Stop, Look and Avoid These Dangers That Compartment Every Woman—Don't Marry Your First Sweetheart—Don't Marry a Man to Reform Him—Don't Marry Because You're Bored, and Never Marry to Keep From Being Lonesome.

NOW the four great dangers that a girl encounters along her sentimental journey are these: First, That she will marry her first sweetheart.

Girls are particularly prone to acute attacks of puppy love, and unless their guardian angels are strictly on the job and snatch them away from the altar by the hair of their heads, it is only too apt to prove fatal.

FROM the time a girl can think coherently at all, she begins to think about marriage, and by the time she has got her first job she has decided all the details of a church wedding, and what the bridesmaids are going to wear. Intentionally, or unintentionally, she is brought up to look upon marriage as a career and a goal, and the result is that she goes to it with a full heart, and her imagination is fed on love stories and plays and moving pictures, in which fairy princesses come along and bear off maidens to realms of unimaginable bliss.

The result of all this is to make the girl feel that there is nothing in the world worth having except love and marriage. And so, like a child with a sweet tooth, she can't wait for her wedding cake to be served at the proper time. She is in a hurry to gulp it down, and begin her life meal on it, and you can't convince her that it will give her a frightful pain on her little insides if she does.

THEN comes her peril. She is in love with love, and she can see a hero of romance in anything in trousers. It is then that she elopes with the chauffeur, or marries the callow youth who hasn't a penny to bless himself with. She is too young to have any sense of values; too inexperienced to have any knowledge of men, and so she mistakes a passing fancy for a lasting passion, and makes the marriage that she spends the balance of her life repenting.

The danger of a girl marrying her first beau is particularly great if he happens to be a man much older than she is. For the knowledge that she can fascinate a real grown-up man, that she has some of this mysterious attraction of the ramps of whom she has been reading, goes to her head like wine, and makes her capable of committing any folly.

There really should be an isolation hospital in every community in which girls of 17 who are thinking of getting married, could be immured until they have recovered from their first heart attack.

THE second danger that a girl runs is of marrying a man to reform him. Heaven alone knows why, but the idea of converting themselves into instruments for the regeneration of the unworthy is irresistibly alluring to many women. Whether it appeals to the eternal mother in a woman, or to the feminine mania for ripping things to pieces and making them over, or to a latent yearning for adventure, and the love of foolhardy risks is one of the mysteries we shall never solve.

It is merely a fact that women have a predilection for black sheep, and almost any one who will bleed nobly enough will find some nice, good, kind lady, who will adopt it and take it in, and wash and feed it.

AND so we have with us the poor, bedraggled wives of drunkards who still drink, and for whom matrimony proved no Keely cure; heart-broken women who married roses that are still petticoat chasers; and tired, worn-out women who have grown old supporting the neck-boards they married, and who are still losing.

It is a siren's song these men sing who persuade credulous maidens that all they need to lift them out of the gutter to the higher life is a wife's soft, white hand, and every woman should stuff cotton in her ears as soon as some poor, weak devil begins to chant it to her. For the combined appeal that it makes to her vanity and her inherent love of meddling will get her, if she doesn't watch out.

THE third danger to a woman is that she will marry to get out of work, if she is poor, or because she is bored, if she is rich.

There comes a time to the business woman, no matter whether she has a good job or a bad one, no matter whether she ordinarily likes her work or loathes it, when she has a sudden distaste for it, and feels that nothing on earth looks good to her but domesticity.

For the time being, independence has no charm for her, and commercial life no lure. She wants to stop and lean on a husband, and let him make the living. She wants after pots and pans, and a blue and white kitchen, and feels that it would be Heaven not to have to punch the time clock of a morning.

To the society girl there comes the same revolt against her daily life. She is tired of parties and teas and dancing and theatres. She is weary of trying to amuse herself. She wants something to do—some definite object in life, and the only thing she knows how to do is to get married. The only answer to her problem of what to do is to set up an establishment.

It is in such moods that girls commit the incredible folly of marrying just to be a-marrying. They take any man who is handy, and then they find out to their amazement that it is getting only the right man that counts in marriage; and that with a husband they love it is Heaven, and with a husband to whom they are indifferent, it is hell.

THE fourth mistake, that girls make is when they get in a panic and marry. This is a danger that particularly threatens them around about 30. One morning they awake to the fact that all of their old friends are married and settled. Or they recall that, at the party last night, the flappers treated them with the respect one shows their elders, and that the partners with whom they danced were mere kids. Then they look forward to the future, and see themselves growing old, and the fear of loneliness strikes terror to their souls.

