected President of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Conference of 1878, he represented that body in the General Conference which assembled in Montreal that same year. During his occupancy of the ~~Barn~~mouth st. Station, the calamitous fire of 1877 occurred, devolving upon him a crushing weight of responsibility and toil. The ruinous effects of this terrible strain upon his already impaired health, became sadly apparent to all but himself. After the Conference of last year he entered upon the pastorate of Centenary Church with large expectations. The grandeur of his proposed plans of labors in his new sphere was worthy of the best antecedents of his life. None, but they who knew something of the loving tenacity with which he was accustomed to

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cling to any enterprise in which he had embarked can at all appreciate the bitterness of his disappointment when stern disease compelled the abandonment of his fondly cherished hopes. Insidiously, but surely, and with increasing strength, his disease gained upon him; but amid all his weariness, and weakness, and pain that grace which he had offered with so much confidence to others proved its sufficiency for his own comfort and support. Speaking of his hopeless illness he remarked: "At first I had a severe struggle, but it was short, and now I am fully resigned to the will of God. I have no great emotions of joy, but I have a sweet restfulness of soul. I am resting on the Atonement." In the course of his last night on earth he was heard saying repeatedly, "A sure foundation." A few minutes before his sweet release, he whispered distinctly, "It is all right." Shortly after he said to his attendants, "Turn me over." Then, lifting his eyes to Heaven, he seemed to be watching for the outburst of the glory. Nor had he long to wait. The curtain was lifted, and his pure spirit passed into the joy of his Lord. Thus departed our dear brother in the forty-seventh year of his age, and the twenty-seventh of his ministry. The obliterating waves of the surging ages shall wash out all earthly records of his life and labors; even the stately edifices which here and there exist as the monuments of his devotion and zeal shall crumble into their original elements, but that spiritual temple, into whose walls Joseph Hart has builded so many living stones shall continue to rise, until, in Divine completeness, and resplendent with the light and glory of eternity, it shall be the admiration of the angels and the joy of God.

4—“ Each circuit shall be considered as responsible for a yearly sum, equal at the least, on a general average of all the societies, included within that circuit, to ten cents per member ; the number of the members being taken in all cases as returned at the preceding Conference, and published in the Minutes.

5—“ Every Minister shall, at the renewal of the Society Tickets during the September visitation, fully explain to the members the nature and reasonableness of the claims of this Fund upon the justice and liberality of our church. He shall then enter in the Class Book the individual annual subscriptions, which are to be paid before the ensuing District Meeting.

6—“ An annual public collection in aid of this Fund shall be made in all churches and other preaching places in the month of December.

7—“ Applications shall be made to our friends in each Circuit for subscriptions and donations in aid of this Fund.”

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#### VI—SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE REPORT.

The Annual Meeting of the Sabbath School Committee of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference was held in the Queen Square Methodist Church, St. John, N.B., June 23rd, 1880. In the absence of the President, the Rev. L. S. Johnson was called to the chair, and on motion the Rev. Robert Wilson

was re-elected Secretary, and the Rev. Isaac Howie, Treasurer, for the current year. After a very careful consideration of the various phases of this important work the following Report was unanimously adopted.

Your Committee in view of the fact that this is the Centennial year of the history of Sabbath Schools, deems it both a duty and a privilege to unite with its fellow workers of every name, in recording its gratitude to God for the evident tokens of his presence and approval graciously vouchsafed to this Institution all along its career, and rejoices in the belief that in the marvellous results realized the Methodist Church claims no inconsiderable share. And as in its incipient stages we were among the first to recognize its importance and lend it our influence, now in its maturer age and with its more efficient organization none among the tribes of the Lord are doing more through its instrumentality than the various members of the great Methodist family.

Nowhere perhaps, all things considered have Sabbath Schools been more successful than in "this Canada of ours," for from the sea-swept shores of Newfoundland to those of far-off Columbia multitudes of the little ones are being Christianly cared for and within the boundaries of our own Conference some nine thousands of the lambs are being lovingly looked after.

During the past year the work has not been allowed to lag, and from the District Returns we learn there has been an increase of 9 schools, 272 conversions, 98 meetings in class and 415 learning the catechism. More money has been raised for School purposes than formerly, and there is a slight increase in the collections for the General Sabbath School Fund.

