

Magistrate Who Wrongdoing

Mr. M. G. Teed, K. C., in His Rep Provincial Government Does Not Find Police Magistrate Prejudiced Incapable of Discharging Duties--No Evidence of Negligence--for Preliminary Enquiries Not Retained Dishonestly--Careless Not Fraud in Not Accounting for Renewal Execution Fees--Exhâre Review of Evidence Submitted.

The report of Mr. M. G. Teed, K. C., who was appointed a commissioner to investigate into the charges against Mr. James Kay, Justice of the Peace and Police Magistrate of Moncton, was submitted to the Provincial Government at the meeting in Fredericton last week. It exonerates the magistrate of wrong doing.

The investigation followed the presentation of a memorial to the Lieutenant Governor, in which certain inhabitants of Moncton alleged that Mr. Kay had been for some years prejudiced, biased, incompetent and incapable of discharging in a fair and reasonable manner the duties of his office, and in consequence thereof the administration of justice in the City of Moncton, in the County of Westmorland, is and has been jeopardized and perverted to the prejudice and injury and wrong of many persons resident in the said County of Westmorland.

The memorial prayed that Mr. Kay be dismissed from his office, and that a fit and proper person be appointed in his stead, or that a commissioner be appointed to hold an inquiry into the charges. This was followed by a specification of charges signed by Mr. George L. Harris, of Moncton. These charges were followed later by allegations of facts which could be properly accounted for the fees received by him in his office.

Findings of the Commission
The commissioner, after an exhaustive review of the evidence taken at the inquiry, which was opened in Moncton on August 9, last, reports in his concluding remarks that the said James Kay has been prejudiced, biased, incompetent or incapable of discharging in a fair and reasonable manner the duties of his office, or exercised the duties of an unfairly and partially, and without due regard to law and justice, and do not find he has been negligent or derelict in the performance of the duties of his office so far as the administration of justice is concerned, nor in fact was there any evidence whatever that he was so negligent.

No Prejudice.
With reference to first division the evidence did not instance show, although by direct evidence of parties or from any inference to be drawn from the fact that Mr. Kay had the slightest prejudice, bias or hostility or partiality toward any of his litigants.

As to Incompetency.
In regard to the second division that is, as to incompetency, temperance, etc., to occupy such a judicial position. This involves the consideration of bias and partiality as well as actual knowledge and competency, and necessarily extends into dealing with the different cases that Mr. Kay had considered and decided, and in respect of which he is alleged to have acted as he did, not to say as a court of appeal from his decisions, but to examine them with the view to ascertaining whether or no they were warranted by the evidence, or so contrary to law and justice upon the evidence disclosed as to be themselves evidence of either bias or partiality.

The Charges.
Before giving a review of the evidence the report sets out the following specification of charges against Mr. Kay:
(a) The Daniel Madden case, wherein it was alleged he had refused bail to a party and detained him in the Moncton Police Station for forty hours, and then allowed him his liberty without bail.
(b) The Wallace-Black case, wherein it was alleged that the accused had been established as innocent, but his case was dismissed, and a great miscarriage of justice resulted.
(c) The case of The King vs. Wallace, wherein it was alleged that James Kay imposed imprisonment for one month upon the accused upon the sole evidence of the Mrs. Black above mentioned.

The Charge of Bias.
The charge of bias was set out in the following manner: "I have therefore, no recommendation to make in regard to his dismissal."

The Charge of Negligence.
The charge of negligence was set out in the following manner: "I have therefore, no recommendation to make in regard to his dismissal."

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Details of Complaint.
Mr. Fowler in his closing address divided the case or complaint into three divisions as follows:
1. With regard to the attitude which Mr. Kay adopted habitually towards litigants, attorneys and witnesses appearing in his court.
2. With regard to his incompetency from the legal standpoint and the standpoint of temperament, and almost every standpoint to occupy such a judicial position.
3. As to being a defaulter in regard to fees.

Case of Mrs. Mattie Black
The next case referred to was that of Mrs. Mattie Black. This is not only specifically mentioned in the charges as one wherein a gross miscarriage of justice resulted but the complainant, Mr. Harris, in his evidence before me, stated that it was this case that really brought his mind to the fact that something ought to be done—that this particular Wallace-Black case was the reason that led him to take this matter up with the Provincial Government.

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DESPATCHING TRAINS BY TELEPHONE SYSTEM

C. P. R. to Extend Telephone Lines from Atlantic to Pacific—Lines in Certain Sections Already in Use.

Montreal, Oct. 31.—The C. P. R. has completed its private telephone system from Cartier, Ont., on the main line east to Brandon, a distance of 1,045 miles. This is the nucleus of a system which will stretch from the Atlantic to the Pacific, with telephones all along the company's branches. This wire will hereafter be used on the Lake Superior division despatching trains, while from Fort William to Brandon the wire will be used for emergency purposes only, but it is possible the company will use them for despatching purposes also.

RURAL ROMANIA IS STILL PRIMITIVE

Customs and Habits Directly Traceable to Stone Age Still Observed by Certain Inhabitants of Rumania.

Berlin, Oct. 31.—Customs and habits directly traceable back to the end of the Stone Age are still observed by the inhabitants of the remotest parts of rural Rumania, says Dr. Emil Fischer of Bucharest in the current issue of the Umschau. The latest statistics show that there are still in Rumania over 5,000 cave dwellings in existence, in which a quarter of a million peasant folk live. These caves are almost as primitive in their arrangements as the original cave dwellings of the Stone Age.