They fall into a blue funk. They are panic-stricken, and then it is that they marry widowers with households of children, or the old lovers who have camped on their doorsteps for ten or fifteen years, and whom they once regarded with scorn. And they are dull and bored ever after.

THESE are the four great dangers that confront a woman in marriage. If she escapes them, her chances for making a wise and suitable marriage and living happily ever after are excellent.

Elephants Are Painted For Indian Ceremonial Functions

BOMBAY, India, March 19.—An elephant's toilet preparatory to a ceremonial function is a complicated affair, according to visitors from Britain who watched the process of making ready the Gackwar of Baroda's elephants for the festivities connected with Lord Harding's visit. The painting of the face comes first, the ears, and that operation is performed with care which would have done credit to Jeezil. Two men chalk on the outline of the design and apply the water-color paint with a speed and certainty of touch which can only have been attained with long practice. There were painted tigers which were so drawn up the sides of the face and head that the eye of the elephant on each side coincided with the tiger's eye, giving to the painted animal an extraordinary air of vitality. Peacocks were painted in a similar way on another animal, and on others, which were presumably of lesser importance in the elephantine world, the designs were formal geometrical affairs. Women's Hospital Aid to Quit Social Service Activities At General Public Hospital

Work Has Been Maintained Three Years—Financial Aspect is Chief Difficulty—Possibility of Undertaking Free Maternity Work at Institution Discussed

THE WOMEN'S Hospital Aid regretfully made a definite decision to discontinue the Social Service work at the General Public Hospital, which the Aid has maintained for three years.

Consideration was given a plan of having excess of 100 membership fees in each denomination placed in the follow-up fund for that denomination and the matter was held over for action at the next meeting.

FREE MATERNITY WORK

A committee was appointed to confer with the Commissioners of the General Public Hospital regarding the possibility of undertaking free maternity work. The committee will report at the next meeting of the Aid.

The meeting decided to give two card tables to the County Hospital. The Aid met in the Church of England Institute, the use of which has been very kindly given for the society's monthly meeting.

It was decided to hold the annual day in April. Mrs. J. J. Stohart was cordially welcomed on taking office as president.

The recommendation of the executive that the resignation of Miss Belle Howe, as Social Service Worker, was accepted regretfully and it was decided to discontinue this service to the General Public Hospital as the Commissioners did not see their way clear to contribute to the expense. It was also felt the hospital had received financial returns from this service.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Mrs. Lester W. Mowry, treasurer, reported expenditures of \$107.25 and a balance of \$677.82 in the general fund, and \$801.71 in the emergency fund.

Mrs. R. D. Atken reported on visiting the general hospital and referred to the generous supplies of magazines and funny papers brought by representatives of the Ludlow street Baptist church. Mrs. W. O'Connor was appointed convener for visiting in the ensuing month.

It was voted that two card tables be given to the County Hospital as they were asked for by the superintendent, Dr. H. A. Farris.

COUNTY HOSPITAL VISITING

Mrs. C. S. Christie reported on the visiting at the County Hospital pointing out the need of more women's papers and children's books there and expressed the patient's appreciation of the gifts of crossword puzzles, sent them by Mrs. Walter Hall.

Mrs. Grace McCuskey, as magazine convener, reported having obtained the women's magazines asked for. Mrs. McCarthy was appointed County Hospital visiting convener for next month.

Miss Belle Howe submitted her last report, as Social Service Worker, telling of activities in January and February.

Mrs. Stohart expressed the Aid's appreciation of Miss Howe's work and deep regret that it must be discontinued.

MISSION FATHER IS NATIVE OF PROVINCE

Rev. John Barry, C.S.S.R., Now at Cathedral Born in Fredericton

The scholarly addresses and inspirational sermons of Rev. John Barry, C.S.S.R., one of the missionaries at the Cathedral, have called forth much warm commendation and it is a matter of pride that Father Barry is a New Brunswick boy.

The family lived in Melrose, N. B., for some years. Father Barry was born in Fredericton and is the son of the late Anthony Barry. His father died when he was an infant and he lost his mother also before he had been ordained to the priesthood.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

Dr. Mabel Hannington, as medical inspector of schools, spoke of the great assistance Miss Howe had given the school inspection service. She wondered if the Commissioners had realized the importance of the service and at the request of the meeting she agreed to speak to the superintendent of the hospital telling of her experience of the useful work of the social service department.

