WARNING TO MOTOR OWNERS

Too Many Driving Cars
Faster Than Law
Allows

THE PENALTIES

Many complaints have reached the Graphic of owners of motor cars who run their cars at a greater speed than the law allows. Especially in this case on some of the residential streets of the town where the roads are good. We have been asked to publish a few sections from the act, and also to state that if the law is not obeyed strict measures will be taken to prosecute offenders.

(1) No person shall operate a motor vehicle on a public highway at a rate of speed greater than is reasonable and proper, having regard to the traffic and use of the highway, or so as to endanger the life or limb of any person, or the safety of any property, or in any event, on any public highway where the contiguous territory thereto is closely built up, at a greater rate than one mile in eight minutes or elsewhere in a city, town or village, at a greater rate than one mile in five minutes, subject however to the other provision of this Act.

(2) Upon approaching a bridge over which it is forbidden to drive any vehicle drawn by a horse or horses faster than a walk, sharp, curve or steep descent, and also in traversing such bridge, curve or descent, a person operating a motor vehicle shall have it under control and operate it at a rate of speed not exceeding one mile in fifteen minutes and in approaching a crossing of intersecting highways, at a speed not greater than is reasonable and proper, having regard to the traffic of such highway and the safety of the public.

(3) The violation of any other provision of this Act shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars for a first offence; a fine not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than fifty dollars for a second offence; and a fine not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or both, for a third or subsequent offence. Not more than one conviction shall be made or recorded against any person for each of the offences under this Act, that are of a continuous character.

THE BIG FIGHT TO BE STOPPED

Governor Gillette Instructs
Attorney-General to Act
Promptly

FORCED TO ACT

San Francisco, June 16.—Stirred to action by insistent protests from all parts of the state and country, Governor Jas. N. Gillette has taken steps to prevent the championship fight between Jas. J. Jeffries and Jack Johnson scheduled to be held in San Francisco on July 4.

In a letter to Attorney-General U. S. Webb, the governor expressed his disapproval of prize fighting in unmeasured terms and directed that the aid of the courts be invoked to prevent the match. He concluded with a positive order that, in case the plea of a restraining order be not granted and the fight be held, the attorney-general proceed to gather evidence and prosecute the participants and those interested in the fight for violation of the penal code of the state.

The letter declares that the supreme court of California had not defined a prize fight, and suggests that an opportunity be given it to do so. While the status of the fight is in a unsettled condition, the sporting fraternity is much cast down and it is generally believed that the knell of prize fighting in California, "the mecca of prize fighters," according to the governor's letter, has been sounded.

This belief is borne out by the fact that the governor telegraphed to Attorney-General Webb late in the day to take similar action as to the fight scheduled for June 18 in San Francisco between Sam Langford and Al Kaufman.

ASSESSMENT FOR THIS YEAR FIXED AT TUESDAY NIGHT'S MEETING.

\$31,500 the Sum Required to Run Campbellton's Business Next Year. Other Business at Tuesday's Meeting.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Council Chambers, Tuesday evening at 8.30. There were present His Worship Mayor Murray and Councillors McDonald, Moore, Harris, McNichol and White.

The minutes of June 7th meeting were read and confirmed. A communication from S. D. Harriman asking for a license to conduct a small grocery store was read and referred to the Police and License Committee. The committee recommended that the license be granted on condition that the applicant should be a resident of the town.

Chairman McDonald reported that the Town Engineer had made an inspection of buildings on Water Street, up to Andrew Street, and reported a large number of houses and stores not connected with the water and sewerage systems.

Coun. McDonald reported that the water system on the government wharf has proved very satisfactory and vessels are now supplied with despatch. On recommendation of the Police and License Committee, Mrs. Comby was granted an increase to \$5.00 per month as caretaker of the lock-up.

Chairman McNichol of the Fire Committee recommended that Jones be appointed engineer of the fire engine, and Mont. Cantwell as fireman of the fire engine. Appointment was made accordingly.

Chairman McNichol moved that \$125 be granted the fire company to provide coats and boots and that \$100 be granted each year for providing such equipment. Carried.

The Council then adjourned.

MAY BE REFUSED.
Right to Operate Wireless Stations Here.

Ottawa, June 14.—The United Wireless Telegraph Companies of the United States have made application to the Marine Department for a license to erect and operate wireless stations in Canadian territory bordering on the Great Lakes.

Hon. Broder, Minister of Marine, has not yet granted the application and many decline to do so, on the ground that the United States has so far declined to become a party to an international agreement rescinded some years ago by all nations, with the exception of Italy and the United States, providing for regulations in exchange of wireless messages between ships flying different national flags.

LONDON TIMES MAKES GOOD SUGGESTION.

