MR. MEREDITH'S FAVORITE AGAINST GRAND TRUNK DICTATION.

Distribution of Representation on the General Council of the Imperial Institute—A Minister takes the Stump for Equal Rights.

Toronto, Ont., May 27.—A feature of the Ontario election campaign is the declaration of the Hamilton managers of the Grand Trunk railway that all employees of that railway have orders to vote for the Conservative government.

At Stratford last night Mr. Meredith attacked this and said: Notwithstanding the fact that Sir Joseph Hickson has received his knighthood, the free men of this country are not to be dragged into voting against their principles at the bid of any railway magnate. Who gave Sir Joseph Hickson and the board of directors of the Grand Trunk railway company the right to control the franchise of the free men of Ontario? Thursday is nomination day in Ontario in every constituency, two candidates in each case, three candidates are rarely. The government party will not allow any election to go by uncontested.