Denominational reports were received. The Catholics reported fees from 19 members in St. Peter's parish and the Baptists reported fees from 42 members.

A recommendation from the executive that each denomination retain as its own fund for follow-up work all fees from the membership ever taken, was discussed at length and held over to be dealt with at the next meeting.

MATERNITY WING

A further recommendation from the executive was that each organization be written to asking if it would be willing to cooperate with the Aid in endeavoring to have a maternity wing in connection with the General Public Hospital.

Mrs. E. A. Young moved in amendment that a committee be first appointed to confer with the Board of Commissioners of the General Public Hospital as to whether the possibility of establishing free maternity work in the city. The motion was carried.

The committee appointed consisted of Mrs. J. J. Stohart, Mrs. Ralph Robertson, Mrs. J. Goldman, Mrs. W. Caldwell and Mrs. J. Carleton Lee. The committee was asked to bring a report to the next meeting. Mrs. Stohart said she believed the Commissioners favored the establishment of maternity work and she asked for a large attendance at the meeting to hear the report.

It was decided to hold a tag day this year as usual, but it was suggested little artificial flowers should be used instead of the paper tag. A date in the last week in April was to be asked for as tag day.

A resolution of sympathy was extended to Acting Mayor J. H. Prink in his bereavement.

Appreciation was expressed for the kind offer of the manager of the Seaman's Institute to give the use of the Institute for the Hospital Aid meetings.

A vote of thanks was extended to the Church of England Institute for the use of the hall, which has been given for the Aid's regular meetings.

## "YUKON YESTERDAY AND TODAY," IS FINELY TOLD OF BY MRS. BLACK

Wife of Federal Member For That Country Thrills Large Audience in N. H. S. Rooms—Paints Graphically Old and New Days

"THE YUKON OF YESTERDAY AND TODAY," was the title of the address given by Mrs. George Black, F. R. G. S., wife of the Federal member for the Yukon, last evening for the winter lecture course of the Ladies' Association of the Natural History Society.

Mrs. Black went into the Yukon in the gold rush days of 1898 and has made the trip to that northern territory 21 times since then.

She has seen the foot travel of early days change to railway and automobile travel and the makeshift methods of mining days change to the ordered lines of established communities.

### CHARMING LECTURER.

She is as charming and gracious a lecturer as the society has ever had and as she painted graphically her word pictures of the old days and the new days. The marvellously beautiful lantern slides which she showed so delighted the audience that many times throughout the evening there were involuntary exclamations of amazement from every one present.

Her audience marvelled most at the lovely flowers and luxuriant vegetation shown in several of the pictures.

Mrs. Margaret Lawrence, president of the association, was chairman, and tendered to Mrs. Black the hearty vote of thanks which had been moved by Mrs. Heber Vroom, as a representative of the I. O. O. E. Mrs. Black being a member of the national executive of that order, and seconded by Rev. H. A. Coady.

### FREDERICTON HUSBAND'S HOME.

Mrs. Black explained that although she had been born a "mere Yankee" Fredericton had been her husband's boyhood home. She first took her audience from Vancouver to her home in Dawson City, travelling through the superb scenery of the inland passage to Skagway, passing Alert Bay with its Indian houses and totem poles, a custom as old as the world, and up into Alaska which was purchased by the United States for \$7,200,000 and last year brought returns in exports and imports of \$130,000,000 to the United States.

Mrs. Black compared the beauty of the bay at Wrangell to the Bay of Naples. She related an amusing incident of two motion picture operators making the trip to the Yukon. The more venturesome had obtained permission to row out in a small boat to a glacier. As the boat was nearing the glacier there was a crash and a huge portion cracked away from the main body. The operator and his two rowers were upset in the water and the less venturesome operator, who remained on board, got an excellent motion picture of the unusual mishap.