To the future we turn with great hope and if from

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such small beginnings such signal success has been realized what may not be expected from the numerous and efficient agencies now in operation.

Your Committee would therefore again press upon the attention of both the Ministry and Membership of our Church the importance of Sabbath School Work, and trusts that each and all as opportunity is afforded will strive to promote the prosperity of this Divinely honoured Institution.

Your Committee would re-affirm the opinion expressed in the Report of last year in reference to the preparation and circulation among our people of an Address to Parents on what they owe to their children, the claims of the Sabbath Schools and the benefits confirmed on the church and the world through the agency of pious and enlightened Teachers, and would again commend this matter to the respectful consideration of the Conference.

II. The object of the Fund shall be the encouragement of efforts to secure a parsonage on every dependent circuit and mission throughout the Conference, and as far as possible free from debt.

III. Grants in aid of Local efforts may be made as this fund will allow, toward the erection or purchase of suitable houses; or the discharge of existing debts upon parsonages; provided however, that in no case shall the grant to any Circuit or mission exceed the sum of one hundred and twenty-five dollars or one fourth of the amount raised by local efforts.

IV. In order to secure a grant from this fund the following regulations must be strictly observed, viz. :—

1. In every case where it is proposed to seek for a grant in aid of a new Parsonage, the parties about to build shall communicate with the Secretary of the Committee of this Fund, and procure from him a copy of the Model Plans; and shall also lay before the Committee full particulars in regard to size, location, tenure and value of land upon which it is proposed to build; the plans of the building, details of size, height, materials and estimated cost, amount of reliable subscriptions in aid of purchase of land and erection of building, and also the amount of the anticipated grant.

2. In regard to applications for grants in aid of purchase of land and buildings.

In every case where it is proposed to purchase land and buildings for a parsonage, it shall be necessary, in order to obtain a grant in aid of such purchase, for the Superintendent of the Circuit to communicate with the Secretary of the Committee, and furnish full particulars respecting the situation, size, value and tenure of the land and also a plan of the house, shewing, size, height, and arrangement of the rooms, a statement of the materials of which the house is built, and of the estimated present cash value of the property, and also of the extent to which the buildings are completed, together with the amount of local subscriptions.

3. In no case shall a grant be made from this Fund to aid in the erection or purchase of a Parsonage or the discharge of a debt; unless it shall be clearly shown that at least two-thirds of the total amount of the cost has been secured by local efforts on the circuit.

4. Every application for aid from this Fund must receive the sanction of the District Meeting, either Financial or Annual, before it can be considered by the Committee.



**APPENDIX I.**



**STANDING ORDERS.**



**I.—DISTRICT MEETINGS.**

1. The Chairmen of Districts are peremptorily required to procure three complete copies of the Minutes of the several annual and other meetings of the District Committees, financial and ordinary, duly signed by the Chairman and Secretary. One of these copies shall be inserted in the District Records; the second shall be reserved for the use of the Conference, and the third shall be delivered to the Secretary for preservation in the archives of the Conference. Furthermore, it is required that the last-mentioned copies be handed in on the forenoon of the day preceding that on which our first preparatory committee-meeting may be appointed to be held, that the Secretaries may prepare classified lists of all matters which are to come before the Conference, and thereby expedite business.

2. That as much trouble has been caused at different sessions of Conference in consequence of alterations made in the District Minutes, it is determined that when the Minutes of the several Districts shall have been signed by the Chairman and Secretaries, they shall not be altered, except by special permission of the Conference.

**II.—PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN.**

That in regard to subscriptions for the WESLEYAN, inquiry is to be instituted in the District Committees respectively, as to the fidelity of each brother responsible for the collection of such moneys—the accounts being previously sent to the chairmen, and distributed at the Annual District Meetings.

## III.—MISSIONARY LISTS.

Each Superintendent is required to present, at the Annual District Meeting, prepared on foolscap paper, and made up in Canada Currency, a perfect list of all Missionary moneys collected on his circuit; and each chairman is required to present such lists to the Missionary Secretary, in a state ready for publication, on the day previous to the meeting of the Missionary Committee.