That King Hold Court in Capital of His Various
Dominions

Public Works Dept.
FREDERICK
NEW IMPERIAL IDEA

London, June 15.—"The Times" says it is hardly open to doubt if it were found possible for the king to hold courts in the capital cities of his various dominions, the effect upon the unity of the empire would be conspicuously beneficial. The Times thinks that the whole imperial idea towards which we are moving is a new thing which may well call for revision and expansion accepted ideas of royal activity. "The designation of the Duke of Connaught as governor-general of Canada, although not directly determined by a conscious adoption of this expanding idea of the place of monarchy in the empire, does undoubtedly operate in that direction. It is perhaps all the more valuable as an indication of the trend of events just because it comes about in the ordinary course without definite intention to open up a new imperial epoch."

THINK FIGHT WILL YET TAKE PLACE.
Special Train From New York to California Not Cancelled.

New York, June 16.—Broadway was started by the news from San Francisco, but the assumption that the fight would probably be held elsewhere, if the Californian ban is not raised, caused the first fears of the sporting element. So far as could be learned none of the special trains from New York to the Arena have been cancelled, and the assumption is that the route will be transferred from California to Nevada or Utah.

THE TAX RATE
The assessment for the current year has been placed at \$31,500.00. This is an increase of \$4,500 over the amount raised last year, but the council anticipates that this will meet all demands against the town for a full year, besides providing for the over expenditure of each department for the next few months. While the increased amount will necessarily increase the rate it is anticipated that it will not be more than \$1.00 per \$100. Considering the growth of Campbellton and the large amount needed for street extensions and other work, even this rate will compare very favorably with any town in the Maritime provinces and is much lower than the majority of towns.

TWENTY-FIVE BODIES FOUND.
Damage to Herald Plant is Almost Complete.

Montreal, June 16.—Twenty-five bodies have now been recovered from the Herald ruins of which twenty-one have been identified. The bodies identified today are: Wm. Murphy, Frank Jensen, R. Harris, Dorothy Ward and Jennie White. Another is reported among the missing, Richard McCreary, who came from New York a few days ago, and went to the Herald the fatal morning to visit a friend and has not been seen since. He was staying with his sister, at 192 Milton Street. The bodies of two boys about 17 years of age and two girls are unidentified.

The damage to the Herald plant is almost complete. One third type and perhaps two went to the basement and others are damaged by fire and water so that salvage is not expected by the management to amount to a great deal. The Melbie presses of the job room were wrecked completely. They numbered six. Of the two newspaper presses the older one in the centre of the building is not likely to be worth much more than scrap. A new one near the front of the building is hoped to come out in fair shape, except for the rust. The management claim if they had been able to get at the machinery Tuesday before it was so badly ruined a great deal of it might be saved to a great extent. With so much debris yet to clear away a thorough examination is impossible.

FIVE WEEKS' WITH THE FRUIT GROWERS

A. G. Turner, Provincial Horticulturist, returned ten days ago from a five weeks tour among the fruit growers of Ontario and Quebec. The Government orchards at Andover, Stanley, Deshaies, Chatham, Tatamagouche, Balmoral and Burtocroft were visited and a number of trees replanted. New illustration orchards were set at Little Shennog, Westmorland Co. and Plaster Rock. All the illustration orchards have been pruned with the exception of those at New Bandon, Kingston and Upper Queensbury. Five hundred trees belonging to Stanislas Cormier, a Quebecian, were visited and pruned. The trees are in bloom exceptionally early this year and some localities slight damage from frost is reported. As an instance of the early season the eggs of the caterpillars have been hatched April 27th. The insect and the larva of the bud moth are increasing steadily from year to year and spraying will have to be more generally adopted if their ravages are to be checked.

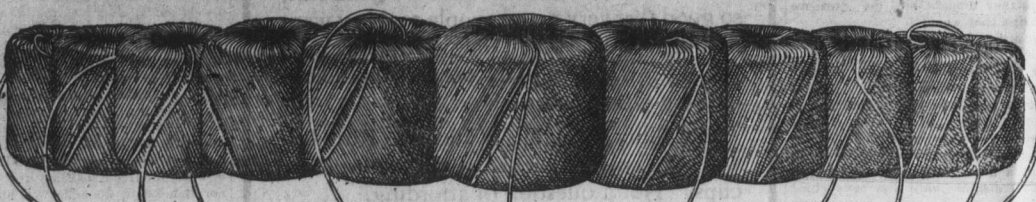

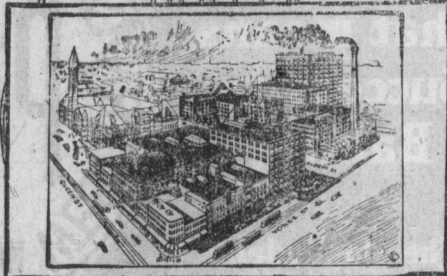

EVANGELIST KNIGHT ON THE S. S. LESSON.

