

Among the missing are three parties of firefighters who are surrounded by fires in the Clearwater district of Ida- h0. It is believed that the men are in little danger as it is known that their camps are located in cleared areas. The message announcing the safety of Halm and his party was dated from Mountain, Mont., and was signed by Ranger Haines, who left Tuesday at the head of a relief party to search for Halm at the headwaters of the St. Joe. While there is little indication of rain, the forest fire situation continues to improve, as many of the conflagra- tions have practically burned them- selves out. 




