






## THE ENVELOPE SYSTEM.

---

Dean Carmichael would earnestly call the attention of each pew and seat holder to the fact, that as the charities and special offerings of the Church are paid out of the proceeds of the envelope system, all who do not take envelopes or send in special offerings are thereby debarred from aiding the rest of the congregation in supporting the charities and mission work of St. George's Church. Last year 134 subscribers, though taking weekly envelopes, subscribed \$3,270 for these various purposes. If all pew and seat holders joined the movement heartily and as their means permitted, St. George's could place many valuable charities on its list, to which at present it does not contribute as a congregation.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT FOR 1888-89.

---

I am happy to be able to commence my report by saying that although our expenses have been nearly \$200 more than last year, yet that by the generosity of the congregation we have not only been enabled to meet all our liabilities, but are left with a balance in hand to give us a fair start in the coming year. This is satisfactory, from two points of view. The need of more funds indicates the breaking up of new ground, and denotes a healthy state of activity in the Society. It also shows that the congregation is alive to its responsibilities and privileges in providing us with the necessary sinews of war to enable us to carry on our work. When the Grace Church Mission was opened, special donations were received towards the expenses of furnishing, amounting to \$70; and in reply to a special appeal made by our President, on the morning of 27th October, donations amounting to \$147 were sent in—one generous donor contributing \$100 and another \$20. It is hoped that the new mission at St. Henry will, in a short time, be entirely self-supporting. The balance-sheet for the year is appended, as also the list of the subscribers; and thus, happily, closes our accounts.

I acknowledge, with gratitude, the valuable and ready assistance I have received from our Rev. President. It must be satisfactory to our friends to know, that, with the small amount of money they entrust to my care, the Society is able to do so much good work; and for this, as for all mercies, we render a hearty *Laus Deo*.

## ST. GEORGE'S CHURCH TEMPERANCE SOCIETY.

This Society, formed 18th January, 1872, has 1,665 names registered on its list. It meets from October to May, holding public meetings, and of late has worked heartily though unsuccessfully in opposing the taverns in the neighborhood of St. George's Church. The school is divided into three divisions: senior school, intermediate school, infant school. Mrs. Carmichael is the superintendent of the girls' senior school, Mr. N. R. Mudge of the boys', Miss Lizzy Evans, assisted by a number of young ladies, superintends the intermediate and infant schools, and Dr. Lovejoy is treasurer of the schools, and M. E. H. Parnell secretary. The school supports a scholar in the Shingwauk Home, a cot in the General Hospital, and makes offerings from time to time to different missionary objects. The Rev. L. N. Tucker holds a women's Bible class which is largely attended. The offerings of this class provide for a scholarship in the Montreal Diocesan College. The Dean's class for men and young men meets from October to May. The offerings of the class are given to St. George's Young Men's Christian Association. Mr. J.W. Mills' class for senior boys and Miss Lunn's class for senior girls are both most regularly attended.

The Dean would urge on the parents and guardians of children connected with the congregation the necessity of sending their children to their own parish school. Whilst fully acknowledging that the instruction given in any one school of the Church of England is as a rule the same as that given in any other, he feels that attending the services of one Church and

the parish school of another, is not for the benefit of the child, or the advantage of the clergyman, the child growing up without acquaintance with its own pastor and the clergyman having but little, if any, personal knowledge of the child. Instead of the child coming to the confirmation class well known to the clergyman it comes almost a stranger, placing both child and clergyman at a great disadvantage towards each other. As far as the attendance of the school is concerned, what is lost in one way through this system is sometimes more than gained in another; but the Dean feels that the system is on the whole injurious to all schools, and that no excuse as to "convenience" can make up for the loss.

In presenting this eighth annual report of the Y. L. M. S., we feel very grateful to Dean Carmichael and other friends for the means they have placed at our disposal, which have been sufficient for all our needs. The membership list was below that of last year, but much interest in the work was shown by the young ladies, and the average attendance at the meetings was very good, notwithstanding the illness which prevailed in the city for a time. Meetings were held every Monday from November 4th to March 24th. Six bales of clothing and other useful articles were sent to missionaries in our own diocese. \$10.00 were given to Mrs. Dawson, who had kindly collected to pay for the laying down of pipes, pump, etc., for one of our missionaries. \$50.00 were sent to the Rev. Mr. Renison, Algoma, to help to rebuild his parsonage, which had been destroyed by fire last November.