## IV.—CHILDREN'S FUND.

The Financial Secretaries of the several Districts are required to send to the Secretary of the Children's Fund, immediately after the Annual District Meeting, the names of all the ministers in their respective Districts who are claimants upon the Children's Fund for the current year; and to state the number of children for whom allowance is claimed; and, as far as possible, the name and date of birth of each of the said children.

## V.—BOOK ROOM ACCOUNTS.

*Resolved*,—That every Minister and Preacher is peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward each year, at or before the meeting of Conference.

## VI.—TIME FOR COLLECTIONS IN AID OF THE CONNEXIONAL FUNDS.

## VII.—FINANCIAL ECONOMY.

The Conference recommends to the Quarterly Meetings of the several circuits, the following plan, by which it is hoped they may the more effectually raise the amount necessary to meet the allowances of the ministers and preachers, and which will make the collection of class and ticket money hereafter unnecessary.

1. Let the Quarterly Boards, at the beginning of each financial year, estimate the amount needed for the year.

2. Then ascertain from each member of church, and, as far as practicable, from each attendant of the congregation, what each purposes to give as his or her weekly or monthly contribution.

3. Let these sums be entered by a steward appointed for that purpose in a book which he shall keep as Treasurer of the Quarterly Board.

4. If the needed amount among such a deficiency, setting additional amount monthly to p

5. Let every one sh each week of necessity, these contributions to receive the Meeting. Th all the pledged under the direction preachers aut

6. That be recommended Foreign and times past, by

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4. If the total amount of these sums does not equal the needed amount, then let the stewards apportion the deficiency among such as are willing, for Christ's sake, to assume such deficiency, setting down to each person, with his or her consent, the additional amount which they think he or she ought weekly or monthly to pay.

5. Let the stewards then adopt and carry out a plan by which every one shall have the opportunity of regularly contributing each week or month, by envelope or otherwise, not grudgingly or of necessity, the sum which has been pledged by him or her. Let these contributions be paid over regularly to the steward appointed to receive them, and be brought up by him to the Quarterly Meeting. The said steward shall keep an individual account of all the pledges and contributions, and shall pay over the same, under the direction of the Quarterly Meeting, to the preacher or preachers authorized to receive them.

6. That Quarterly Meetings adopting the envelope system be recommended not to include in their estimates the claims of Foreign and Home Missions, but to provide for those funds as in times past, by special collections and subscriptions.

7. That, in the opinion of this Conference, the minimum salary of ministers should be \$750.

8. That, in the opinion of this Conference, the minimum amount of young men's salaries should be \$200.

9. That, in the opinion of this Conference, the salary of ordained, but unmarried, ministers should be \$520.

10. When a deficiency occurs upon a circuit having two preachers (a married and a single man), it shall be borne by each, according to a *pro rata* amount.

#### VIII.—MINISTERS REMOVING.

In the case of ministers removing, they shall be held responsible for the supply of the pulpits on the circuits which they are leaving for two Sabbaths after the close of the Conference, and shall be required to provide for the pulpits of their new circuits on the third Sabbath after Conference.

## APPENDIX II.

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## PASTORAL ADDRESS

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA  
WITHIN THE BOUNDS OF THE CONFERENCE OF NEW  
BRUNSWICK AND PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

*Dearlly Beloved Brethren,—*

We desire to greet you in the name of our common Lord from this city of Saint John, the commercial metropolis of our fair Province, so recently visited by the most disastrous fire ever known in its history; but now happily, through the energy and untiring perseverance of its inhabitants, restored to more than its wonted condition.

We feel it to be a great pleasure, as well as an important duty, to address you in our official capacity, as ministers of the Lord Jesus Christ, and as those who watch for your souls, knowing that the time is not far distant when we must give an account of our stewardship to the great Head of the Church.

By the good providence of God we are permitted, at the close of another year, to assemble in our Annual Conference, partly for the purpose of reviewing work already done, and partly for the purpose of deliberating upon matters intimately connected with the progress and stability of our church, in the great and important field of labor which we are permitted to occupy.