DUKE OF BERWICK AND MARJORIE GOULD

CURIOUS BELG OF NAPOLEON RESTORED

London, Oct. 31.—Lord Archenbald Campbell has presented to the Army Museum in Paris a curious relic of Napoleon. This is the flag which the latter flew in the Isle of Elba during his captivity there. General Nixon, custodian of the Museum, has placed it in one of the rooms, where it can now be seen. The flag, which appears to have been entirely invented by Napoleon, although some say that it was in part suggested by that of Cosmo del Medici, a former sovereign of the island, is rather a strange standard. It is square, white, and fringed with gold, bearing three gold bees and a diagonal scarlet stripe.

NINE BURNED TO DEATH IN VERMONT FIRE Citizens Savings Bank at St. Johnsbury Destroyed, and With it Nine Lives—\$50,000 the Monetary Loss. FIREMEN UNABLE TO REACH VICTIMS

St. Johnsbury, Vt., Oct. 31.—When the ruins of the Citizens Savings bank had been wet down to a temperature which made possible thorough search, it was definitely learned that nine lives were lost in the fire which practically destroyed the principal business building of this town early today. Two other persons were probably fatally injured and two were taken to a hospital suffering from severe, but not dangerous burns.

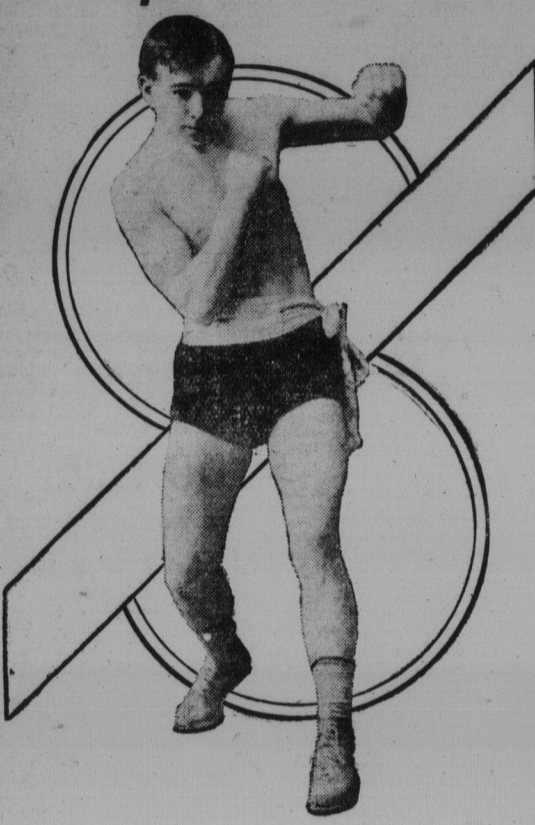

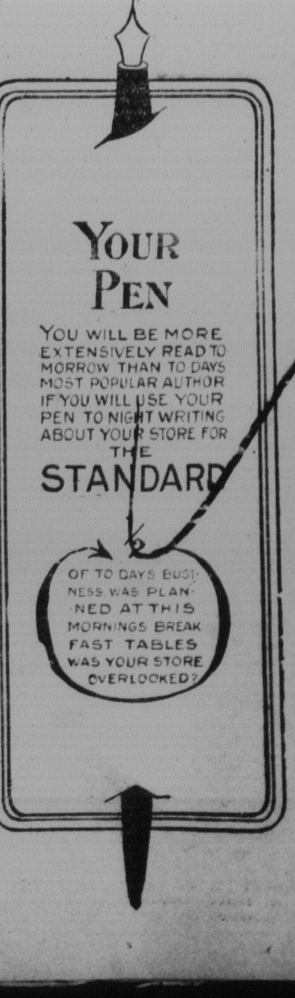

DR. KENNESS CHARGES HAVE BEEN REDUCED ONE QUARTER

First Six Months Under Hazen Government's Amendment To Liquor Law Show Satisfactory Results—One-third Less Cases On Saturday—Early Closing Of Saloons Mainly Responsible—Chief Clerk And Inspector Jones Speak Of Improved Conditions.

The amendments made to the Liquor Act by the Hazen administration at the last session of the provincial legislature have been in force in the city yesterday for half a year, yesterday, October 31, a sufficient time to determine their worth as effective temperance legislation.

By changing the opening hour from 5 a. m. until 7 a. m., the temptation of having a drink before going to work was removed from the workingman. But a much more important factor in the decrease resulted from the earlier closing on Saturday.

Less Opportunity. The amendments to the act which changed the hour of opening from 5 a. m. to 7 a. m., and the hour of closing on Saturdays from 7 p. m. to 5 p. m., are, it is believed, the chief causes for the reduction.

What the decrease as indicated by the above figures means is, in the opinion of the chief clerk, that the law is believed, is derived by the wives and children in many homes who are enabled thereby to obtain a fairer share of comfort, contentment and happiness.

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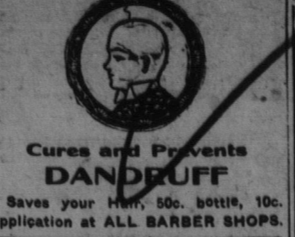
