Hints for the Cook

Coconut Cake.
Two beaten eggs, two tablespoonsful of butter, one cup sugar, half cup milk, two cups flour, one cup coconut soaked in milk, half teaspoonful soda, one teaspoonful cream of tartar.

Brown Bread.
Three gills of water, one gill of molasses, two teaspoons of saleratus, dissolved in water, one teaspoon salt, two and a half cups of cornmeal, two cups of rye or Graham meal, or enough to make thick batter. Steam three hours.

Prune Tapioca Pudding.
Soak separately over night 1 1/2 cup of tapioca, 1-2 pound prunes, in about 2 cups of water each. In the morning add 1 1/2 cups of water to the tapioca and boil till clear and transparent. Boil the prunes till soft, then remove the stones and cut in small pieces and add to the tapioca and the juice also. Add 1 1/2 cups of sugar and boil together 1/2 hour. Before pouring into mold, add a little lemon extract. Serve cold with plain or whipped cream.

TORY LEADER'S ARRAIGNMENT OF MACKENZIE & MANN

Ottawa, May 14—"This career of two men—if, indeed, not three—challenges an equal or parallel in the history of the world. If any man in this Canadian parliament will study the history and operations of Mackenzie & Mann from their beginning until now he will find nothing but one long sickening trail of parliamentary corruption, of lobbying, of degradation of parliamentary institutions, of the lowering of the whole morale of public life and the degrading of such standards as those by which it should truly and properly be measured."

Such was the terrible arraignment of Mackenzie & Mann's methods and operations made to parliament by R. B. Bennett, Conservative member for Calgary, today. Mr. Bennett's speech, following that by Mr. Nicke yesterday, has created a profound impression.

Mr. Bennett gave the result of months of careful study and personal investigation of the high financing of Mackenzie & Mann "the two greatest exploiters whom any country had known, who conceived the scheme of building a trans-continental line and getting the people to pay for it."

Mr. Bennett demanded a thorough public investigation, under oath, of the physical assets of the road and of the past and present financial operations of the promoters. Meanwhile the government should act in the capacity of a receiver, take over the road, continue the construction as necessary, pending the result of such inquiry.

The mandate for such investigation was written in the absolute contradictions between the statements made in the company's own reports for the consumption of investors and the information brought down by the government. "Either the one or the other," declared Mr. Bennett, dramatically holding up the conflicting documents, one in either hand, "is false."

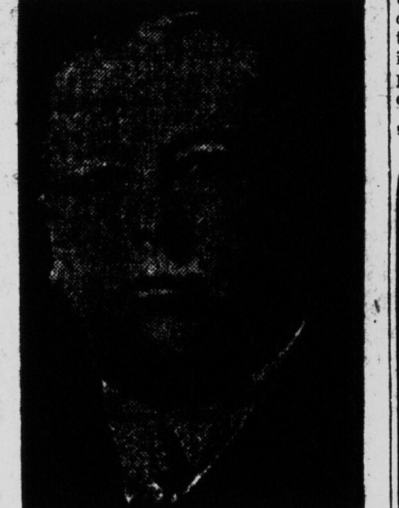
