GAME LAW CHANGES

Several Amendments of Interest to Hunter.

CALF MOOSE

Cannot Be Hunted Under Two Years of Age

Some important amendments have been made to the game laws during the session just ended.

The close season for partridge will end Sept. 14th of this year, and in future will extend from Nov. 30th in each year until Sept. 15th in the year following.

No calf moose can be hunted under the age of two years, instead of one year, as formerly, and no cow caribou can be hunted. No license can be obtained to shoot a cow caribou. The penalty for such offense is set at a fine of from \$100 to \$200, or from 20 days to two months' imprisonment.

No gun or other firearm shall be carried into any forest or wood or other reserved for moose or caribou between Nov. 30th in any year and Sept. 15th in the year following without a permit of a game warden. Formerly this section applied only to parks and reserves. The penalty for an offence under this section is set at a fine not to exceed \$40 or imprisonment for one month in jail, and wardens may confiscate any arms carried contrary to this law.

In future hunters must have a license to shoot deer, and no deer should be shot at night. Penalty under this section, which of course applies also to moose and caribou, is a fine of \$50 to \$150, or imprisonment for one month to three months.

Deputy wardens must pass an examination to the satisfaction of the surveyor general as to their knowledge of woodcraft, the habits and resorts of game animals the provisions of the different acts for protection of game, and such other matters as the surveyor general may require. But all now acting as deputy wardens shall continue to act until called on to pass the examination.

The section compelling wardens to forward to the Surveyor general the names of guides in their district is repealed.

Wardens may confiscate the head of any moose or caribou unless it is accompanied by the owner, or properly tagged with the owner's name.

Moreover, when any person kills a moose or caribou he must exhibit the head to a warden, who will affix a tag, stating the name of the person who killed the animal, the license number, and the time and place of killing. This tag must be preserved and no head shall be delivered to the owner when preserved or mounted, nor shall any head be exported without such tag attached.

It is further an offence to kill any moose or caribou where it is impracticable to bring out the head for inspection by a warden so that he may affix a tag. Penalty the same as that for hunting moose or caribou without a license.

Guides having a guide's license to accompany hunters cannot at the same time have a license to kill any moose or caribou. Before a man can act as guide he must be registered in the office of the surveyor general and hold a certificate. The certificates are granted on filling an application with sufficient particulars and on payment of a fee to be fixed. The license will remain in force until cancelled by the surveyor by good cause shown. Formerly guide's

A chief ranger is to be appointed whose duties will be to see that the laws with regard to protection from forest fires are enforced.

The license fee for non-residents hunting moose or caribou is increased from \$30 to \$50.

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

Special Meeting Convene at New Carlisle.

MARCH 29TH.

Important Matters Before the Council. Assessment.

Minutes of a special meeting of the Municipality of the County of Bonaventure, held at the Town Hall on Wednesday, March 29th, 1905, at 10 a. m.

Mayors present—His Worship the Warden of St. Charles and Caplan; Narcisse Richard, Metapedia; Robert Noble, Restigouche; Thomas Busted, Mann; Pierre Landry, Nouvelle and Schoolbred; Nicholas Allard, St. Omer; Dr. H. J. Martin, Carleton; James Lind, Pro-Mayor, New Richmond; Narcisse Cyr, Mvssellyville; Bonaventure Guthrie, Hamilton; W. L. Kempfer, New Carlisle; John Clement, Paspebiac; Wm. Jas. McRae, Hope; Pierre Derche, Port Daniel East; forming a quorum under the Presidency of His Worship the Warden.

The minutes of the last meetings and the other minutes of adjournments were read and approved of on motion of Mr. Kempfer, seconded by Mr. Cyr.

Messrs. Flynn and Blanchet, Advocates, having made objections to the words entered in the above minutes that read thus, "Seeing no satisfactory advice was forthcoming from Mr. Flynn as well as Blanchet" it was moved by Mr. McRae, seconded by Mr. Busted that the same be struck out, and the following inserted to wit., that they bring both interested in the proceedings of this Council that they were unable to give the necessary advice asked for. Passed.

The election of the Warden then took place. Moved by Mr. Clement, seconded by Dr. Martin that Francois Doiron, Esq., be re-elected Warden of this County for the current year. Passed unanimously.

