

PAPAL MEDAL TO E. J. HENNEBERRY

Received by K. C. State Deputy - His Fine Speech at Anniversary.

E. J. Henneberry, of St. John, State Deputy, Knights of Columbus, has received one of the Papal Medals struck by Pope Pius XI to mark the services of the Knights of Columbus in erecting the Oratory of St. Peter in Rome.

The medal, which is of bronze, bears on the obverse side a likeness of His Holiness and on the reverse the facade of the Oratory of St. Peter with the great dome of St. Peter's in the background.

Mr. Henneberry, who is filling the important office of state deputy with marked success, has been an active member of the Knights of Columbus for some years and is very popular among his associates of St. John Council and throughout the jurisdiction.

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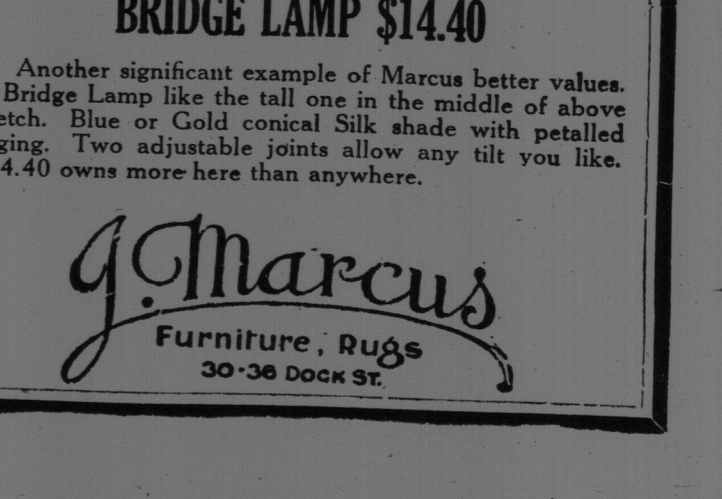

PEASANTS ALOOF TO COMMISSION

Stalin, One of Bolshevik Triumvirate, Discusses the Russian Situation.

By FRIDERICK KUH (United Press Staff Correspondent)

Moscow, Nov. 2.—(By mail)—A far-reaching revision of the Russian communists' policy toward the peasantry is envisaged in a speech delivered recently by Stalin, one of the powerful triumvirate now controlling the destinies of the Bolshevik party.

Stalin stated unequivocally that the work of the communists in the villages continues to represent the weakest side of the party. "The communistic cells," or village groups of Bolsheviks, have become accustomed to conduct their own mood, rather than the temper of millions of non-partisan peasants, without whose support their work is unavailing.

Carry On in Cities.

He points out that the Communist party in the cities has been able to carry on in full swing, because the Bolsheviks are surrounded by a mass of impartial but sympathizing citizens. These non-partisan sympathizers are lacking among the peasants, declares Stalin, and the party groups in the villages have not succeeded in approaching closely enough the agrarian population.

It is one of the main tasks of the party, he continues, to create in the villages, "an intermediate layer of sympathizers, who stand between the party itself and those who are wholly detached from communism."

The communist is admonished to refrain merely from "teaching and commanding" the peasants, and is urged to approach them on a footing of equality.

Referring to the recent events in Georgia, Stalin attributes that insurrectionary movement to the fugitive mensheviks and foreign powers, but adds that the mensheviks succeeded in winning over the peasants in various Georgian districts. He attributes the hostility of this section of the peasantry to the "poorly established contact between the communist party and the masses of the land," and in general, to the inadequate foothold of the party in the provinces.

"The Soviets are the barometer of the party's power in the country," declares Stalin, "and this barometer failed to rise to the occasion in certain Georgian districts, when it was most necessary."

"The events of Georgia are significant elsewhere in the union, if we do not succeed in creating an atmosphere of confidence between party members and non-partisans. We must listen to the voice of the peasants. If we fail to direct the growing political energy of the peasantry into the right revolutionary channels, it will burst in upon us in the form of banditry, much as it did during the Georgian occurrences."

