Who Ate Roger Williams?

A correspondent having asked the Columbia (Mo.) Statesman what is meant by the question, "Who ate Roger Williams?" that journal replies as follows:

Last week we did not know that Roger Williams had been eaten, and so answered. Since that time a friend has given us information of the singular event, and it occurred in this wise Roger Williams was a native of Wales, was a Paritan, and the founder of the colony of Rhode Island. He died in Providence in 1683. Many NEWCASTLE years afterwards the private burying ground where he was interred was searched for the remains of himself and his wife, for the purpose of erect ing a monument over them. Very little was traced but a black line in the earth. The rusted hinges and nails earth. The rusted hinges and nails and a round wooden knot alone remained in one grave, while a single lock of braided hair was found in the other. Near the graves stood an apple tree, the large root of which had pushed its way to the precise spot occupied by the skull of Roger Williams, and, turning, passed around it and followturning, passed around it and followed the direction of the back bone to the hips. Here it divided into two branches, sending one along each leg to the heel, when the roots turned up ward to the toes, the whole bearing a striking resemblance to the human FLOWER SEEDS. These roots are now deposited in the Museum of the Brown University. It was thus found that the or-ganic matter—the flesh and bones of Roger Williams-had passed into a apple tree, transmitted into wood fibre, bloomed into fragrant blossoms and borne luscious truit which from year to year has been gathered and eaten. 