The oath of office of Warden was administered by Mr. Nicholas Arsenault, J. P., and the Warden, on taking his seat, cordially thanked the gentlemen Mayors for their consideration in electing him for the second term of office and hoped that by their aid and assistance the affairs of the county would continue to prosper as heretofore.

The Messrs. Flynn and Blanchet then asked permission to appear as attorneys named for and against the question now before this Council of the erection of St. Laurent with a municipality, which permission was granted them.

Moved by Dr. Martin, seconded by Mr. Gauthier the petition of a certain number of ratepayers of a certain part of the Township of Metapedia as marked No. 4 asking to be annexed to the proposed erection of the Parish Municipality of St. Laurent to lay over until next meeting for consideration.

Mr. Flynn then explained his reasons why that the said Parish Municipality should not be erected and presented petitions and arguments to that effect. The hour of one o'clock having arrived, the meeting adjourned until two p. m.

At two p. m. the meeting continued and all the above mentioned Mayors were present.

Mr. Blanchet then presented himself before the meeting with the necessary documents relating to the erection of the Parish Municipality of St. Laurent de Metapedia into a Municipality for all Municipal purposes and after having explained the different reasons therein concerned.

It was moved by Mr. Richard, seconded by Mr. Derche that the question of erecting the Parish of St. Laurent de Metapedia into a Municipality for all Municipal purposes be hereby adopted, accepted and approved of by this Council.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Busted, seconded by Mr. Kempfer that the above question of the erecting the Parish of St. Laurent de Metapedia into a municipality be rejected and thrown out by this Council. After some discussion Mr. Busted withdrew his amendment.

Whereupon it was proposed in amendment by Mr. Arsenault, seconded by Mr. Kempfer, that the above question of the erection of the Parish of St. Laurent de Metapedia into a Municipality to lay over until next meeting for consideration.

The amendment being carried, the main motion was lost.

The question of the St. Louis Road was then taken up and discussed, whereupon it was moved by Mr. Arsenault, seconded by Dr. Martin that in future the said road known formerly as the Sandy Bay Road and now known as the St. Louis Road according to a by-law passed by this Council on the 8th of March 1883 containing two concessions, will in future be entertained and kept in repair to wit: Three-fourths of said road by the township of Nouvelle and Schoolbred and the remaining part or quarter by the townships of St. Omer and Carleton.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Busted seconded by Mr. Noble that the above question of the St. Louis Road to remain in consideration until next meeting so as to give the interested parties an opportunity of taking legal advice on the matter. For the amendment the mover and seconder, Messrs. Clement, McRae, Kempfer, Gauthier, Derche and Cyr. The amendment being carried the main motion was declared lost. Passed.

Moved by Mr. Busted seconded by Mr. Landry that the road dividing townships of Nouvelle and Schoolbred and Mann, be declared a County Road and that the costs and expenses relating to the keeping and entertaining such road will be hereafter borne and paid by the said two municipalities which they divide, and the maintenance of the King's Highway dividing certain parts of the said Municipalities be maintained as heretofore, that is to say by each Municipality in their own proportion, and that the road known as the new road leading from the King's Highway to the second Concession and dividing the Municipalities of Nouvelle and Schoolbred and Mann, be declared a County Road and the maintenance of same to be equally divided in proportion between the said two municipalities. Passed.

Moved by Mr. Kempfer seconded by Mr. Clement that the accounts of the Secretary Treasurer of the last year be accepted and approved of seeing the favorable reports made by the auditors.

Moved by Mr. Kempfer, seconded by Mr. Busted that seeing that there are three municipalities who have still balances due for last year be notified to pay in their respective amounts without delay. Passed.

Chicago has not the reputation of being a very clean city, nevertheless Carter Harrison, ex Mayor of that city in his article on civic government ignores the subject of filthy streets as though it were altogether foreign to him. We should like to have seen an expression of his opinion on the subject. While perhaps not as valuable as we should like, it might at least give us one or two pointers on how to keep our streets clear of tobacco juice, orange peel, paper, etc. There seems to be little or no effort on the part of many residents of our town to prevent the promiscuous distribution of obnoxious material about the streets. The garbage which lies about the streets and back yard is a menace to public health. It is besides unsightly. Every effort should be made to beautify our town and not disfigure it.

The Town elections are over. The new Aldermen will pretty soon see that they have not dropped into a bed of roses—that is if they bear the title of alderman for any length of time.

