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RANK INJUSTICE OF FORESHORES BILL AS SHOWN BY DR. ALWARD

"Hidden Hand" Behind Conspiracy to Confiscate Rights of Private Owners "Still Undisclosed," Says Leading Lawyer in Able Article on Subject—Not One of Six Representatives of St. John City and County Raised Protest Against "Iniquitous Piece of Legislation."

Notwithstanding the lively disturbance over the discovery of the famous fore-shores bill last spring, it appears that the people of this city and this province did not then fully understand the dangerous and confiscatory character of the proposed legislation. Additional facts are brought out and a much clearer light thrown upon the whole situation.

Far from being a harmless measure, it is a direct menace to every property owner along the river, stream and tidal water in the province. The bill directly challenges the authority of the private owner. It will enable the crown to give to any set of individuals control over the fore-shores at Courtenay Bay.

The layman will be interested in several other portions of the paper in which Dr. Alward has pointed out clearly the responsibility of the premier, the attorney-general, and the St. John members of the legislature. It is to be noted that this proposed legislation was copied from the Nova Scotia act in which the Premier, the attorney-general, and the St. John members of the legislature were the authors.

Early in April last, during the session of the Nova Scotia legislature, this subject of the fore-shore became a burning question in St. John. On April 4 there appeared an announcement in the morning paper that on the night previous the Hon. Mr. Fleming had introduced a bill respecting fore-shores, which on the next morning was received and passed its first and second readings.

The lieutenant-governor in council made the application in writing to the minister of lands and mines, (a) Give a grant from the crown to the landowner for the right to fish in the river or lake within the province, or any ungranted flat, beach or foreshore upon the coast of the province, or (b) Enter into a contract with any person of any such flat, beach or foreshore.

Under section 2 of the Nova Scotia Act, the grant resting on the fee simple of the land conveyed therein in the person receiving the same, is made subject to an open question as to the land between low and high waters along the St. John and other rivers used for rafting and other purposes.

DULWOOD EXPORTS ST. JOHN MAN SEES FROM CANADA AND HEARS DRILL SHOWING DECREASE OF CARSON'S ARMY

Shrinkage in 1913 in Exports But Amount of Pulp Imported More Than Doubled

Statistics of the pulpwood consumption during 1913, compiled by the forestry branch of the Department of the Interior Ontario, show that the forty-eight active firms in the Dominion consumed in their mills a total of 1,084,630 cords of unmanufactured pulpwood valued at \$10,074,025.

Thus a resident of this city spoke yesterday of his recent visit to a factory in Belfast where Ulster volunteers were drilling, and he said that when he had seen the men and their methods all doubt of the seriousness of the home rule question was dispelled from his mind.

The total quantity showed an average of 38.1 per cent. over that of 1912, and average price of raw pulpwood at the mill increased by 31 cents a cord, making an increase of 38.8 per cent. on the total value of the material used in the industry.
