## ARRIVES HERE EARLY TOMORROW MORNING

His Royal Highness will arrive here early tomorrow morning. He will disembark at the International Steamship pier, where he will be received by dominion, provincia and city officials and a guard of honor. The school children will join in the welcome be-
fore the Prince starts for the armories. The children of the orphanages will greet him on the south side of King Square and he will then proceed to the Barracks Square for the inspection of the veterans and the receiving of addresses. He will lunch at noon in the Union Club. During the day he will unveil a tablet in the post office, visit the Military Hospital in West St. John and will receive a welcome from the children of the North End in Riverview Park. 'In the late afternoon he will be present at a garden party at Government House, Rothesay. The children of West St. John will have an excellent opportunity of meeting the Prince when he visits the hospital. They will be accompanied in their singing by an orchestra. After making an auto tour through West St. John His Royal Highness will return to the East Side.