POOR SALE OF LUMBER LANDS.

The sale of timber licenses at the crown land office, Fredericton, was not as successful as anticipated. Of that 240 square miles advertised for sale, only 62 1-2 were disposed of, and all went at the upset price. The total proceeds of the sale were \$1,250. Adams Burns and Co. of Bathurst were the heaviest purchasers, they bid 24 1-2 square miles at a cost of \$480. All the berths bid in by them are located on the Nepisiquit at the total cost of \$430. The Wm. Richards Company were the purchasers of 10 1-2 miles on the Restigouche at a cost of \$210. One berth on the Northwest Miramichi river, containing six miles, went to Sheriff O'Brien at the upset price—Commercial.

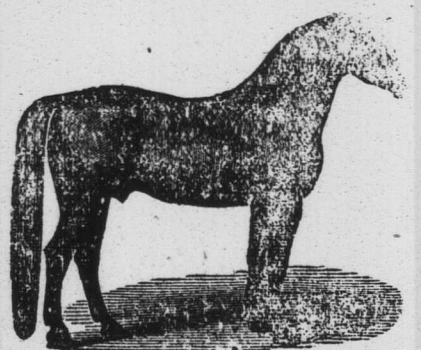

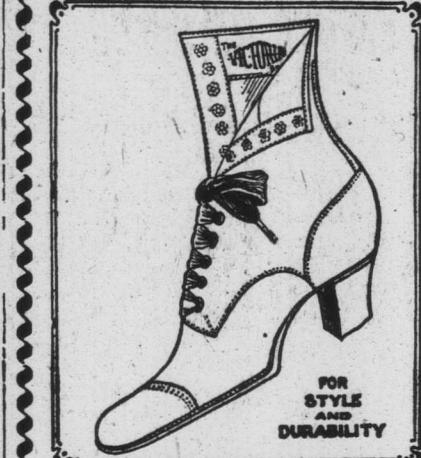

Ward one has of late years not been holding her own in the general improvements so noticeable throughout the town but there is now every evidence that there will be a smart forward movement in business generally in the coming summer. The skeleton minus the head of a victim of the great Miramichi fire was unearthed here on Wednesday. The case was made by Mr. George Stothard and workmen on what is known as the old Murray property situated off the highway leading from the Queen road to the County Academy. Mr. Stothard had been at work digging a cellar on the property for some time and was naturally surprised to make such a gruesome find.

The skeleton is generally thought to be that of a colored woman. It seems that when the great fire was at its height this woman was confined in the county jail. Her screams attracted the attention of men who were fleeing towards the river and they stopped long enough to liberate her. She was a woman of heavy build and before she could reach the river the flames overtook her and she perished near the present square. After the fire her remains were interred in the Murray property. About fifty years ago, a phenologist by the name of McLeod, came up from his home in Douglastown, found the grave of the colored woman and removed the head.

Mr Stothard left the skeleton on a pile of earth when he returned home Wednesday but on his return the following morning it was not to be found. Its disappearance is mysterious for very few were aware of its presence.

Near the same spot the remains of two murderers and one suicide were also interred.—Advocate.

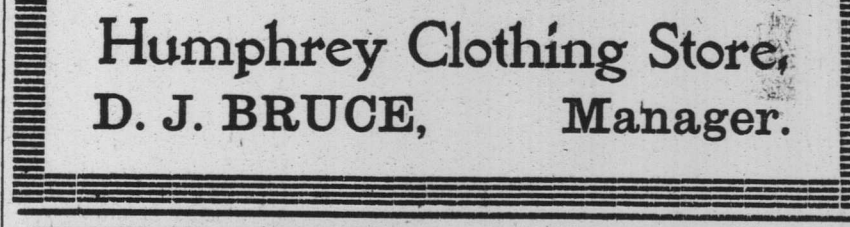

DEATH MASK STAMPS.

The Serbian Issue Which Is in Demand Among Collectors.

According to a Belgrade correspondent, the publication of the story of Queen Natalie's intrigue to revenge herself on Serbia, followed by the sudden withdrawal by the postal authorities of all the new coronation stamps, is the sole topic of conversation throughout the Balkan states.

In order to celebrate King Peter's coronation the Serbian government decided to issue a series of large postal labels bearing the new monarch's portrait beside that of his ancestor Kara-george.