### NONE TOO INVITING.

Mrs. Black in relating what comforts had been found at the "Grand Pacific Hotel" on the trail in Alaska in 1898, said that being the only other woman, besides the wife of the hotel proprietor, she had been honored with the only cubicle the hotel afforded and had found it none too inviting. For a plain breakfast the hotel charge was \$2.50. The speaker explained that the term "sourdough" was given to the old timers because they had a sour milk preparation as a substitute for yeast. When she had fallen and hurt her foot very badly she had had the luxury of a \$5 fine, wood being sold at so much a pound on the mountain trail. The water passage through rough waters and rapids brought the travelers to White Horse, a district where copper mining and fox ranching are now successfully followed. The Yukon today, she said, had 1,800 miles of trunk roads. The territory is 290,000 square miles in extent, has mountains between 2,000 and 7,000 feet in height, has sent out \$250,000,000 in wealth since the country was first opened, has perpetual sunlight in summer months and perpetual twilight in winter months.

## VENIOT QUERIES RE PROHIBITION HERE

Makes Inquiries in Legislature About Beer Shops, Liquor Inspectors, Etc.

FREDERICTON, March 18.—Prohibition inquiries were made in the House this afternoon by Hon. Dr. Veniot as follows:

1. How many beer shops are licensed in the City of Saint John and who hold these licenses?

2. What beer shop licenses have been cancelled since the present government came into power?

3. What vendors under the Intoxicating Liquor Act, 1916, have licenses in Saint John and where are their shops located?

4. Have any of these been fined since the new chief liquor inspector assumed office?

Another question was: How many liquor inspectors are there in Saint John and what inspectors were dismissed since the present government came into power and for what reasons?

### RE ROAD SUPERVISOR.

Hon. Mr. Veniot also asked if Louis Corey was appointed as special supervisor or delegated in any way to oversee road repairs in any part of the Parish of Greenwich, Kings county, since the provincial elections last and, if so, how much was he paid.

Hon. Mr. Veniot also wanted to know how many applications were received for the position of chief inspector and what were the names of the applicants.

5. Did the Temperance Alliance recommend the appointment of any of the applicants, or did the alliance suggest to the government the appointment of anyone in particular?

6. On whose recommendation was the present chief inspector appointed?

### QUEBEC BOOSTS PAY OF AGENTS-GENERAL

QUEBEC, March 18.—The Legislative Assembly today adopted resolutions providing for higher salaries for the agents-general of the province in London and Brussels, and increased expenses for the agent-general in London.

The increase in the cost of the London office, said Premier Taschereau, was a large one, being from \$28,000 to \$40,000, but it was necessary in order that there should be proper extension of the work.

### IS HARVARD LAW GRAD.

FREDERICTON, N. B., March 18.—F. C. Squires, who was appointed Deputy Speaker of the Legislature today and who will preside over the deliberations of the House tomorrow in the absence of Speaker O'Brien, was born in Carleton County, the son of Robert and the late Mrs. Squires. He took his B. A. at the University of New Brunswick, where for three years in succession he captured the all-round athletic championship of the University. He graduated from Harvard Law School, with the degree of LL.B., and for four years was principal of the Woodstock High School. He has been practicing law in Woodstock for the last 10 years. This is his first year in the Legislature, although he has campaigned in the interests of the Conservative party since he was 21 years old. He married Hattie D. Pierce, daughter of Rev. Thomas and Mrs. Pierce, and has two children. In religion, he is a United Churchman.

JUDGES' DECISION GOES TO DEBATERS FROM WOLFVILLE

Take Negative Side of Social Betterment and Politics Question

ACTIVE GOVT. VS. EDUCATION METHOD

Debate is Featured by Presentation and Soundness of Argument

WOLFVILLE, March 16—Acadia obtained the judges' decision over Mr. Allison in the intercollegiate debate, here tonight, taking the negative of the subject: "Resolved, That women can do more social betterment through non-political organizations acting as such than through direct participation in political affairs."

Miss Matthews opened the debate for the affirmative. She stated that women's non-political organizations can express active discontent against any measure which is contrary to social betterment without any partisanship as seen in the great work of the churches. Women are seeing that partisan politics are full of limitations and politics, as far as the vote is concerned, is ineffective in social betterment.

EDUCATION BETTER WAY. Legislation, she continues, is a negative way of social advancement, it stops social evils but does not cure them. Education is the way to social betterment. Women's educational societies are much more effective than their political societies.

THE NEGATIVE SIDE. Miss Serena True led the negative. Women, she stated, cannot make the same contribution to education through the home as she could in times past, and if the mother is to make the full contribution to the education of her children, she must take an active interest not only in home affairs but also in national affairs.

NO CORRUPTION. Miss Coleman, continuing for the affirmative, claimed that though women have had the vote for years, there are astonishing retrograde movements being made by governments.

