WHAT THE TRADE SAYS.

We, the undersigned, Messrs. St. Stephen,

Divers have brought to the surface from the wreck of the steamship Atlantic, which was last seen on Nov. 10, 1874, a lot of iron with several greenish tints, which must have been affected by some chemical action.

The first meeting of the Balkan Conference took place to day. The business was limited to the examination of credentials and the appointment of officials. The conference will assemble on Saturday, when the first formal session will be held.

The Treasurer says Montreal has some smart men, but it is not a city of men who borrow money from accommodating friends, and lends it out to "hand up" people at 10 per cent interest. Would this be called petting without the meaning of the Act?

It is stated that Mr. Robert Reid, of Guelph, who built the bridge at St. Rose, and the international bridge at Port Byre, has been awarded the contract for building the Canadian Pacific Railway bridge at Lac Seul. The tender amounted to \$2,000,000.

The Quebec Post Office was recently injured by fire, but this did not prevent the despatch of the mails as usual, thanks to prompt action on the part of the authorities. The work of repairing and refitting the portion of the post office building destroyed by fire will cost about \$4000.

Owing to the small pox epidemic in Montreal there will be no winter carnival, and the citizens of Ottawa are in it for their opportunity, and will make a good thing of it. It is expected the Mayor will call a public meeting shortly to discuss the matter.

The anti-Scott Act party of Fredericton, it is said, have arranged a service of Rev. Mr. Anderson of Queens County to lecture for them the night previous to the election. The move is the pity, it is said, the case. We should like to see the Rev. gentleman in better company.

The column and a half petition recently published in many of the papers, and bearing the signatures of Reid and a number of half-bred, turns out to be a forgery. It was written in the office of L'Eclaireur, the leading Irish newspaper in Quebec, and was first published in that paper.

The United States government has forwarded to the minister of marine at Ottawa two gold medals for presentation to Capt. W. Graham, of the British barque Rapid Transit, and Capt. John Bark, of the British barque Hants County, for rescuing the crew of the American steamship Hunter, in March, 1885.

The Democrats carried New York State by 12,000 majority; the Republicans carried Massachusetts by 21,000 majority; the Democrats carried Virginia by 20,000 majority; Maryland by a working majority; Nebraska, Pennsylvania, Kansas and Connecticut went Republican in the elections held on Tuesday last week.

The dispute which arose two years ago, between the French and Portuguese governments as to their mutual jurisdiction in Guinea, has been settled. Portugal has ordered her officials in that corner of Africa to evacuate the stations recently occupied by Portuguese, as the definition of mutual jurisdiction has decided they belong to France.

A Nova Scotia exchange chronicles the death of four sons, by diphtheria, of Francis Marshall, of Colchester county. They ranged from 4 to 10 years of age, and the cause is made sick. Portugal, owing to the fact that Mr. Marshall, who is a farmer, is in ill health and unable to work, and relied solely upon his sons to work the farm.

Mrs. Vanhook and her son, of Bedford, while crossing a bridge in that locality recently, were blown off into a rocky stream. The woman struck on one of the rocks and lost her head, and unable to help herself. The young man swam to shore and then made efforts to rescue his mother. When brought to shore she was dead.

LOSOW, Nov. 6.—A despatch states that the Bulgarian troops have expelled Turkish. Advice from Constantinople say that the Turks are greatly irritated because Lascelles, the English agent at Sofia, constantly accompanies Prince Alexander to and from Philippopolis, as this action is supposed to indicate English approval of Bulgarian union.

New Bridges.—Tenders are asked by the Government for the construction of the passenger bridge which crosses the river at Woodstock. The plans and specifications for the reconstruction of the bridge across the mouth of the Crotonette are ready, and tenders will be immediately asked for.—Gleaner.

A tragic event occurred at Belvidere, Pictou, on the night of the 30th ult. As Prescott Archibald, son of George Archibald, was out on the balcony of their mill dam, it burst with a tremendous report, and the unfortunate young man was swept away with the debris. His body was found in a hole about three-quarters of a mile down the stream.

The Nova Scotia Grand Division, S. of T. has elected the following officers:—G. W. P. Rev. A. W. Nicholson, Windsor; G. W. A. J. McCann, Halifax; G. S. S. Rev. A. J. Temple, Halifax; G. T. Rev. H. A. Taylor, Halifax; G. C. Rev. J. A. Mosher, Acadia Mines; G. Con. R. L. Black, River Philip; G. Sent, J. D. McKinnon, Pictou.

The support of the New York Herald has generally been fatal to a candidate for the governorship of New York. The Herald supported Davenport, the Republican candidate in the contest of a few days ago, and Mr. Davenport was defeated by a large majority. It is significant that the Herald is just now abusing—not supporting—Sir John Macdonald's Government in this country.