The Bower, June 10th. Matt. 13-1, 2, 13, 23.

I once asked a small boy the definition of a "parable" which he gave as follows: "It is an earthly story with a heavenly meaning." Webster could not have done better.

The teachers and preachers who attract multitudes are those who like their Master, teach largely through illustrations or parables founded on scenes in real life and bristling with points as a paper of pins.

"How can I speak so as to hold the attention of restless throngs that come and go in an open air meeting?" asked a young worker.

"Fling out a text and tell stories all around it," was the reply given by Lord Sheildbury of Canada, the late Mayor of Toronto.

Stories are remembered even by the densest intellects. "Stories," says Ruskin, "are traps set attractively baited and which in time will spring and hold." Robert Louis Stevenson said "Stories are not the same as reason but are vastly more convincing."

The parables or stories of Jesus have been like a pillow of fire to the Bible student and a pillar of cloud to the unbeliever for they have given in a form which would veil the true meaning from the Jewish and Roman governments and unbelievers of all times.

His disciples said "Wh. spakest Thou in parables?" He answered "because it is given unto you to know the mysteries of the Kingdom of Heaven, but unto them it is not given. Therefore, speak I unto them in parables because they seeing and hearing they hear not neither do they understand. Blessed are your eyes for they see and your ears for they hear."

Jesus is at the seashore. He is down on the beach. Some one hears of it, perhaps a summer visitor, who hastens to tell all in the cottages. Perhaps it was a fisherman who hastened to tell his friends or a shepherd as he drove his flock to the little brook that emptied itself into the sea, for soon a crowd gathers.

What do you say? "Hurry, you may be too late to see Him walk the sea as though it were dry land." "Make haste, He may be even now commanding the winds and waves to be still."

"Will He perform a miracle, do you think?" How I wish He would heal some one with a touch.

The excited, curious crowd surrounds Him. He steps into a fishing boat and seating Himself tells them the parable of the sower or rather the parable of the soil which a farmer had to contend with.

"Behold a sower went forth to sow and as he sowed some seeds fell by the wayside," the hard beaten path that led through the uncultivated grass fields. Here it lay in full view of the crows who were not long in making away with it.

"Some fell on stony places where they had not much earth." Where the dry underlying rock held the sun's heat like a hot bed and forced the seed so that "forthwith" they sprung up but the shallow roots perished with the over heated soil could not penetrate where it was moist and cool, and when the sun was up they were scorched.

"Some fell among thorns" in land where thistles grow fifteen feet high. No wonder its roots were crowded out and all the nitrogen, ammonia and potash that should have gone to the good road was absorbed by the thistles.

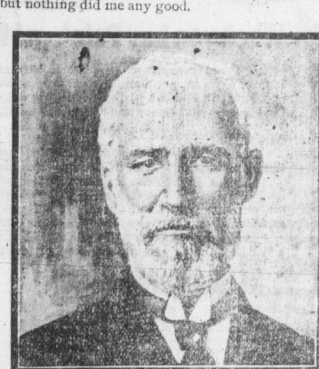

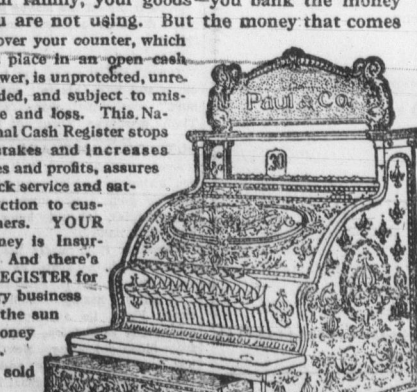

SERMON FROM SHAKESPEARE.

Henry VI. Part II. Act V. Sc. 2.

A great general of the American Civil War forcibly remarked, "War is hell." He knew from experience the evils of war, the sufferings endured, the sorrow left in its wake, the permanent injury done the parties or nations engaged. His expression was not strikingly original. Shakespeare three hundred years ago formulated the same sentiment in almost the same words. It is true that it is not Shakespeare but one of his creations who speaks of war as the son of hell, but so often passages sternly condemning war appear in his dramas that it can be taken for granted that Shakespeare himself is here speaking.