POLITICAL ACTION NEEDED. Miss Gough closed the arguments for the affirmative. She claimed that when women act through non-political organizations their work is permanent, but political work is a bubble.

Not Many Replies Received By Board of Health re Pasterization

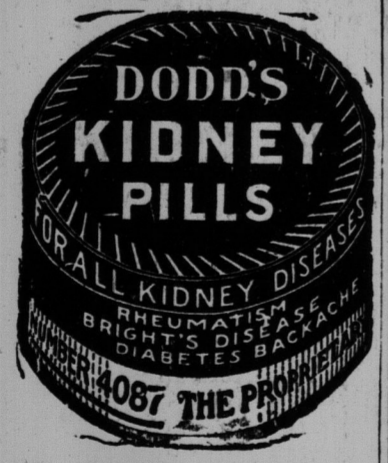

THREE HURT IN MEXICAN RIOT OVER EXPULSION

Expected Arrest of Catholic Bishop Is Cause

TROOPS STONED

Fire Into Crowd With Machine Guns; 2 Women And Man Wounded

MEXICO CITY, March 19 - A special despatch from San Luis Potosi says that two women and one man were wounded during the riot growing out of the popular belief that the authorities intended to arrest the Roman Catholic Bishop Monsignor Miguel De La Mora.

Yesterday afternoon municipal gendarmes unexpectedly appeared at all the Roman Catholic churches. Large excited crowds congregated. The majority in them were women. Then followed a demonstration which almost reached the proportions of a riot, notwithstanding an announcement that the gendarmes had only been instructed to fulfil orders to limit the number of priests in the churches.

TROOPS FIRE - The demonstration culminated in the authorities calling out Federal troops with machine guns. The crowd im-

Opened For Navigation on April 5 and Kennebecasis on March 27

The cold weather of the last few nights has frozen a crust over the Saint John and Kennebecasis rivers and it is reported they are still safe for crossing. On the city streets the sun has made havoc of the snow banks and they are rapidly passing.

ABOUT A YEAR AGO - On March 11 of last year the Saint John River had clear water for 12 miles above Indiantown. The Telegraph-Journal of March 12, 1925, states that on the previous day the Saint John River was reported clear of ice to Carter's Point. Not much ice was running yesterday as there was very little wind but the warmth and the rainfall yesterday would do their share in helping to break up the thinning covering of ice, which has been greatly weakened by the most unusual mildness of the February and March weather.

EARLIEST OPENING DATE - The earliest date for the opening of navigation on the Saint John River was April 1, 1848.

Last year navigation on the Kennebecasis was begun on March 27, when the Gondola Point ferry made the first trip of the season. The steamer Majestic made a trip to Fredericton on April 9 last year.

WAS HELD UP - She was held up at Upper Mangerville throughout the night of Saturday, April 4, by ice jams and floating ice, and reached the capital early on Sunday morning, April 5.

An additional 200 warrants for unpaid taxes were prepared and will be handed to the police today. The prompt collection of these overdue amounts has improved town finances.

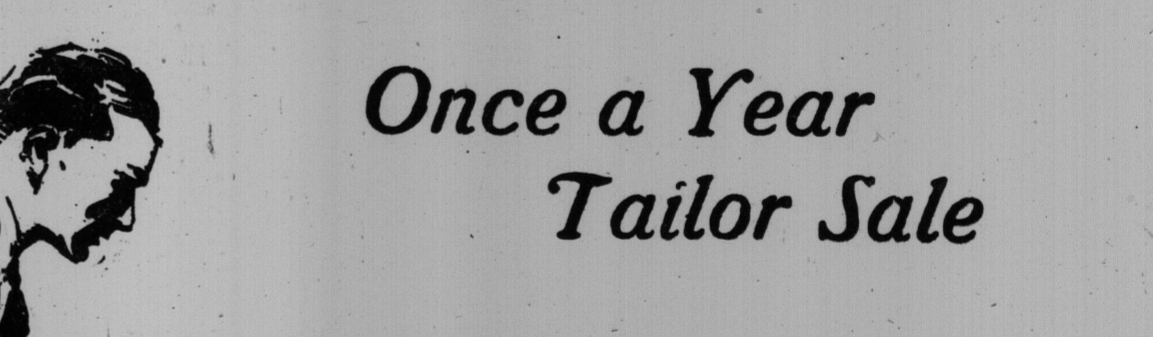