As this is the only missionary society in connection with St. George's Church associated with Woman's Work, all moneys for missionary purposes are passed through our books. The sum of \$20.00 was handed to us from the Sunday School for Miss Ling's work; also \$42.00 from members of the congregation for Canon O'Meara, for Rupert's Land Mission.

During the winter, the members of the Society collected over \$50 to provide a library for the women's wards in the General Hospital. Over 150

books are now in circulation amongst the female patients.

Owing to Miss Durnford's temporary absence from Montreal, Mrs. Dawson kindly consented to undertake the position of Working Manager, assisted by Miss S. M. Durnford. We desire to thank these ladies for their continued work and zeal, feeling that much of the success of the Society is due to their interest and energy.

We would draw the attention of the ladies of St. George's congregation to this Society, which affords ample opportunity for all mission work, and we would hope that each year will show an increase of membership and interest in the affairs of this Society.

In presenting the Eleventh Report of this Society, your Committee would express, on the one hand, a deep sense of gratitude for the success which has so far crowned their efforts, and, on the other, one of deep regret at the loss of two of their most active workers. Early in the New Year, our Heavenly Father saw fit to remove our Manager, Mrs. Day, who for the past two years and a half had so faithfully and affectionately discharged her duties, and also to deplore the resignation of Miss Williams, who, having accepted office in another branch of parish work, deemed it advisable to resign her class in this school.

Since the beginning of the year the Manager's chair has been filled by Mrs. Evans, and under her administration the school has continued to flourish, as will be seen by the results as shown below. May she

long be spared to direct and guide this small but by no means unimportant branch of parish work.

The attendance this year has been more regular than formerly, varying but little during the winter, except for a short time after Christmas, which was largely owing to the epidemic so prevalent in the city at that time.

This year your Committee have each subscribed a small sum towards defraying all expenses not covered by the Dorcas Society, whom it has to thank for the greater part of the materials used for the work of the school. Their thanks are also due to Mrs. Esdaile and Miss Andrews for the regularity with which they have discharged their duties in the reading and singing branches of the work. The former they hope to retain with them for many years ; the latter, called away from the city by force of circumstances, leaves behind her a blank that will indeed be hard to fill.

During the 24 meetings which have been held, a large quantity of clothing has been made, the greater part of which the children have received for their own use, thereby lessening the work of the Dorcas Society. Three patch-work quilts were also finished, one of which, at the expressed desire of the late manager, shall be given to the Ladies' Benevolent Society. Another, under the direction of the Bishop, will be sent to a clergyman in the Diocese, and the third is intended for the Crèche.

The Christmas gathering was held on the morning of December 26th, and as usual was largely attended, the attraction being Christmas cards and candies.

Hoping that another winter may find all in their places again, ready to carry on the work in which they have been engaged for so many years, trusting that by God's help it may prosper as much in the future as it has done since its organization in November, 1879, when the teachers outnumbered the pupils.

The fortnightly meetings of the St. George's Branch of the Girls' Friendly Society were resumed on October 22nd, fourteen meetings (not including the annual festival) have been held up to the present date, the average attendance being between twenty-five and thirty.

Nine commended members from England and one from the States have joined our Branch since last spring. Six new members have been admitted to the Society by the Dean during the winter, and we have eleven probationers on the books.

A probation of three months is required before new members are admitted. This is found most useful, as the girls have time to decide whether they wish to

join the Society, and it also prevents us from enrolling unsuitable members.

Two members have been married, and continue in the Society as Friendly Helpers.

The prizes offered last year for sewing, knitting, darning, crochet and button-hole making were awarded at the annual festival. The competition was open to the other branches in the city, two of whom sent in work.

The amount of work done at the meetings has not been quite as large as during former years, as games have been provided which many of the members seem to enjoy. We expect, however, to have a bundle of clothing ready to send to Algoma before the meetings close for the summer.

One of our working associates, Mrs. H. C. Scott, was obliged to resign this winter, greatly to our regret, as she had been an active worker in our Branch since it was first started. The Branch meetings for Working Associates have been held once a month to discuss matters connected with the Society.