There is no present day subject that more demands the thoughtful consideration of the patriot than that of "contumacious, beastly, mad-brained war." As the nineteenth century closed it was hoped that the time was drawing nigh when men would convert their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Peace conferences met, emperors and presidents talked universal peace, but while the echo of the peace orations was still in the air the two most highly civilized nations found themselves engaged in war—the United States with Spain, and Great Britain with the Boers. Scarcely had the sound of the "devilish cannon" of these powers died away when Russia and Japan were at each other's throats. To all of these nations war proved a hell. It desolated homes, it filled the workhouses, it drove thousands into exile, it vastly increased the burdens of the toilers. The suffering caused, the losses endured should have turned men's thoughts to peace. Instead of this the dogs of war are abroad. Never before had militarism such a grip on the race. Europe is an armed camp; Japan is ready to do battle with any power that challenges her; and even China is waking from her sleep of twenty centuries and more and her cities are noisy with preparations for war. The shipyards of the civilized powers are turning out monster battleships. The inventive genius of the race are devoting their time to new explosives and more effective guns. In Europe and America and Japan danger experiments are striving to conquer the air mainly in the interests of war. Where will it end? Must the nations meet in one bloody battle before worldwide peace can be secured? War is the child of selfishness and shall be declared?

greed, it is brought about, largely by men who will never be satisfied for butlers. Calmly they sit on their thrones or in their offices and stir up strife that is likely "to lay the summer's

grass" of their country "with showers of blood." If the politicians were placed at the head of the armies in conflict, or on board the battleships, in a deadly struggle, there would be less talk of war, less building of Dreadnoughts. Were they brought into the presence of battle they would "Pull armor on their ears and on their eyes" that they might not see the monster that they had conjured up.

Shed will have blood. One war is the breeder of another. Russia failed in her purpose against Japan. The Russians agreed to what was to them, a humiliating peace. They will feel the discipline until they have wiped it out or suffered more in another war. They are but biding their time. If France had the strength she would gladly precipitate a war with Germany on account of past defeats.

Scholars and statesmen have met together with the hope of establishing peace among the so-called Christian powers. Their efforts have been in vain. War, that son of hell, is still abroad. In spite of mother's tears and prayers, in spite of the intellectual outpourings of the pulpit, platform and the press, the powers are ready, apparently eager, to let slip the dogs of war. Is there no way to bring them to their senses? Their people are groaning under a burden of taxation, their sons are fleeing to foreign lands to begin life under more favorable conditions. They care not. Their battle strength must be maintained, though their people starve. Their excuse is that in order to maintain peace they must be ready for war. Would it not be fitting that these powers, so anxious to maintain peace that they pour out treasure-like water and draw men from productive industries to battle-ships and barracks, should get together and devise ways and means of maintaining peace without burdening their subjects to the breaking point and multiplying engines of war? If they could only fully realize the awful effects of war, realize them as Shakespeare realized them, they would bring about speedy conditions of peace.

There is a fallacy that war is necessary for giving a nation character. Man has Nature to battle with. His character can be grandly moulded in bridging great rivers, constructing useful canals, stringing railways across the continents and through mountain passes. The energy put forth, the millions expended in such undertakings enrich the nation. The millions of money and the thousands of lives sacrificed in war are but an offering poured forth to that insatiable idol of the nations, which Shakespeare has appropriately termed the "son of hell."

The seed of truth falls on four classes of hearers.

The first are like the trodden path so hard that nothing but the spout of adversity can break them up and put them in condition to receive the Lord. The seed sown is quickly snatched away by the devil who is ever on the look-out to keep the seed from sinking into the hearts of men.

The second receive the word with joy. It takes hold of their emotions but not of the depth of the will. Torrey says, "Truth often makes deep souls and before it makes them glad, a deep work is better than a swift one." Let them get a working at the mouth of a critic and where are they? They wither up at the sneer of a fool.

The third class is like the soil that produces thistles, rich, promising, but preoccupied. The seed grows rank and luxuriant but is choked. They are really interested in the Word of God. It took hold of them for a time but "the cares of the world and the deceitfulness of riches" choke the Word. "I want the prayers of this meeting for my son," an aged saint.

"Why, what is the matter with him?" asked the pastor. "He is growing rich," was the reply. Torrey says that one of the most promising and energetic young Christians of the cities in Chicago is nothing now but a withered millionaire with one foot in the grave which he himself will soon enter. It is the Word of God in your soul and mine being choked out by business or household cares? Let us take heed.

Then there is the fourth class. They are whole-hearted fellows who hear the Word of God and take it in. 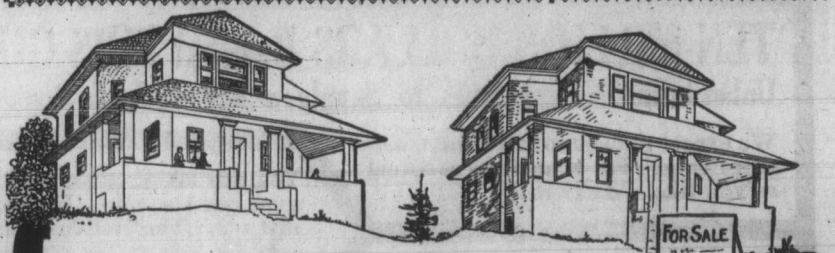