Concluding his appeal, Stalin asserts that the immediate task of the party is to enlist the peasantry into the management of the country. The conditions for the realization of this programme are favorable, he says, because of the rising political activity of the poorer peasants. He calls for a "united front of workman and peasant against the dominating tendencies of the farm-producers."

The local village landlords, revenue, expenditure, taxation, are questions of immediate importance to the peasant, whose active co-operation elsewhere in the union, if we do not succeed in creating an atmosphere of confidence between party members and non-partisans. We must listen to the voice of the peasants. If we fail to direct the growing political energy of the peasantry into the right revolutionary channels, it will burst in upon us in the form of banditry, much as it did during the Georgian occurrences."

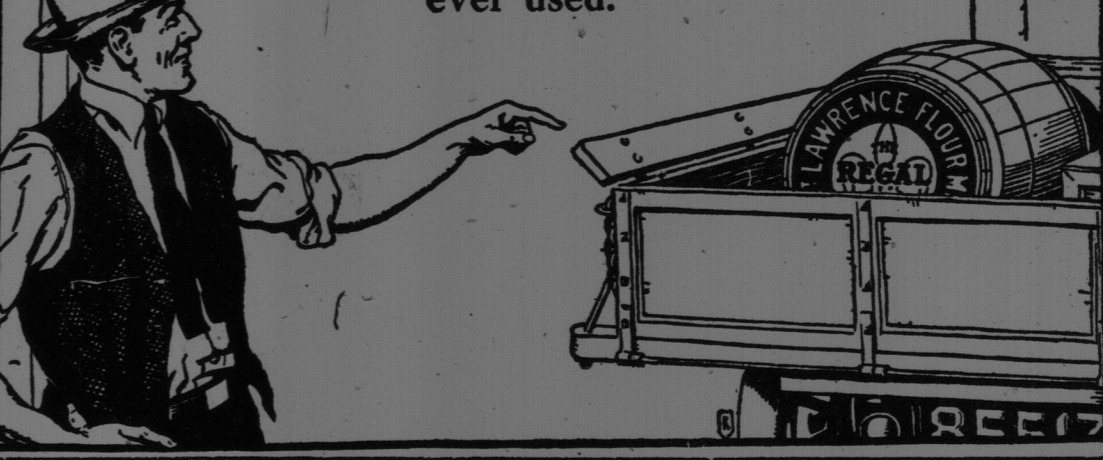

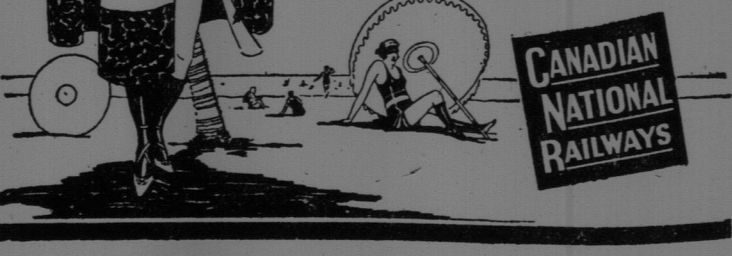

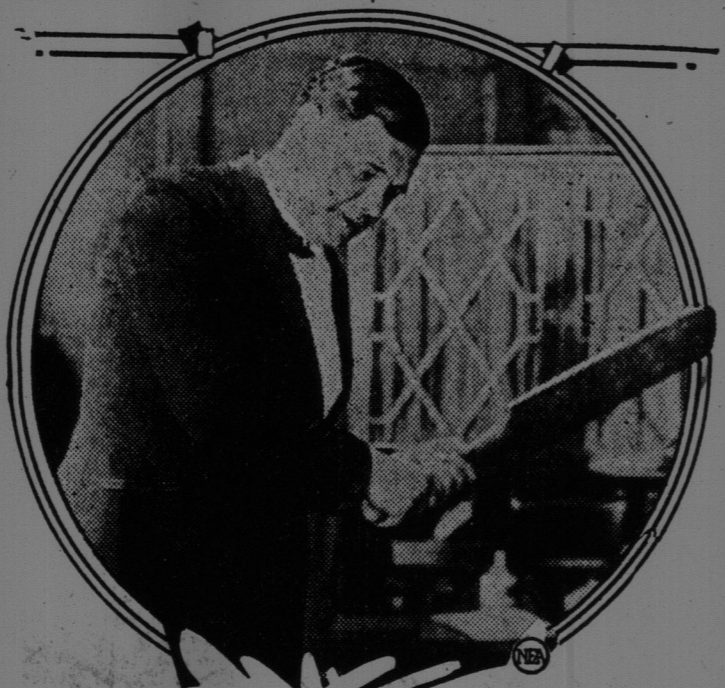

 Mr. Powell—"I'll take my honored friend's version of the answer."
 Dr. Pugsley—"If you'll take my advice you'll do much better."
 Mr. Powell started to read from a book, a statement concerning the mental condition of patients with tuberculosis.
 Mr. Powell—"Do you prescribe to this statement?"
 Dr. Pugsley—"What are you reading it from?"
 Mr. Powell—"It is a statement of my own, printed here in the book."
 His Honor—"I think the witness should know whose statement he is being asked to assent to."
 Mr. Powell changed his tactics and asked if the mental element played an important part in tuberculosis.
 Dr. Comeau said "Yes."
 Dr. Pugsley again took objection, saying that Mr. Powell was reading from a book.