The engraving was unfortunately entrusted to a Frenchman named Mon-chon, a person, it is alleged, very friendly toward Queen Natalie, and he very skillfully introduced into the design for the new postage stamps the ghastly features of the queen's murdered son, King Alexander.

A vast number of the coronation stamps were issued to the public before it became known to the authorities that the new issue was regarded by many of King Peter's superstitious subjects as a "heavenly sign" that the new monarch's reign was to be "brief and bloody."

If one of the new stamps be held upside down the unmistakable death mask of King Alexander may be seen, formed by a portion of King Peter's head with that of his ancestor, Kara-george. The nostrils of the two heads together form the eyes of the murdered monarch, the mustaches make the eyebrows, and the eyebrow and eye of Kara-george form King Alexander's nose and mouth.

The "death mask stamps," as the new issue has become known, have undoubtedly made a great impression in the army and among the uneducated classes.

"I learn on the best authority," concludes the correspondent, "that the government is making desperate efforts to buy up as many of the dangerous labels as possible and is even sending agents abroad to France, Germany and England to secure them at any cost from speculators and foreign stamp dealers."—London News.

The Earth's Internal Heat.

Whether the internal heat of the earth was in the first place due to the presence of radio active matter or to other causes is a very debatable question, for the answer involves considerations of the origin of the earth as a member of the solar system. Whatever view may be taken of this problem, there can be no doubt that the discovery of the distribution of radio active matter in the earth throws grave doubt on the validity of those calculations of the age of the earth which are based on the assumption that it is a simple cooling body and tends to show that the present internal heat will be maintained for a much longer interval than was at first supposed.

On this theory of the maintenance of the internal heat no definite limit can be set for the age of the earth, but some deductions can be made of the probable variation of the internal heat within time.—Professor Ernest Rutherford in Harper's Magazine.

A Story of Tom Watson.

Before Thomas E. Watson attained to his present confidence while addressing audiences he had several misadventures on the platform. On one occasion he was speaking to a mixed crowd not far from his home and was blazing away in good style when a singularly beautiful young woman entered the hall. The orator, impressed with the girl's loveliness, lost the thread of his discourse, hesitated and finally stopped. The audience, not understanding his embarrassment, encouraged him with cries of "Go on," but Watson knew he could not respond with good effect. His quick wit came to his rescue, however. Stepping to the front of the platform, he said in a low voice, "Ladies and gentlemen, I should be glad to continue, but the lady who has just come in fairly took my breath away." Then he sat down amid a hearty round of applause.

Why All the Pearl Streets?

Can you tell me why it is that in nearly every town of any size you are sure to find a Pearl street? There is reason in plenty for Main street, State, Front, River, Water, Church, Chapel, High, etc., but this so often repeated Pearl street is too much for me. If it were only here and there it might pass for a coincidence, but it is so general that I am inclined to think there must be some reason for it, though for the life of me I can't imagine what the reason may be. Though it may seem queer to you, I have special ground for wondering about this thing. I am not jealous of the man or woman or thing that may be the cause of it all, but whoever or whatever he, she or it may be I am anxious to find out.—Margaret Thompson in New York Times.

Collapsible Theater Hat.

A collapsible theater hat which may be folded into a minute space and when necessary will resume its former symmetry has been invented by a London milliner for the benefit of her sex. The hat, which has been patented, is made on an ingenious framework, which can be covered with pliable straw, chiffon, lace or cloth—indeed, any material save velvet, which would crush too much to be of service. It can also be modeled in any shape to suit any style of beauty.