KINGSTON, Ont. Nov. 8.—The results of the divinity examinations at Queen's University, Kingston, have been made known. The following students from the maritime provinces have been successful in obtaining scholarships: Johnson Henderson, of Pictou, N. S., won scholarship Buchanan No. 1, \$800. M. McKinnon, R. A. of Belvidere, P. E. I., won Buchanan No. 2, \$775, and W. J. Fowler, M. A., of Dartmouth, N. B., won the Dominion \$700.

On Thursday a man who was walking on the track near Rogers Station, was struck by a locomotive, and received severe injuries. The driver of the locomotive, however, was not hurt, and the man was evidently dead, paid no heed to the warning. The man was well cared for by the authorities, but has since died. A man named Lemont, of Rustico, P. E. I., was in Montreal a day or two before, begging for money to take him north, and his description corresponds with that of the man killed.

The examination of Robinson and Fisher at Charlottetown, for the murder of the boy Fitzpatrick was held last week. In his evidence Fisher stated that Robinson placed a cap on the gun which was held at his hip, snapped it merely to frighten the boy. When the gun was discharged Robinson exclaimed, "My God, I never knew it was loaded!" They did not know the boy was shot until Tuesday, 14th Oct., four days after the occurrence. Fisher will be discharged. Robinson is to be tried for manslaughter.

According to the North Sydney Herald, Mr. Dolan, of Big Harbour, Bonaventure, C. B., has made a valuable discovery on his farm recently. While digging a cellar, he noticed a large pile of stones, and on overturning the pile, found a pot of gold. The gold bears an ancient date, and was probably placed there by some of the early French settlers. Mr. Dolan has sent the gold to the United States to be

melted and coined. It is worth between \$2,000 and \$3,000.

Lady Dufferin, in her letter thanking the Lord Mayor of London for calling a meeting in aid of her fund for supplying female medical aid to the women of India, enclosed a letter from the high priest of the Temple of Bahai Nash, Bengal, stating that the endeavor to provide medical aid to the women of India was an undertaking which deserved the earnest support of every Hindu who had an attachment for his national customs and manners, and enclosing 100 rupees for the fund.

The Anglican Church is following the example of the Presbyterians regarding the augmentation of ministers' stipends. A committee of the Anglican Synod of Toronto Diocese have just issued a circular, appealing for subscriptions for that object, the amount required being \$16,000. The standard to be raised as follows:—Clergymen who have ministered in the Diocese for fifteen years and upwards, \$1,500; ten years and upwards, \$1,000; five years and upwards, \$500—in addition to parsonages, if any.

At a festival of York County Orangemen held at Fredericton on Thursday, a service was held in the Presbyterian church, when a sermon was preached by the Rev. A. J. Mowat, from the words, "As Bees, who for a month of moon, sold his birthright." At the conclusion of the service, Past Grand Master, Wm. Wilson, presented the clergyman with an address and a beautifully bound copy of the Bible. The recipient stated that the Bible so presented would be used for the first time on the opening of the new church.

The pastoral letter issued by the Archbishop and Bishops of the Catholic Church at the close of the plenary council last year contained this paragraph: "There is one way of promoting the Lord's day, which is to be a day of rest, and we considered it our duty to utter against it special condemnation. This is the practice of selling beer or other low standards or promoting places where they are sold. We implore all Catholics for the love of God and country never to take part in such traffic nor to countenance or patronize it, and we not

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only direct the attention of all pastors to the repression of this abuse, but also call on them to induce all who sell liquors to abandon the dangerous traffic."

THE CARDINALS HAT COMING TO CANADA. From the Courier des Etats Unis. A despatch from Montreal avers that the vacancy in the college of Cardinals created by the death of the Cardinal Archbishop of New York, will probably be filled by the promotion to that dignity of Archbishop Taschereau of Quebec. During the recent visit to Rome of a Canadian Bishop, who went there about the division of the diocese of Trois Rivières, Cardinal Simoni is said to have given him his promise to obtain for Archbishop Taschereau the first Cardinal's hat which should become disposable.

At the recent semi-annual meeting of the Provincial Rifle Association, held at the office of Major Parks the President, Capt. Hart, St. John N.B., was chosen Sec. Treas. Major Arnold, P. A. Melville and J. P. McIntyre were re-appointed auditors. The question of an inter-provincial match was talked over, and it was decided to open communication with the rifle associations of Nova Scotia and P. E. Island, with the idea of bringing about the first week in July; ranges 200, 300 and 500 yards; teams of 8 to 12 men each province; the prize a challenge cup with a badge for every man of the winning team; each association to contribute \$10 or \$15 to procure badges and necessary expenses attendant upon the shooting. The following were chosen as the executive, (the president and secretary being ex-officio members): L. C. Boer, Major Arnold, Capt. E. H. Hart, Lieut. Kinneir, P. A. Melville.
