

But all now acting as deputy wardens shall continue to act until called on to

pass the examination. The section compelling wardens to forward to the Surveyor general the names of guides in their district is repealed.

Wardens may confiscate the head of any moose or caribou unless it is accompanied by the owner, or properly tagged with the owner's name.

Moreover, when any person kills a moose or caribou he must exhibit the head to a warden, who will affix a tag, stating the name of the person who killed the animal, the license number, and the time and place of killing. This tag must be preserved and no head shall be

delivered to the owner when pre-

served or mounted, nor shall any

head be exported without such tag It is further an offence to kill any moose or caribou where it is impracticable to bring out the head for inspection by a warden so that he may affix a tag. Penalty the same as that for hunting moose or
