



Another Audit Of The Books

Wage Arbitration Board Wants to Learn Financial Standing of the Company-Hearing Completed

the affairs of the New Brunswick Power Company, and objection to its being admitted as evidence, marked the closing session of the Board of Concillation which has been hearing evidence in an ffort to adjust the differences regarding Taylor, K. C., for the company, objected to the report being admitted, contending that it was a "twisted, partisan and biased report," and he did not consider that it should be given any credence

Magnus Sinclair, for the men, in reply, stated that as the report had been accepted by the city of St. John it should be admissable as evidence at the enquiry. Mr. McIntyre was an honorable man and his report, as that of a chartered accountant, should be accepted.

To this Mr. Taylor made reply that while Mr. McIntyre was undoubtedly an honorable man, he had turned in a dishonorable report and that it should not be admitted.

This discussion gave rise to a few re-

This discussion gave rise to a few remarks from His Honor Judge Chandler, who presided. The chairman stated that unless the documents submitted were acceptable to both sides, he considered that an expert investigator should be appointed to enquire into the financial position of the power company, that the enquiry could go no further, he considered, unless the board had power to test the accuracy of the statements in regard to the company's financial position. Subject to the approval of his colleagues, he would apply to the minister of labor for permission to appoint a man to audit the company's books, and this statement would be taken as final.

In reply to this, Mr. Taylor stated that the books of the company were open and they would be glad to have such an audit.

At the afternoon session of the conciliation board hearing, evidence in connection with the demands of the street railway employes for an increase in wages was given by Magnus Sinclair, James Powers and Ira D. Ferris, president of the union. Fred Campbell spoke regarding the wage question and said that officials of the company had asked them to submit a request for an increase of five cents per hour in writing. Mr. Sinclair submitted the McIntyre reporter, the finances of the company, but this was objected to by Mr. Taylor. Mr. Sinclair said that he was not surprised that such an objection should be raised by the company. Judge Chandler said that the board would carefully consider the evidence and announce its decision later.

Nine out of ten war gardeners are able to use most of the vegetables they grow but among those who have gone in for vacant lot gardening there will be some who will want to market their produce. The community spirit pays in this as in most other things.

A case in point is a project put forward by the Women's Canadian Club of Ottawa. Last year they had a wayside market and through this medium \$750 was made on the sale of vegetables. This year they are to have a motor truck which will bring the produce right into the city to be sold at street corners.

This is a novel scheme that might be adopted in other cities. The wayside markets have proved lucrative as they have been well patronized by motorists and wayfarers of every kind.

A motor truck in a country community may be made the means of transporting to the city market the produce of a score of war gardens. Fresh, goodlooking vegetables are always easy enough to sell. The biggest difficulty presented as a general rule is transportation. This may be overcome by teamwork on the part of war gardeners.

Miss Muldrew's Address.