Our Conference has been distinguished by great unanimity of purpose in reference to all subjects brought under its consideration, as well as by that charity which thinketh no evil. The desire of the brethren has been to prepare and carry out such measures as would be best suited to promote the work of God throughout these lands. And they are encouraged to do this from a consideration of the marvellous successes of the past. It is not long ago since Methodism was first planted in these Provinces. There are men in our ministry to-day who were acquainted with the pioneers of our Church in these Colonies, and at a time when these brethren, scattered over an almost boundless territory, laboured with quenchless zeal to lay deep and broad the foundations of a religious organization which was to exert a powerful influence upon the destinies of millions yet unborn. The dealings of God with us in the past cause us to be very hopeful for the future. We are happy, in this connection, to report that during the past year revivals of religion, of unusual extent and power, particularly in the great centres of our population, have taken place. New and promising missions have been opened, upon which the seal of the Divine approbation has been enstamped, and old missions have been enlarged and strengthened.

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It affords us pleasure not only to know that our missionary operations are being largely extended, but also that the Church is furnishing the means to a much greater extent than ever for so noble a purpose. The debt, which had accumulated so greatly within a few years, and which had become so large that it was a source of much anxiety, has, by the liberal contributions of the ministers and members of the Methodist Church of Canada, been provided for; and not only so, but it is hoped that something remains in the hands of the Central Board for the further prosecution of our great work.

For this, we are sure, you will unite with us in devout thanksgiving to the God of all grace.

Our Sabbath Schools were never in a more efficient state than at present; and when we look at the efforts being made by our legislators, and others, to promote secular education, so as to place within the reach of all classes of the community the means of literary advancement, we are glad to know that opportunities for a thorough religious training are not wanting. We believe it to be vitally important that our youths should receive, not only a secular, but also a religious education, and therefore greatly rejoice in the success which has been vouchsafed to those who have laboured so long and so earnestly for the promotion of this design. Our Educational Institution at Sackville, comprising both the College and the two Academies, is still, under the Divine blessing, performing an important service to the families of many of our people, to the Church, and to society at large. In these days of abounding superstition, of scepticism, and of loose morality, it is of supreme moment that our ministry should be well trained, and that our sons and daughters should have the best education possible combined with the inspiration which is generated under Christian principle and means of Christian example. On these grounds we again commend at once to your patronage and your prayers all the branches of the institution above referred to.

Another agency for the promotion of Christianity is the printing press. The circulation of a healthy and instructive literature is a duty of the Church. In this enterprize we must take our part. The name of the newly-appointed editor of our paper (the *WESLEYAN*), the Rev. T. Watson Smith, affords a guarantee of the excellence of that periodical as a religious and Methodistic journal; and the designation of the Rev. S. F. Huestis to the management of our Book Room provides for the continuance of the efficiency of that department of the work. We would impress upon you the obligation under which you are laid to furnish to your families, and your Sabbath Schools an ample supply of the purest and the most instructive books; and in connexion with our own establishment such necessities may be fully met.

The intimate relation between the present life and the eternal realities to which it leads has been forcibly urged upon our attention by the absence of a brother who last year was one of the most active among us. The Rev. Joseph Hart was a brother

greatly beloved of men, and honored of God. He was widely known as a most devoted, laborious, and successful minister of the gospel. At our last Conference he terminated a year of eminent service as the President of that body, and though suffering greatly, he entered upon a new charge with ardent hopes. But after a long and painful illness, borne with great fortitude and patience, he was called up quite recently to the higher service of God and of the Lamb, where sorrow and suffering are all unknown. Well may we say, "Remember them which have the rule over you, who have spoken unto you the word of God, whose faith follow, considering the end of their conversation, Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, to-day, and for ever."

We rejoice, however, that others, whose hearts God hath touched, are coming forward to fill the places of those removed from our midst. Three young men from among us have been ordained to the full work of the ministry, and several have been accepted on probation. Yet still ought the Church to pray "the Lord of the harvest that He would thrust forth laborers into His harvest."

And now, dear brethren, permit us to urge upon you the necessity and importance of diligent use of the means of grace placed within your reach. It is your privilege to live in an age of religious liberty, a privilege purchased by the sufferings, the imprisonments, and the martyrdom of multitudes of the best men and women that ever adorned human nature or blessed our world. It is yours to value and to make the best use of this privilege. Do not forget that your responsibilities increase in proportion to your advantages; that where much is given, much will be required. Cultivate, then, with great care, personal religion. See to it that you yourselves are building on the sure foundation, Christ Jesus, and that your hope of heaven and everlasting glory is not resting on the shifting sand. In order to this, let there be on the part of every one of you close and frequent self-examination, as well as the practice of private prayer. Remember the injunction of the Saviour when he said: "But thou, when thou prayest, enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door pray to thy Father which is in secret, and thy Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly." Declension in piety generally begins in the neglect of private devotion. Omit secret prayer and you will soon become spiritually helpless, like a vessel in a dangerous sea without chart, compass, or helm.