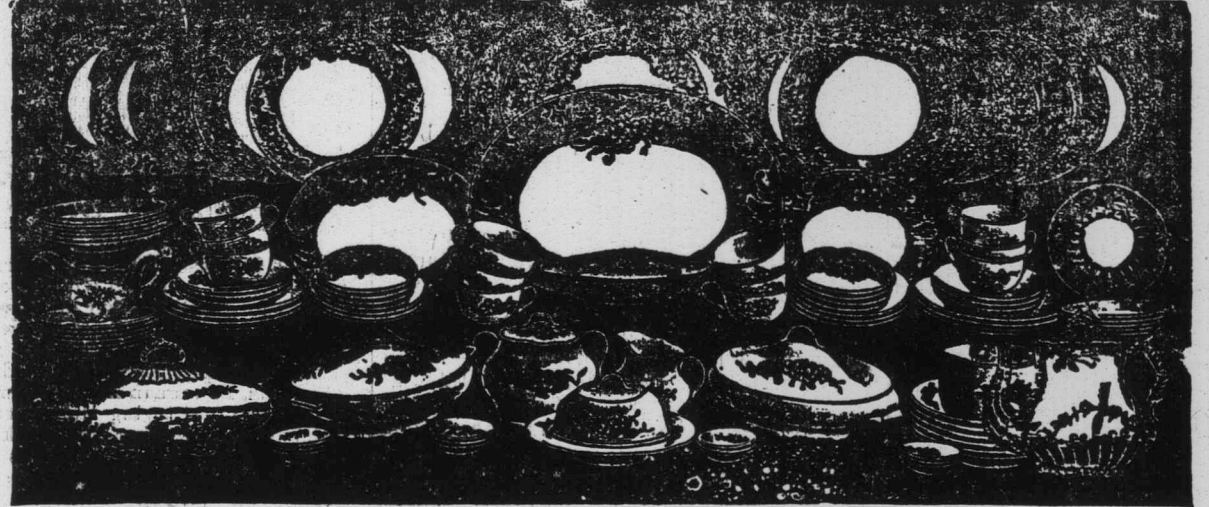

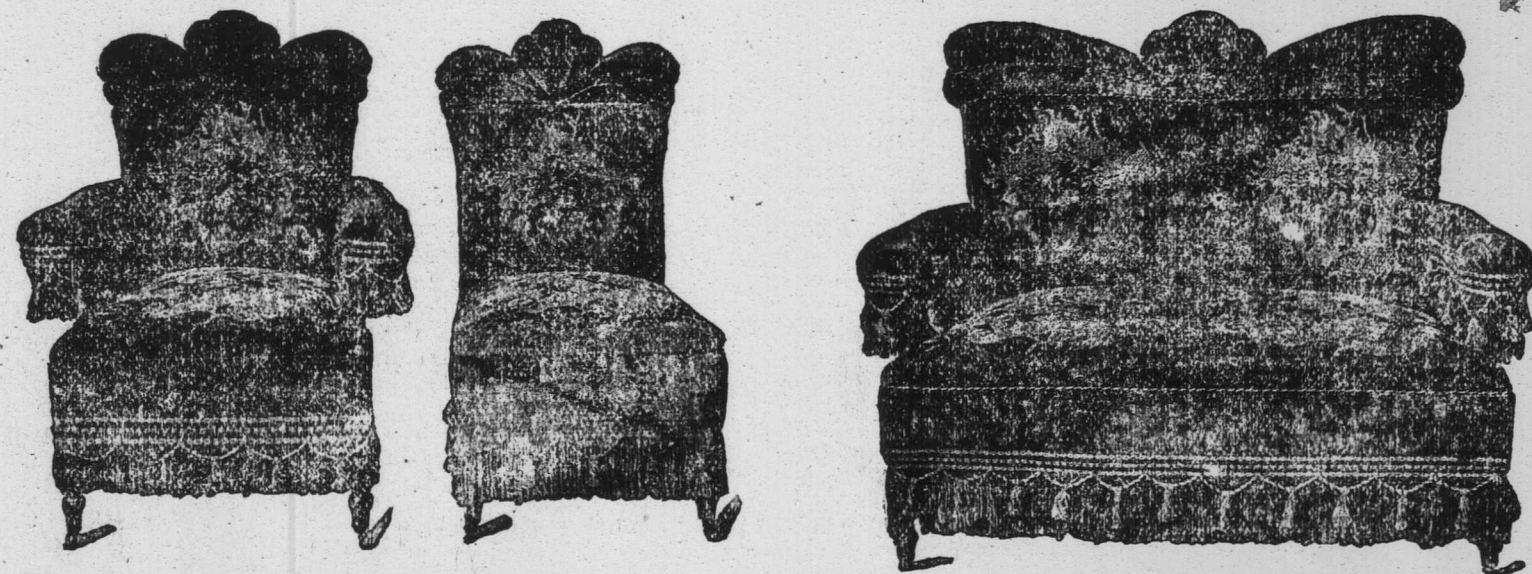
