

RICE CHOCOLATE PIE RICE CHOCOLATE PIE

Scald the milk in a double kettle, add
the eggs, rice, chocolate and sugar, and
stir until thickened slightly.
Bake in under crust and cover with mer-

For a light, sweet biscuit for a luncheon dainty, mix a baking powder biscuit dough roll it, cut into small circles; dip cubes of sugar in orange juice and plunge a cube in the center of each biscuit before baking; sprinkle with grated orange rind, add a few drops of melted butter; bake. Serve piping hot.

MOCK BISQUE SOUP.

A quart can of tomatoes, three pints of milk, a large tablespoon of flour, butter the size of an egg, pepper and salt to taste, a scant teaspoon of soda. Put the tomato on to stew and the milk in a double kettle to boil, reserving, however, half a cup to mix with flour; mix the flour smoothly with this cold milk and cook 10 minutes. To the tomato add the soda; stir well, and rub through a strainer that is fine enough to keep back the seeds; and butter, salt and pepper to the milk, and then the tomato. Serve immediately. If half the rule is made, stir the tomato well in the can before dividing, as the liquid portion is the more acid.





A Warning

During the trial it was intimated that if the law is to be carried out the middleman, so-called, might resort to some one of two or more expedients of procuring the provisions mentioned in the law from the farmer. I would suggest that, before they run any risk in such direction they better understand what the law is; they better remember that they may render themselves guilty of a more serious offence. Bacon's Abridgement is a pretty good legal authority, and from volume 3 we gather that forestalling is not only by statute but also a common law. ### SAYS YELLOW PERIL IS THREATENING AUSTRALIA

Writer in National Review Deals With 'Greatest Danger" of Commonwealth

The writer, George Gascoyne, and gues that this greatest danger to Australi and one of the greatest dangers to th British Empire lies in the vast unoccupie orthern territory of Australia. In the wo words of the Kaisier's famous phrase the danger is the Yellow Peril.

Here is a territory of 523,620 squaliles, two and a half times the size rance, with a seaboard of 1,240 miles, s ral splendid harbors and a series of navial to the riverse of the results of the resu patches of good pastoral land with uncertain rainfall, 34,000 square miles are good pastoral country, and another 29,000 are irst-class, both subject to intermittent ropical rain; 150,000 square miles are estentially tropical, with rainfall to correspond

In 1908 the white population of this great territory was 1,081, of whom 577 were male adults. In twenty-seven years the white male adult population increased by twenty-seven. In 1910 the white population was said to be stationary.

Mr. Gascoyne is very convincing in his argument that if this territory is to be colonized by colored labor, there is nothing for it but the yellow men. Once this is admitted he maintains that the game is up. Experience has proved that once admitted on a large scale the yellow man cannot be restricted to one area.

The article holds out no very comforting patches of good pastoral country and no prospect as to avoiding the danger.