Allow us also to urge upon you the necessity of reading and meditating upon God's holy Word. In the book divine you will find a history of the dealings of God with mankind for four thousand years; you will find many beautiful models for your imitation; you will find instructions with regard to the paths of duty, Providence, and grace. You will also find rules for the regulation of your words, thoughts, actions and intentions. You will also find great and exceeding precious promises, suited to every circumstance in which it is possible for you to be placed in life. And

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you will find doctrines which, while some of them may be difficult to be understood, at the same time challenge the obedience of your faith. Read this Book of God frequently, reverently, enquiringly, and as you "search the Scriptures" in the way indicated, treasure up the sacred truth in your memories and in your hearts. "Thy word," says the Psalmist, "have I hid in my heart, that I might not sin against Thee."

Permit us also to call your attention to the great importance of family religion. Not only is it necessary that you as heads of families should enjoy the pardoning love of God, but also that those dear ones committed to your care by divine Providence should, by your precepts and holy examples, be made partakers of like blessings with yourselves. We live at a time in the world's history when assaults of various kinds and from various quarters are being made upon the citadel of our faith. We live in a time, too, when evils of various kinds in the shape of worldly amusements are being made use of to entrap the inexperienced and the unwary, and we are sure that nothing but the grace of God, to restrain and to guide, will save the young of this generation. See to it then, dear brethren, that your families are trained up in the way they should go, so that when they are old they will not depart from it. May we also ask your serious attention to the social and public means of grace in use among us, and which have proved to be of such incalculable benefit to us as a church. Among these we may refer you to the class-meeting as a means by which your souls may be greatly comforted and blessed. We are sure you cannot but be benefitted by speaking to one another, as christians, of the gracious dealings of God with you; and you cannot but be benefitted by the counsel of the leader who may be placed over you. For doubtless there will be times in your religious life when you will feel that you stand in need of the exhortations and counsels of an experienced, faithful friend, such as a leader should be, when you will require to heed his words of warning, as well as his words of instruction and comfort, in order that you may patiently and successfully run the race which is set before you.

At the same time we would affectionately invite your attention to the value of the class-meeting, we would also hope that there will be great uniformity in your attendance upon the more public means of grace. All the institutions of Christianity are heavenly in their origin and tendency, and wherever there is a temple built for the worship of God, and wherever there is a heart that loves him, there he condescends to come, and even delights to dwell. No community need expect prosperity or happiness, where there is no rallying point, no sanctuary for the worship of the Almighty. The house of God is the place where the bread of eternal life is broken to the people, so that those who frequent it may be divinely fed, instructed, comforted and saved. From these centres, also, there radiate rays of heavenly light, there issue benevolence, sufficient to bless and save a whole

world of sinners. It is not difficult to see that where the holy Sabbath is not observed that where there is no living ministry, and no living active church membership, there must be every possible proof of moral evil.

The worship of God in the sanctuary is an unspeakable blessing to the family circle. The parents, who are careful to train up their children to love God's house, and the place where his honor dwelleth, are conferring upon them a benefit far greater and richer, and far more enduring, than silver and gold, houses and lands; for by such means they are implanting in their young and tender hearts principles which will have an influence upon their eternal destinies. It may be said, too, that the worship of God in any community puts a restraint upon various kinds of vice, corrects public sentiment, and foster whatever is lovely and of good report, while, at the same time, it has a tendency to remove those moral diseases which destroy the life of godliness in the soul, and to introduce in their place happiness, contentment, temporal and spiritual prosperity.

Under the influence of divine worship, so to speak, the arts and sciences flourish, institutions of learning become more effective, and moral and religious enterprises are rendered more successful. Wars between nations become less frequent, and peace and happiness are more widely diffused. Finally, brethren, farewell. Be perfect, be of good comfort, be of one mind, live in peace; and the God of love and peace shall be with you.