 His Honor said that he believed it was an attempt to get around a ruling. Mr. Powell put the book away and followed with several questions regarding the mental element in tuberculosis patients to which the witness cautiously observed that perhaps the Powell version was just as good as the book.
 Mr. Powell began to ask the witness a question in which he intimated that Dr. Comeau was associated with the other physician for the plaintiff. He got no further than that. Dr. Pugsley objected. The verbal battle started and was interrupted by His Honor, who said that the counsel had the privilege of objecting to a question by opposing counsel.
 Mr. Powell observed that that was right, but he did not see why Dr. Pugsley should make a speech every time.

Not a Public Meeting.

His Honor said that he wished that the counsel would please remember that this was not a public meeting and to forget the gallery. Counsel would address the Court, the jury and the witness and confine their remarks to the points at issue. Regarding speech making His Honor said he believed that there was more speech making on Mr. Powell's side than on Dr. Pugsley's.
 Dr. Comeau picked out the sections of the reports which he had supplied the plaintiffs.

To Dr. Pugsley Dr. Comeau said that the medicine seemed to help Mrs. Saulnier. The medicine would be very beneficial if its effect was to build up the physical condition of the patients so as to better ward off the disease.

 To Dr. Pugsley, Dr. Comeau said that he was not conscious of having in his treatment of the Saulnier case departed from the highest ideals of the practise of his profession.

Mrs. Mabel LeBlanc, examined by Dr. Pugsley, said she was in Montreal in 1920. Her husband was in Montreal now. She had become ill in Montreal in 1920. 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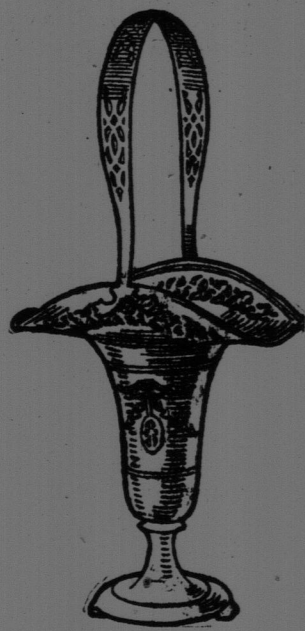
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ST. PETER'S Y. M. A. IS REINSTATED
