Special interest attaches to the New Brunswick portion of the scheme. After crossing the eastern part of Quebec from the St. Lawrence to Edmonton, the Transcontinental is designed to cross New Brunswick diagonally from Edmundston to Moncton.

At first sight, Nova Scotia is less interested than New Brunswick in the National Transcontinental Railway, but that is only in appearance.

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The War. Much dissatisfaction is reported amongst the Russian soldiery over their oft-repeated orders to retreat.

Russian reports were first to the effect that the Japanese lost 20,000 men in an attack on Port Arthur and, next, 17,000 men, while the defenders had only a few hundred casualties.

A St. Petersburg despatch of last Saturday afternoon says that in engagements of July 30 and 31 and August 1, the Russians lost about 4,000 men, and it was believed that the Japanese losses were the same.

It is stated by General Stoessel in latest despatches regarding the investment of Port Arthur that the ships, with their heavy guns, rendered great service to the garrison in repelling the Japanese and causing their heavy losses.

Altogether the folder reflects great credit on the skill and taste of the designer.

The Minister of Marine and Fisheries has determined on a plan of attack on the dogfish pest that has been causing such havoc among the fishermen of the last few seasons. After considering the proposal to offer a government bounty on dogfish, to encourage the fishermen to exterminate them, Mr. Prentiss has concluded that this method offers the prospect of complete success. He has decided instead to establish three reduction plants to convert the fish into fertilizer and soap. One will be established at the northern New Brunswick coast, probably on the shore of Gloucester; another will be on the southern coast of Cape Breton and a third most likely on the Magdalen Islands. They will cost one thousand dollars each, and the government will itself operate the plants, paying the fishermen a good price for their fish and for all the dogfish they can bring in. Mr. Prentiss is satisfied that the venture can be made to yield a satisfactory profit, and he already does along the American coast. He estimates that the price paid for dogfish and the desire of the fishermen themselves to get rid of the nuisance will be incentive enough to them to keep the reduction works supplied with all the material they require.
